## Son Of Local Couple Killed in Viet Nam

City Marshal and Mrs. W. S. (Pete) Hatfield received word Monday, October 17, that their only son, W. S. Jr., had been killed in Viet Nam. The telegram read in part "I deeply regret to confirm on behalf of the U. S. Navy the death of your son, Woodward Stevens Hatfield, Jr., USN HN 9157798, October 14, at Loc Binh Son, Quang Nagi, South Viet Nam, as a result of multiple fragment wounds received from a friendly grenade while in defense position. His wife is being notified and will be requested to inform the Navy concerning her desires regarding dispositions of remains. It is suggested that you contact her as to details concerning funeral arrangements. Your son died while serving his country. I extend to you my sincere sympathy in your great loss." It was signed by Vice Admiral B. J. Semmes, Jr., Chief of Personnel.

W. S. (Dub) was born in the Knox County Hospital on March 12, 1945. His parents were living in Stamford at the time. They later moved to Muleshoe where he finished high school in May, 1964. He left Albuquerque, N. M., on January 4, 1965, for San Diego, California, where he joined the U. S. Navy. He received training as a Navy medic there and later received further training as a medic with the Marine Corps at Camp Pendleton, California. He married the former Louise Qualls of Tucumcari, N. M., on March 3, 1966, and left for Viet Nam on May 4, 1966. W. S. was serving with E Co., 2nd Battalion, 7th

Marines, 3rd Platoon at the time of his death.

Survivors in addition to his wife and parents include two sisters, Mrs. Shirley M. Waller and Mrs. Brenda Comer, both of Lubbock; his grandfather, E. L. Hatfield of Rochester; two nieces and three nephews.

Tentative plans are for the funeral services to be held in Muleshoe.

This plan is recommended in section 4 of Article 4477-12, Vernon's Civil Statutes, passed by the 1965 Texas State Legislature. This test will be given annually

to the first and seventh graders. The cooperation of each parent of a first and seventh grade student is very important. In the very near future your child will be given a letter explaining the test with a tuberculin test request attached for you to fill out and return by the students to their teacher.

**Farm And Ranch News**

Written for last week

The tour last week to view new crop demonstrations drew only a small number of people but the results should interest many. A demonstration crop of Baco sesame was observed growing on the Ira Bowden farm near Munday. This crop was planted July 5 on ground that was in Irish potatoes last spring. This variety of sesame can be combined which is a big improvement over the old ones that required shocking before threshing. The yield and gross income per acre of this crop will be reported in the result demonstration manual later this year.

The group saw a field of Hinn soybeans growing on this same farm. Jack and Garon Tidwell are renting this land. The soybeans were also planted on Irish potato ground on July 5.

Soybeans are extremely sensitive to length of day and the optimum time for planting in our area is June 1 to June 15. This

late planting will lower production because the plants will flower and fruit depending upon length of day and not on size of plant. The larger the plant, the more room for beans.

Cotton root rot will be a problem in the production of soybeans in our area. A demonstration on the League Ranch received moderate damage from the disease.

Soybeans also will require irrigation in Knox County as they are not drought resistant. The period of greatest water need will fall in the lowest months of average rainfall.

The tour also took in the demonstration of nematode resistant stripper cotton on the S. D. Jones farm northeast of Knox City. Two varieties of cotton, Lankburn and Westburn, were observed growing in a field of Auburn M. The Auburn M is a nematode resistant picker cotton. The Oklahoma Experiment Station has crossed Auburn with Lankart and with Western Stormproof to get stripper cotton that has the resistant traits of Auburn. Both varieties look excellent at this time with a good crop of bolls.

The seed were received late and these varieties were planted on June 6. Yields, grade and staple will be obtained and the results published at a later date.

James Albus is the farmer working Mr. Jones land. This farm had one of the earliest damaging populations of nematodes in the county. More and more fields are becoming infested each year.

If you have a field of cotton that has shed leaves during September and has small stunted plants along with normal sized plants, then you can expect to have nematodes. If cutting the stem of a cotton plant shows brown streaks that is one more indication. The nematodes injure the roots and Fusarium wilt enters the plants actually doing the damage. The wilt infects the tissues and interfering with the flow of sap thereby causing the damage.
