## HEALTH PROGRAM APPROVED BY STATE HEALTH OFFICER

Following is a letter received by Mr. Roy Smith, Mayor of Knox City, and Mr. J. G. Dutton, from Mr. J. C. Anderson, M. D., State Health Officer in which Mr. Anderson appraises the program of health enacted by the city.

Hon. Roy Smith, Mayor, Knox City, Texas.

Mr. J. G. Dutton, Waterworks Supt., Knox City, Texas.

Dear Sirs:

Our district engineer Mr. L. H. Male, has just reported on the splendid cooperation accorded him and the courtesies shown while in your city. Your plan to beautify the water plant grounds by terracing around the building, continuing to chlorinate the supply, sending in monthly water samples to the State Board of Health Laboratory, and giving consideration to the installation of a deep turbine pump and thereby eliminating same meet with our approval.

For your convenience we are enclosing some monthly water operation report blanks and a sketch showing the design of shipping case to be used in samples for analysis.

The elimination of privy located in the proximity of the well and the improvement of drainage at pump station will also add another factor of safety to your supply. Mr. Dutton is to be commended for the good concrete construction around the well and building, keeping the pump house clean and in orderly condition and finally for keeping the pump house under lock and key.

CALLED TO MART IN DEATH OF MOTHER

Mrs. M. M. Ward of this city and Mr. Claude Vance of the Cliff community were called to Mart Texas Sunday morning in the death of their mother Mrs. B. E. Leitch. Mrs. Leitch died Sunday morning, October 23, 1932 about seven thirty, in the home of her son B. D. Vance in Mart Texas. Funeral services were conducted Monday from the Mart Methodist church by the Reverend Walkup, and interment was made in the Mart cemetery.

Mrs. Leitch would have been 65 years of age on the 22 of November. She was born in Mississippi where she married, later moving to Texas in the Mart territory. She spent a period of 10 years in Knox City returning to Mart for some nine years and then back in Knox City. For the past six years she has been here in the home of her daughter Mrs. M. M. Ward.

At the age of twelve years Mrs. Leitch was converted and joined the Presbyterian church. She continued in this church until she moved to Knox City. There being no Presbyterian church, she with her children, joined the Methodist church. To this faith she remained true through the remainder of her life.

Luke 18

The beginning of this chapter, is in close connection with what precedes. The mention of the Second Advent leads Christ to speak of the need of prayer and watchfulness. In the parable are: (1) The duty of continual prayer; (2) The certain answer to prayer, if it be persistent enough; (3) The certainty that in the end, God will maintain the cause of His elect against their adversaries (4) A warning against failure of faith in times of seemingly abandonment by God.

The moral difficulty in this parable is that God seems to be compared to an unjust judge, is best met by saying that in reality God is not so much compared as contrasted with him. The argument is that if justice can be obtained by persistence even from an unjust judge, how much more can it be obtained from the author of all justice?

The story of the pharisee and publican seems to be centered around the thought that we should not think more highly of ourselves that we ought to. We can not pray with a self-righteous attitude. We must remember that there is none good and unless He dwells in us there is nothing good to be found in us.

We must take the Kingdom of God with the simple faith of a little child. In the story of the rich young ruler there are many good lessons to be found, but I want to speak of only one which seems to trouble so many people, and this is, "none is good save one, and that is God." This really means there is none that is good, and if that one dwells in us then we too can be good, not of ourselves, but of the One that is dwelling within us.

Christ teaches that they who forsake all and follow Him shall have blessings not only in the life to come but also in this life. Let us give all things for Christ.

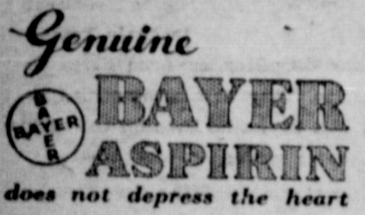

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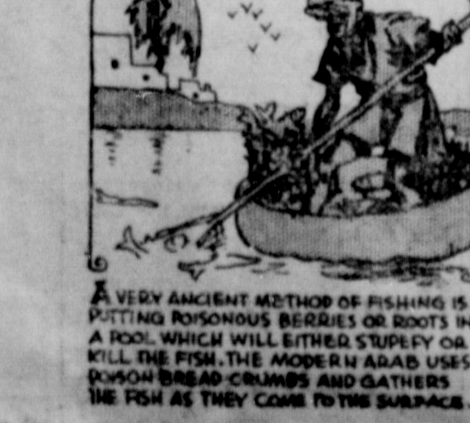
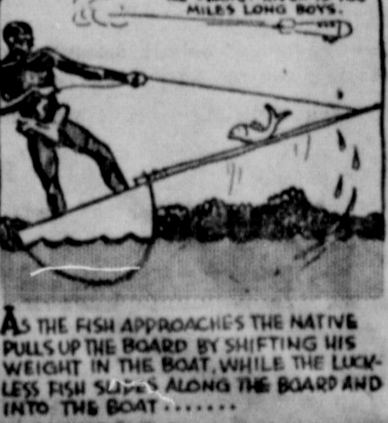

estimate the increased value of the land due to terracing, but these men declare they would have had no fields by this time if they had not terraced. One man figures that the increased yields over the 10-year period equal the income on \$1000 on each 50 acres terraced. Four of the 10 state that terracing has already paid them back an amount equal to the value of the land."

Newton—"I made an additional profit of \$7 per acre on my cotton where hairy vetch was plowed into the soil last spring," states J. T. Rountree of Weaver community in Newton county. On land where vetch had been planted and turned under the yield was 512 pounds of lint cotton whereas only 327 pounds per acre was produced on the remainder of the field. After deducting cost of vetch seed and picking and ginning of extra cotton, there remained 77 per acre profit.

Dallas—Fifty cents per bushel for his corn, 27 cents for oats, and \$13.50 per ton for cane hay was received by L. E. Campbell of Dallas county from the feeding of 40 head of Herford yearling heifers, recently finished. In computing his costs he included labor, feed, pasture, improvements, and allowance for depreciation. The report of this demonstration was made at a recent farm meeting arranged by A. B.
