

Ressell Retires From Texas Highway Dept.

CHILDRESS—The retirement of Theodore R. Ressell, maintenance construction supervisor in Benjamin, has been announced by Childress District Engineer Lewis H. White of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

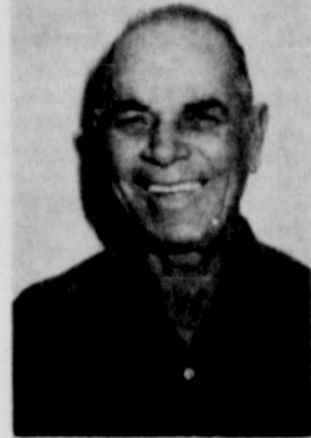
December 31, 1975, marked the end of a 26 year highway career for Ressell, who went to work for the Department in 1950 in Benjamin as a semi-skilled laborer.

Ressell was promoted to maintenance foreman and transferred from Crowell to Wellington in 1965 where he was responsible for highway maintenance activities in Collingsworth County and the northern portion of Childress County.

He returned to Benjamin as maintenance foreman for Knox County in 1970.

Ressell was honored with a retirement party on his last day of employment, December 31, 1975. The party was held at the Childress District office. He was presented with an acetylene welding and cutting set and a tool box by his fellow employees.

"We are losing a valuable employee," said District Engineer White.

"Mr. Ressell has done an outstanding job and has done his share of upholding the fine tradition of the Department.

"This is a man that has believed in hard work all of his life, and he has operated his organization in this fashion."

Ressell stated that for the most part his 26 years with the Department had been pleasant.

"All the people I've worked with and for have been very nice people," he said.

"Any success I've had as maintenance foreman is due to the outstanding employees I've had working for me."

George R. Wall, Childress assistant district engineer and former resident engineer in Munday, stated that he had enjoyed his close association with Ressell over the years.

"I know Theodore as well as anybody with the Department, and I can truthfully say he has been a devoted and capable highway man."

Asked about his retirement plans, Ressell emphasized that he was going to do only what he wanted to do.

"I've got plenty of work to do around my place and will do some fishing from time to time," he said.

The Ressells have four children, Mrs. W.T. (Jo Etta) Cartwright of Benjamin, V.T. Ressel of Clovis, New Mexico, Mrs. Jack (Katherine) New of Seguin, and Ronnie of Benjamin.

Ressell was born in Petrolia and attended Fairview School in Thrift, Texas.

Burleson Announces For Re-Election

WASHINGTON D.C. - Congressman Omar Burleson, who represents the 17th District of Texas in the United States House of Representatives, has announced for re-election. He has filed for a place on the ballot in the Democratic Primary Election on May 1, 1976.

Burleson was elected to the

80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House. In addition, Congressman Burleson serves on the newly created Budget Control Committee which has, as its purpose, relating Federal expenditures to Federal revenues with the goal of reaching a balanced budget.

Burnett Asks Re-Election

Bobby D. Burnett, who is presently serving as county attorney of Knox County, has authorized The Knox County News to announce his candidacy for re-election to this office, subject to action of the voters in the 1976 Democratic Primary.

A native of Knox City, Mr. Burnett returned here upon receiving his law degree and was soon appointed to the office of county attorney. In March of 1973, he moved to Munday, where he maintains a law office.

He asks the vote and consideration of Knox County's voters strictly upon his record of past performance in the office of County Attorney, and upon his ability to serve his county in this capacity.

"I will contact as many voters as possible," he said, "but in the meantime I ask that you give my candidacy your careful consideration, assuring you that your vote and influence will be greatly appreciated."

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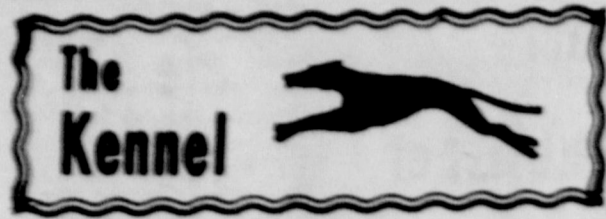

Local Students Hear Farm Safety Program

"Farm tractor and machinery mishaps take the lives of 800 to 1,000 persons each year on our U.S. farms and ranches," Ben Bullard, assistant safety director for the Texas Farm Bureau in Waco, said as he spoke to Knox City High School. The Farm Bureau hopes to aid in reducing the needless

loss of life, time, and farming equipment by encouraging greater caution and protective equipment. Bullard discussed ways in which many Texas farm and ranch persons have been fatally injured (30 to 50 annually) in past years, including overturns, horseplay, speed, extra passengers, and refueling accidents. He estimated that both the (1) injury rate and the (2) fatality rate could be reduced by 40 to 50% through the use of protective equipment. Using model equipment, Bullard illustrated the importance of protective caps or roll-overs, properly mounted, with seat belts. Personal protective equipment such as bump hats, gloves and snug fitting clothing were listed as being very important, too.

When on a road or highway proper lighting and markings were discussed, including Slow Moving Vehicle emblems. The SMV emblem is to be placed on the tractor, or self-propelled equipment that-by engineering design-was designed to travel 25 MPH or less.

The tractor safety program was brought to Knox City, courtesy of the Knox County Farm Bureau.

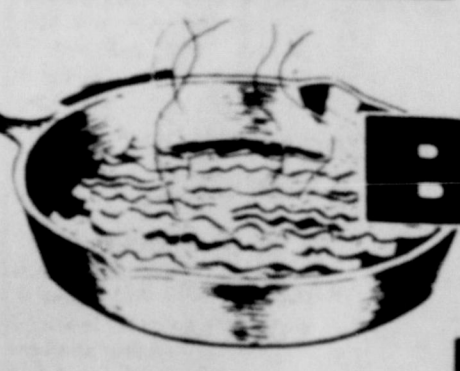

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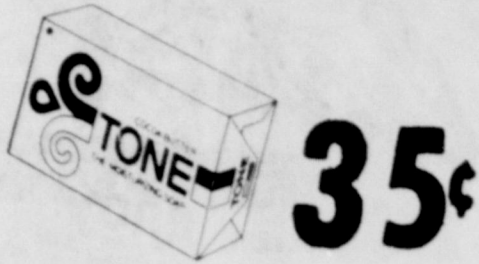
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
