We were glad to have as a caller this week, M. H. Simmons who though a Knox City man in every sense of the term, now gets his mail on a route out of Munday. Mr. Simmons is not just a lucky farmer, he is a good one. In 1927 he made 80-odd bales of cotton, and even on a semi-drouthy year like 1928 he harvested 33 bales. One thing that gives M. H. assurance of a fine profit from his crops is that he always raises enough feed for all his requirements. It is always better to be on the safe side, and have a little feed to sell than it is to have to buy at the high prices which prevail on feed on dry years. Buying feed on a dry year when money is scarce and feed is high is equal to buying feed on 2 good years when it is plentiful and cheap. Then it is much safer to have a year's supply ahead at all times if possible.

## COWS BEING TESTED ON STATE ACCREDITED PLAN HERE NOW

The Jersey herd of L. W. Graham numbering 13 head was given the tubercular test by the State Inspector, C. J. Lewis on Jan. 31st. All the cows were found to be in excellent condition and without infection by any disease. This test was made on the State Accredited plan and other cows belonging to different individuals were given that test. This is a move that should increase in our community as the service is free by the state and gives one the assurance of the health condition of their cows.

## TERRACING DEMONSTRATION TO BE HELD FEBRUARY 25TH.

C. L. Wilson, County Agent will hold a one-day Terracing Demonstration school on Feb. 25th, at the S. A. Bowden farm between Munday and Goree. He will be assisted by M. L. Bently terracing specialist from the A. & M. college and A. K. (Dad) Short, soil conservation specialist for the Federal Land Bank, of Houston, and others, who will demonstrate the Martin ditcher and Corsicana Grader. Everyone interested in conserving their soil is invited to attend this demonstration.

Mrs. E. L. Huntsman, of this city, has succeeded in establishing a new and unique enterprise for our section of the country. She began in a modest way raising Chinchilla rabbits, which are valuable for their fur as well as their meat. She is getting along nicely and has made several shipments which have netted her a neat profit. The demand for that fur is unlimited and sells readily at a good price. The rabbits are easily and cheaply raised.

Some few subscribers to the Herald may wait for a rain to pay their subscription, but E. L. Park waits for nothing but his time to be out. He knows the rain will come and he wants the paper to read about that, along with the other good things which are always happening in a progressive community and among an energetic citizenship. He renewed this week not only for himself but sends the paper to his daughter, Mrs. C. L. Clinton, of Pntnam, Texas. Mr. Park learned long ago how to farm on scant moisture if he had to. But he seldom finds it necessary to do that. By a system of planting in which he leaves an unplanted row every 3 rows, he makes on a seasonable year an abundance, and on a drouthy year, a plenty. The vacant row is planted to peas to keep the land from baking and to build up the fertility of the soil.

## "THRIFT"—SOME THINGS IT IS COMPOSED OF

Following is an article on Thrift prepared and read before the County Council of the P. T. A. meeting in the Methodist church of this city, by Mrs. Boyd Gillespie, of Truscott.

### "THRIFT"

In this age of modernism, in this age of invention, in this age of progress, we read from the press discussions of the most perplexing problems of our moral, mental and physical living. We have opportunity to hear these problems discussed orally and too, the discussion of them comes to us through the air. Many subjects that we read and hear are what we would term, "Big subjects," many would be classed, "Interesting Subjects" but in speaking of "Thrift" we shall class it as a, "Big Subject" in a little word.

Thrift, and we shall say it again, THRIFT! What is it?

- 1.—"It is economical management".—Webster.
- 2.—Thrift means work and work well done.
- 3.—It means a better and broader life.
- 4.—Thrift is to spend less than you earn, not only of money, but of health, knowledge and all earthly goods.
- 5.—Thrift is life in abundance instead of life in poverty.
- 6.—Thrift is a great educational course which is imperative to success and happiness.

From the above definition we readily see the importance of the subject we shall study for a few minutes. Anything which means that our work will be efficiently done and will give us a better and broader life, is worth while; anything that means life in abundance and will eliminate the great number of economically dependent people during old age, is worth while; and anything that is imperative to success and happiness, is certainly worth our time, our study and our teaching.

If it should be taught and if it is taught: To whom, especially should it be taught, where and how should it be taught?

We would say teach it to the children and begin in the home. Different methods may be used as to how to teach thrift; but we would say, use the method that will teach constructively.

Teach understandingly. Many times the child fails to get the lesson we are trying to bring

esting and most dangerous things in the world, therefore, we say stress the principles of right living and teach the child that.—

"Better than grandeur, better than gold.

Than rank and titles, a thousand fold,

Is a healthy body, a mind at ease,

And simple pleasures that always please;

A heart that can feel for another's woe,

And share his joys with a genial glow.

With sympathies large enough to unfold

All men as brothers, is better than gold.

Better than gold is a conscience clear.

The toiling for bread in a humble sphere;

Doubly blessed with content and health,

Untried by the lusts or cares of wealth;

Lowly living and lofty thought

Adorn and ennoble a poor man's cot;

For mind and morals, in Nature's plan.

Are the genuine tests of a gentleman.

As we have stated, there are several methods or systems for teaching thrift, but we recommend the budget system, which appropriates a grand total and indicates approximately how much each department will receive. (The word department in the definition, shows that the system until recent years was applied to the financial side of government affairs only.) We get the plan from the English people but instead of using it exclusively for the financial side of our living we have found that it is well to apply it in all principles of right living. Teach the child to budget his or her time each day he would find it very profitable to sleep 10 hours, spend 1 hour in the care of the body, work 2 1-2 hours each day, give 2 hours a day to helping others, or we would say kindly deeds. Play 5 hours, study 3 hours and always allow 30 minutes each day for leisure and meditation. May we remember that, "It is in the hours of leisure that character is builded." This is just an approximate schedule and would not fit all children at all, but it gives you an idea of budgeting.

Teach the child to observe a health program. Give so much time each day to eating each meal, observe regularity, spend much time every day in the open air and sunshine. Certainly teach the child to apportion his or her money savings. We are failing in one of the most necessary instructions if we do not teach the young of

our land—that at least one tenth of his or her savings should be given to the Lord and the Lord's work. The child should add to his savings account each week and should be instructed in allowing so much for an investment. An expense amount should be looked after. Also teach the child to have some money to spend, but direct well how the money is spent. We heartily recommend the teaching of thrift in our schools. It is such an important subject and if it is necessary to instruct in this line so forcibly in the home it is the logical plan to follow our home instruction by the teaching in our schools. We fail in so many of our well laid plans, by not doing follow up work. If thrift is begun in our homes according to the directions given above, or according to other directions, that may seem better, and the plan is followed up in our schools, we will certainly be going forward.

How near ideal it would be if for this subject we could use in our schools a sensible, logical text book. A text that would harmonize our home plan with our school method and make the two as one. We believe that in 13th District, we have several teachers and workers who could write just the text to meet the need and our Parent-Teacher's Association would be happy for someone in our District to undertake the task.

With such a book in the hands of our teachers and by having a great deal of written work, with practice classes on the part of the pupils, testing their ability to budget and apportion their time, their health, their money etc., we believe it would pay and pay well. The results would be, 1.—Knowledge of income and expenditure. 2.—Wasteful spending would be checked. 3.—Systematic saving for definite purposes would be encouraged. 4.—Fixed habits are formed. 5.—A foundation is laid for very useful and valuable citizens. 6.—Our boys and girls are prepared for real living and happiness. out, because we use words that are too complex for the child mind. Thrift can easily be explained in a way that the very small child can understand what it is and in a simple explanation of the term the interest is aroused. The understanding has been that thrift was a term that should be applied to the financial side of life, but now we are finding that it can and should be applied to all principles of right living; so as we arouse the interest of the child, direct that interest and impress the lesson that there isn't anything quite

as valuable as honest, truthfulness, right dealings with playmates and classmates, health and other things which we have not mentioned, but which are very important. From observation we know that with normal children we do not have to put forth any effort to arouse their interest in money. The penny, the dime, the dollar will attract the child in it's infancy; then since we know of the interest children have in money, it seems necessary to have very forceful Bible teaching. "The love of money is the root of all evil," and may we keep in mind that money is one of the most inter-

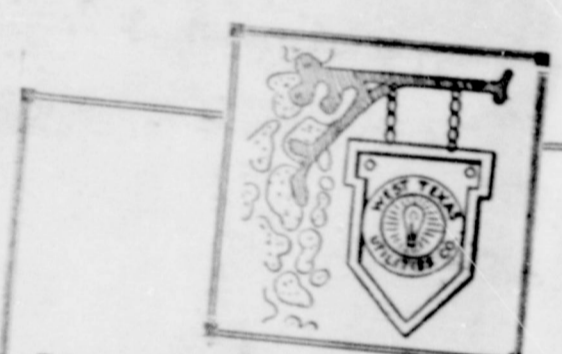
