### Knox City Among Area Towns Showing Growth

According to a feature story in the Sunday edition of the Wichita Falls Times, a population survey was given for 19 towns in the North Texas

Towns included in the survey were Archer City, Bowie, Burkburnett, Childress, Crowell, Electra, Graham, Henrietta, Holliday, Iowa Park, Jacksboro, Munday, Nocona, Olney, Quanah, Seymour, Throckmorton, Vernon, and Knox City.

The survey gave the population from the 1960 census, the 1970 census, and estimates from the cities themselves or agencies or companics knowledgeable about population, for the year 1975.

The survey showed midway through the 1970's, every one of the towns reported stabilization or gains in population, and many gains surpassed the 1960 census figures. Expansion of the industrial

base, lower cost of living, lessening of job opportunities in other areas, and small town lifestyle, are among reasons given by officials for drawing new residents and keeping the old. Of the 19 towns, Burkbur-

nett is the fastest growing with 57 per cent increase since 1970. Other gainers were Graham and Archer City with 49 per cent and Bowie with 36.6 per cent growth.

The survey also listed Knox City among the towns showing an estimated gain. The 1970 census showed 1,564 residents while the estimated 1975 census showed 1,650, which is a 5.5% increase.

Other gainers included Crowell with a 25.8 increase, while Holliday and Munday remained stable, according to the figures.

Knox City's increase is probably due to the fact that oil activity is increasing, several new businesses have opened, and the lower cost of living is inviting as compared to the higher cost in large





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
