## Greyhounds and Rochester to Play Armistice Day

Knox City will journey southward to Rochester for its next football game, to be played at 2:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, November 11. The locals, after a narrow defeat at the hands of Woodson in their last game, will be more than eager in this next-to-the-last encounter of the 1952 football season.

What brand of competition can the locals expect? Rochester has won one game, against Lueders 34-7, and tied another, against Clyde 13-13. That is the extent of their winning for the season. The 'Hounds will be playing without the services of Rob Jensen, who will be sidelined with an injured knee. Another bit of bad news is the loss, except for limited service, of Leonard Burt. Leonard has been crippled the past week with pulled leg muscles.

Probably the best piece of news for the local eleven since the beginning of the season is the fact that Jerry Wilson will be included in this week's lineup. Jerry, who has been out since the first fifteen minutes of play in the first game of the season with a broken collar bone, will once more don the togs of the 'Hounds. Coach David Slaughter stated that Jerry will probably not be used on defense and maybe not all the time on offense, but "He will play."

For the first time in a generation, the nation will have a Republican administration January 20, when Eisenhower and Nixon are inaugurated. According to the latest unofficial tabulations, the Republican team

won in 39 states with a total of 442 electoral votes. Popular vote for Eisenhower was more than 31 million, while his Democratic opponent, Adlai Stevenson, received about 25 million.

## Youths Slash Tires Halloween Night

Spooks were on the prowl in Knox City last Friday night—Halloween—and most popular pastime of the evening seemed to be blocking the streets and highways with farm implements, oil tanks, signs, and everything else that was not bolted down.

While blocking the streets is a dangerous practice, City Marshal Lewis Floyd said there was comparatively little actual destruction of property. Largest instance was at the Brazos Valley Gin, where 18 trailer tires were slashed with a knife and headlights on a truck were knocked out.

By Tuesday officers had solved the case and seven Negro youths, 13 to 19 years of age, "fessed up" to the deed. The culprits, six from O'Brien and one from Knox City, were freed after paying the damages, amounting to \$169.13.

## SUFFRAGE DISCUSSED AT STUDY CLUB MEETING

While Texas as a whole "went Republican" for the first time in twenty years and joined the rest of the nation in electing Dwight Eisenhower and Richard Nixon as president and vice-president of the United States, Knox County voters, who have enjoyed untold benefits from the Democratic farm program, stayed in the Democratic column.

Even so, the Republican nominees received a surprising percentage of the county vote. The unofficial total, as reported to the Texas Election Bureau, was 1,558 for Stevenson, 1,034 for Eisenhower.

Allan Shivers, Texas governor who was in both the Democratic and Republican columns, received 1,974 Democratic votes and 195 Republican votes. Price Daniel, senator-elect who was also cross-filed, received 2,030 Democratic votes and 196 Republican votes.

According to election officials one vote was cast in the county for the Prohibition party and one for the Constitutional party.

Knox County voters were opposed to the two constitutional amendments, although both proposals apparently carried over the state as a whole. The vote on workmen's compensation was 650 for, 713 against, and on aid to medical students, 555 for, 845 against.

Thirty-two county voters wrote in the name of Tom Connally for Senator, and 42 wrote in the name of Lindley Beckworth for the same office. Ralph Yarborough received 71 write-in votes for governor.

In Knox City, the east box gave Stevenson 332, Eisenhower 129. Shivers received 322 Democratic votes, 40 Republican, and Daniel received 344 Democratic, 42 Republican.

Stevenson received 101 votes in the west box to Eisenhower's 41. Shivers received 108 votes in the Demo column and 10 in the Republican, and Daniel received 112 Democratic and 10 Republican votes.

The proposed constitutional amendments also lost in Knox City. Total vote in both boxes was 201 for the workmen's compensation proposal, 231 against, and 150 for aid to medical students, 299 against.

In the only strictly local contest on the ballot, for constable of Precinct 5, Leroy Davis, incumbent, who was in the Democratic column, won re-election over H. L. McNulty, independent candidate. The total vote was 710 for Davis, 95 for McNulty. The Knox City east box gave Davis 389, McNulty 54; the west box went 108 for Davis, 25 for McNulty; Jas. Partridge (Sunset) gave Davis 196, McNulty 13, and absentee ballots were 17 for Davis and 3 for McNulty.

**MOST FAMILIES DEPENDENT ON SOCIAL SECURITY FOR RETIREMENT PAY, TATE SAYS**

Old-age and survivors insurance is the basic retirement and family income protection for 8 out of every 10 paid civilian workers, it was announced today by Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls field office.

A recent survey conducted nationwide revealed that of the families now receiving old-age insurance benefits, 30 percent had no other money income, or less than \$75 per year per person. The survey showed that 72 percent per year of the retired workers on the rolls had other money income of less than \$600 a year. This points out the great extent to which retired workers of today are dependent on the Federal family insurance protection provided by the social security system, Tate said.

Younger members are more immediately interested in the death benefit protection provided by this law, Tate continued. Over 62.3 million workers are now fully insured under this system. This means that in the event of the untimely death of these workers, or self-employed persons, their surviving children, widows, dependent widowers or dependent parents would receive cash income. In the Wichita Falls area approximately 33,000 persons have this survivors insurance protection due to their fully insured status under this law.

Tate added that social security benefits are assuming a greater importance in the future planning of all covered workers and self-employed people, as borne out by the national survey of persons receiving the benefit payments. Therefore it is of the utmost importance that these individuals protect their insured status by always using but one social security number. Also, make sure that each and every employer has an accurate record of the name and number shown on your social security card so that all earnings reported for you will be credited to your individual old-age and survivors insurance account.

A representative of the Wichita Falls social security office will be at the postoffice in Knox City on Thursday, Nov. 13 at 1:30 p. m., to answer your questions.




