Emmett Partridge of Kno County served as chairman o the meeting. Tom Craddock of the Seymour REA office cused the progress that RE/ expects to make in this count in the next year. Mr. Craddoci stated that, with the increased appropriations that have re cently come out of Washington every farmer in Knox County would have electricity madavailable to him by the mid dle of next year, and possibly ooner. The scarcity of certain materials is holding up the progress at the present time The 60-day stop order on a governmental construction job included REA, but its release is oue soon. Poles and copper wire have been the two main bottlenecks to REA line construction programs.

Mr. Craddock stated that the announcement should be made in a few weeks regarding the policy that REA will follow in the matter of telephone service to REA patrons. laboratories and field test at present. There is still an acute shortage of electrical appliances that are available to farmers and ranchers, but this supply should increase materially by the first of the year.

Mr. Cradock stated that the home type freezer unit could best be utilized, not as a replacement for the central locker plants, but as an addition to the locker plant. The most practical use that could be made of the home unit would be as a storage unit for farmers products after it has been processed and frozen at the locker paint.


