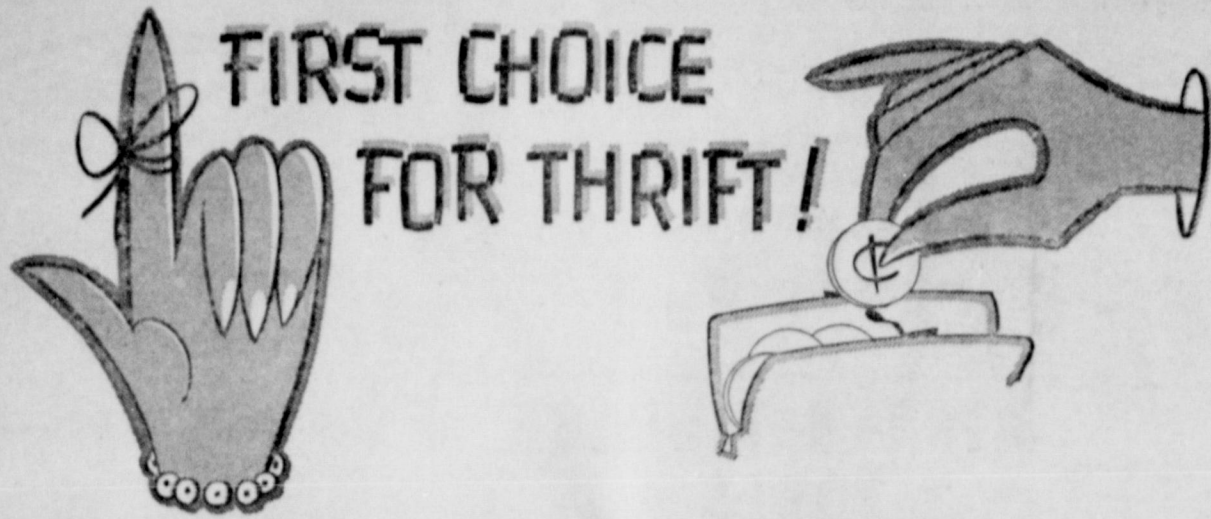

## Cotton Conference Set At Houston

Quality, an important factor in cotton's ability to compete for markets, will be probed extensively at the Beltwide Cotton Production Conference, Houston, December 17-18.

Five cotton leaders will discuss the subject in a panel on "strengthening cotton's quality leg." Dr. Earl E. Berkley, director of the Fiber and Spinning Laboratory of Anderson, Clayton and Co., Houston, will head

the group.

Dr. Burt Johnson, research consultant with the National Cotton Council, will open the panel with a discussion of a modern definition of cotton quality.

The next speaker, Dr. T. R. Richmond, agronomist at the Texas Experiment Station, College Station, will give a resume of promising techniques for improving quality through genetics and breeding.

From Bakersfield, Calif., and Calcut, Ltd., will come George J. Harrison to speak on improving and maintaining quality in growing, harvesting and ginning cot-

ton.

How quality can pay off in the market—and the need for it to do so—will be described by Carl Cox, manager of the Quality Control Department of W. D. Felder and Co., Dallas.

Some 800-900 persons are expected to attend the conference at the Rice Hotel. It is being sponsored by the National Cotton Council in cooperation with farm organizations, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Cotton Belt land-grant colleges, the agricultural chemicals industry, and other groups.

## Savings Bonds Sales 75.2% of Goal

During the month of October the citizens of Knox County purchased \$1,370,000 in series E and H Savings Bonds.

This announcement was made recently by W. E. Braly chairman of Knox County's Savings Bonds Committee.

"Sales for the first ten months of this year totaled \$178,135", chairman Braly reported. "We have now achieved 75.2% of our 1958 goal of \$237,000."

Sales in Texas during the first ten months of 1958 were \$146,136,258 which represents 83.5% of the 1958 goal of \$175,000,000.

"Under a recent change in Treasury regulations, individuals who hold F and G bonds that mature after September 1, 1958 may invest the proceeds from the maturing bonds in E and H bonds without regard to annual purchase limits," Braly announced. "This information should be of interest to hundreds of people in this area who hold maturing F and G bonds," he concluded.



Part-Time Workers Must Have Social Security Number

Many school students and housewives plan to work in jobs covered by Social Security during the holidays. These part-time workers will need social security cards, according to Erton F. Tate, District Manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security Office.

Mr. Tate urges all persons who plan to work during the holidays and who do not already have social security cards to apply for them immediately. Those who have lost their cards should ask for duplicates. Persons having social security cards at the time they file their applications for jobs will secure employment quicker, declared Mr. Tate. Many employers will not hire employees unless they have in their possession social security cards issued in their correct names.

Anyone wishing to apply for a number may go to the post office, secure and complete an application, Form SS-5, and mail it to the Wichita Falls Social Security Office.

The amount of benefits to which a wage earner or his survivors may be entitled will depend upon the amount of wages posted to his old-age and survivors insurance account. A social security account cannot be set up for an individual without first securing a social security card, declared Tate.
