'Hounds' Defeat Lueders Friday

The Knox City Greyhounds wound up the 1953 football season Friday with a win over the visiting Lueders Pirates, 26-13.

Knox City scored first, with Hubert Finley passing to Jimmy Leach who hit the right sideline, picked up a couple of good blocks, and galloped 80 yards to the goal line. The try for extra point failed.

Lueders tied the score when Commons sprinted 53 yards, and the first period ended with the score 6-6.

In the second quarter, Finley tossed a 25 yard pass to Nathan Lewis, who carried it another 20 yards to score. L. C. Teague skirled left end for the extra point.

The Pirates tied the score again in the third quarter, on a pass from Culver to Reeves, with Reeves adding the extra point. The scoring play was good for 35 yards.

Knox City's third touchdown came in the final period, when Finley tossed a pass to Lewis and Lewis handed it off to Leonard Burt. Burt carried the ball down near the goal line, and a few plays later Teague went over for the score. Burt ran over for the extra point.

A short time later Knox City gained possession of the ball again when Burt intercepted a Lueders pass on the Lueders 40. The 'Hounds' worked the ball down to the five, and Leach went over for the TD.

The win over Lueders put the 'Hounds' in fourth place in the district. In conference play they had a win and a tie, which put them ahead of Lueders with one win and no ties, and Aspermont with no win and a tie.

In practice games this season the 'Hounds' defeated Blanket, 7-0, and lost to the Stamford B team, 24-14, Hermleigh 20-13, Munday 25-0, and Lockett 42-20. In conference games they lost to Woodson 58-14, Rule 41-0 and Rochester 31-14; tied Aspermont 6-6, and defeated the Pirates.

CROSS-COMPLIANCE WITH BASIC CROP ALLOTMENTS NOT REQUIRED IN 1954

The U. S. Department of Agriculture said Monday that a previously announced requirement that producers must be in compliance with all basic agricultural commodity acreage allotments established for their farms, in order to be eligible for price support on any one basic commodity, would not be put into effect for crops produced in 1954.

The Department announced on October 8 that a wheat producer would have to be in compliance with all basic crop acreage allotments established on his farm to be eligible for wheat price support on the 1954 crop. This same provision was announced on October 22 for the five other basic commodities—cotton, corn, tobacco, peanuts and rice.

As announced Nov. 13, the special cross-compliance requirement has been withdrawn for the 1954 production.

In view of the fact that some fall-seeded crops had already been planted, and that some referendum votes on acreage allotment and marketing quota provisions had already been taken before the announcements were made, it was decided that the broader compliance provisions would not be put into effect for next year. Producers of course will still have to be in compliance with acreage allotments for any one crop in order to be eligible for price supports on that crop.

Robert L. (Bob) Travis of Abilene, formerly of Knox City, has had two copyrighted songs recorded, according to a story last week in the Abilene Reporter-News.

Bob is the son of Mrs. H. C. Travis, former Knox Citian who still owns farming and oil interests north of town.

According to the Reporter-News story, Bob was a building contractor when he began having heart trouble and the doctors advised him to "take it easy." He started writing songs and has turned out 25. He has had six of them copyrighted and plans to have the rest copyrighted.

The first two were put on records and released the first of the month. They are "Starlight Up in Heaven" and "When the Roses Bloom Again By the River." Royalty payments from the records are expected to start in about six months. A Hollywood movie and television firm has offered to use "Starlight Up in Heaven" in a movie short and on TV.

Bob has been studying music since he was 7, and was an amateur musician when he farmed here from 1935 until 1947.

Band Wins Honors In District Contests At Stephenville

The Knox City School Band received more praise than criticism from the judges in the Interscholastic League Marching Contest held in Stephenville Saturday. The band was rated in Division II.

Playing "The March Activity" and "Mutual," the band was judged on cadence, playing, alignment, inspection, special formation, and general effect. The ten required formations were forward march, halt while playing, halt while not playing, column right while playing, column left while playing, diminish front while playing, increase front while playing, column half-left or half-right while playing, start playing while marching, and cease playing while marching.

Judge Maxwell's criticism was that the playing needs more solidity; the trombone tone needs more improvement, cadence speeds up when playing ceases, and band needs more maturity of tone. However, "It is an excellent band for the size school," he added. Maxwell judged required movements, cadence, alignment and general effects.

A. H. Lang, who judged playing and cadence, wrote, "Drums increased tempo on drum cadence. An enjoyable performance, beautiful uniforms and good spirits."

H. L. Renfro, who judged alignment, special formations and general effect, had nothing but praise for the performance. He wrote, "Lines very good. Carriage of students good. Precision and discipline fine. For a young band as this one... a fine job but not quite mature enough for a first rating."

L. Shriner, who judged inspection, wrote "Band members sincere. Reflected purpose in their work. Caps worn correctly, dress uniform by all members. Instruments by sections held in uniform manner. Very, very good." He was the only judge who recommended rating I.

The band performed at 5 p. m. They left Knox City at 9 a. m. Saturday and returned at 12:20 Sunday morning.

Robert L. Taylor is director of the band and Corrine Urbanczyk is drum major. Majorettes are, Glenda Givens, Jerria Land, Genie Guinn, Peggy Stephens and Florence Reeves.

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strains.

The disease that killed the major part of the cotton this year, however, is the regular old root rot.

Root rot can be controlled pretty well, and the way to do it is to get organic material into the soil. This can be done with a number of crops.

In a number of places this year the rot has been worse on cotton following maize than that following cotton. This is not generally true and I asked Dr. Watkins about it. He said the only way he could account for this fact is that we had a very dry spring and the stalks did not have sufficient moisture to decay properly.

Excellent control of root rot in some parts of the state has been secured by rotating cotton with Hubam Clover, and I think it would work good here. I plan to try to set up some demonstrations on this.

On irrigated land a winter cover crop can be grown and turned under in the spring, but on dry land a summer annual would probably work out best most years.

Rotation of combine maize, guar, sudan or Hubam clover with cotton should give good control of root rot. If a lot of organic material is on the ground, 16-20-0 fertilizer can be added to hasten decomposition.

The main thing is to get organic matter into the soil any way you can.

SALVATION BY FAITH

Faith plays such a vital part in God's plan of salvation that it is impossible for any man to be saved without it. "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God." (Eph. 2:8) "He that believeth and is baptised shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." (Mark 16:16).

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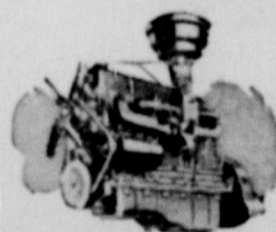

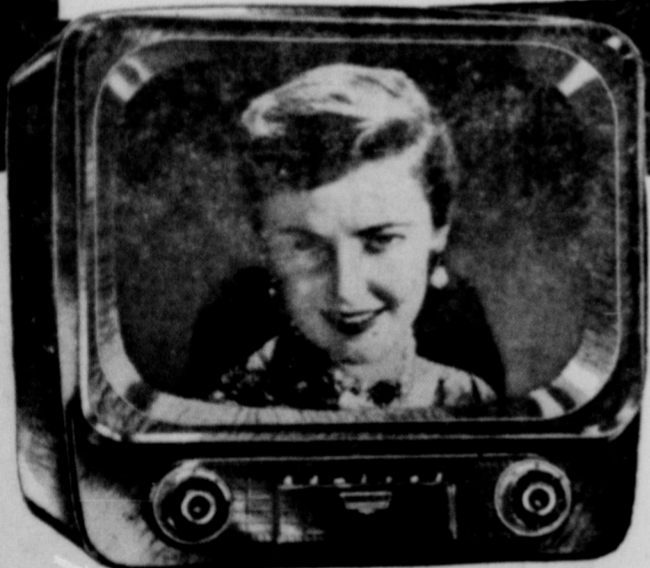
