The Knox County Sheriff, Mr. Elliott, left Monday for Huntsville with four men whose trials convicted them and gave penitentiary sentences. ## JUDGE LEE ANNOUNCES FOR RE-ELECTION

To the Voters of Knox County: Although I am calling your attention to my candidacy for a third term as your county judge, I feel certain no open minded voter expects any apology upon my part, for the reason that Knox County long since established the custom of bestowing official favors on a basis of efficiency and not on the basis of terms.

I have spared no effort to familiarize myself with the county and community interests since my election to the office of county judge of your county, and have made an honest effort to assist your county commissioners' without fear or favor in promoting them.

The annually increasing business of the county necessarily brings a corresponding increase in expenses and I faithfully promise that if re-elected I will cooperate with your commissioners' court in keeping the necessary expenses down to a minimum and that any necessary raise in tax rates or values will be as evenly distributed upon the basis of cash value as contemplated by law, as possible.

I have always opposed, and shall continue to oppose, commissioners' courts contracting heavy debts upon tax payers without their consent, and desire to call your attention to the fact that the present commissioners' court has created no such debts.

I have made every consistent effort to cooperate with the various commissioners of the county in the promotion of their respective precinct interests and will continue to do so, if re-elected, regardless of who may constitute your next court.

The interest of Knox County demands the attention and presence of your county judge both inside and outside of the courthouse, and I promise to continue to look after both, as I see them, whether it be to the satisfaction of the political monkey wrench slingers, the grafters or the gold-brick sales or not.

I have made an effort to make a few honest dollars as a surveyor when the duties of the judges office didn't require my presence at the court house, and I refuse to believe that the public has suffered, thereby, or expects any apologies at my hands. The expenses of the average family has increased so much in recent years that some rein should be allowed along professional lines or an increase in ex-officio allowance expected sufficient in amount to bring the official income, at least, up to the statutory limitations.

There are a number of other things of mutual and vital interest that I hope to be permitted to discuss with the voting public before the primary but sufficient to say for the present that these elections of your county Judge and commissioners mean increasingly more and more to the average tax payer and your interests calls, with increasing seriousness, for careful conservation at your hands as a voter this year.

If after careful consideration you can vote and work for my re-election I shall be very thankful.





Is Darnell's Store One Of a Chain?

This act is what the individual variety store men have done.

Our readers will wonder at our interest in this home owned store question. We can explain this interest briefly. The success and continued prosperity of a community of this size depends almost entirely on the success of its stores. The money earned by the community must stay in the community, or else gets out. There is no reason why our independent stores should not be prosperous for years to come.

Knox City has not yet been interrupted in her progressive young life with the foreign owned stores. We wonder what the reaction would be if such would be the case some day?


