Frank W. McAuley Jr. has authorized the Knox County News to announce his candidacy for sheriff of Knox County, subject to the action of the Democratic primary in May.

Mr. McAuley was born 'just over the line' in King County. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Frank McAuley Sr. and he is married to the former Billie Jean Reeves.

A World War II veteran, Mr. McAuley farmed and ranched in Knox and King Counties before serving as chief of police for the City of Knox City for over two years. He served that association in order that he might seek the office of Knox County Sheriff.

Mr. McAuley said that he planned to personally speak to each resident and that his formal statement to the voters would appear in a later issue of the News.

Land Acquisition Continues For Miller Creek Reservoir

Kenneth Baker, land negotiator for the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, has reported the purchase of land from Mrs. Johnnie F. Quisenberry of Seymour as the second of nine tracts to be acquired from owners of land within the perimeter of the Miller Creek Reservoir. Baker has verbal agreements by three other landowners on purchase of their land needed by the Authority, with minor details being worked out. Transfer of title of these tracts are expected early next month, he said.

Pete Beecher, general manager of the Authority, said all engineering plans and specifications for construction of the Dam are complete. Preliminary plans for water supply lines and storage facilities to the member towns of Groesbeck, Haskell, Knox City, and Munday are being finalized.

News releases on the progress of the area water supply have not previously been given. Survey work, engineering data, technical matters with the Texas Water Development, and other required phases of work to date, were not considered newsworthy to the public, Beecher explained. However, Mr. Beecher said the project is now at the stage where progress reports would be of interest to the public, and frequent reports of progress will be released in the future.

Co. Livestock Show In Munday Jan. 7-8

Knox County and FFA members are busy preparing for the 1972 Knox County Junior Livestock Show to be held in Munday, January 7 and 8 according to J. Omar Cure General Show Chairman.

All sheep and breeding swine are to be in the barn ready to show by 9:00 a.m., Friday, January 7. These animals will be carried home when the Friday show is completed with the

exception of champions and possible sale lambs.

Barrows are to be moved in after Friday's show is completed which may be by 3:00 p.m. and it is hoped all barrows will be in the barn and weighed before 8:00 p.m. so classes can be divided and written up for use Saturday morning, January 8. Steers may be brought in Friday and not later than 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning.

No breeding swine or sheep are to be carried home Friday until the show is completed for the day. No livestock are to be carried out on Saturday until the premium sale is completed.

1972 ASC Committeemen Take Office on January 1

Arnold J. Navratil, well-known Knox County farmer, was reelected to a three-year term on the Knox County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee by delegates to the recent ASC County Convention.

A.C. Tackitt and Edward J. Smith, incumbents, were named vice-chairman and regular member and Mr. Navratil was named chairman of the three member County ASC Committee. First and second alternates named were Claudell Bratcher and Herbert Bellinghausen, respectively.

The County ASC Committee is responsible for local administration of Government farm programs such as acreage allotments and bases, price support for eligible crops and conservation cost-sharing on agricultural land.

The delegates to the Convention were newly elected ASC Community Committeemen assisting the County Committee in administering the farm programs and help keep farmers informed of program provisions and changes.

County committeemen are elected to serve a three-year staggered term, so that one vacancy occurs each year. The county committee alternates are elected for a one-year term.

The County ASC Committee will take office on January 1, 1972.

Acres planted were 42,812 and payments were made on 37,505 acres.

Wheat payments were on 756 farms with feed grain acreage totaling 123,923 and wheat 48,822.

The 1972 wheat, feed grain and cotton program sign-up will begin January 17 and close February 25. Notices of allotments, bases and yields (with exception of cotton yields) were mailed recently. Cotton yields are having to wait on the late harvest.

The ASC office will begin transferring cotton allotment

Transfers will be handled the same as last year except signatures must be witnessed by a county office employee. Cotton will transfer on 1971 cotton yields.

The county office announces the following requirements relating to cotton:

The cotton yield data for 1971 must be in the form of sales receipts, settlement sheets, or similar documents regarding the sale of cotton. We urge you to get this data in as soon as possible after harvest in order that we can process 1972 cotton yields.

Tax Deadline for Farmers Is Given

Farmers have until Jan. 21 to report Social Security taxes withheld from their employee's wages during 1971. Ellis Campbell Jr., district director of Internal Revenue for North Texas, said today.

The reports should be filed on Form 941, Employer's Annual Tax Return for Agricultural Employees.

Campbell said that any farmer who pays an employee cash wages of \$150 or more a year must withhold Social Security taxes. These taxes must also be withheld on wages under \$150 for any person hired 20 days or more a year.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Bumpy Flight
One moment Myrtle was gazing peacefully out the airplane window, admiring the view. The next moment the plane struck an air pocket, lurched downward, and tossed Myrtle right out of her seat.

The jet dislocated her shoulder, and in due course she filed a damage suit against the airline.

"As a common carrier," she argued, "the airline was obliged to deliver me safely to my destination. This they failed to do."

However, the court ruled that the plane's sudden plunge was an "act of God," hence nobody's fault. The court said that a bumpy ride is not yet possible under today's technology—and even a common carrier should not be expected to do the impossible.

Nevertheless, it is expected to do all it can. In another case, a pilot neglected to turn on the FASTEN YOUR SEAT BELT sign even though his plane had already entered a zone of turbulence. This time, when a passenger was injured in an accident like Myrtle's, he was held entitled to collect damages from the airline.

In a third case, a man was assured by a stewardess that there was "still time" to go to the washroom, just as the plane was approaching a known patch of choppy air. Again, injury. And again, airline liability.

But it is also true that the passenger must do his share to minimize the risk.

One passenger obediently hooked up his seat belt when the warning sign went on. But he left so much slack in the belt that there was still plenty of room for him to bounce. And when the plane hit turbulence, he did bounce—hard.

Afterward, the man tried to collect damages for the injuries he had sustained. He blamed the stewardess for not double-checking his belt.

But the court threw out his claim. For having suffered an accident he could easily have avoided, said the court, he had no one to blame but himself.

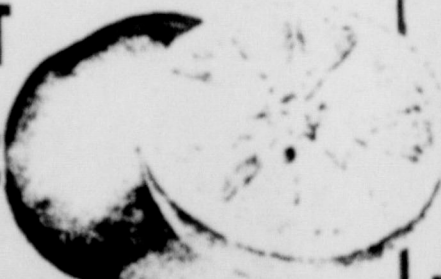

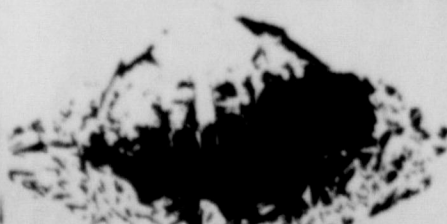
