Is Win Opener 63-0

Newton came back on the next play for a 20-yard gain. With 1st down and 10 on the midfield stripe, sophomore quarterback Joey Swain misfired on a pass to Whitley. Sophomore Joe Huff then gained two yards up the middle. On third down and eight on Rochester's 48-yard line, Swain hit Senior end Greg Cloots with a strike across the middle. Cloots broke one tackle and then there was a fast race to the end zone. Swain kicked the extra point and with 1 minute and 42 seconds gone, the score was 7-0.

On the ensuing kickoff the ball

was blocked loose from the Steers' Donald Scott and Junior Art Crowover recovered the ball for the Hounds on the Steers' 34 yard line. Swain carried for four yards. Newton carried for 15 yards. Huff then carried three times for 11, 3, and 1 yards and the Hounds' second touchdowns. Swain again kicked the extra point making it 14-0 with only 4 minutes and 19 seconds gone on the clock.

When the Steers got the ball after the Hounds' kickoff they were able to gain only 2 yards in 3 plays. Senior Rob Harrison turned in two fine tackles, one for no gain and one for a yard loss. On fourth down the Steers' kick was blocked and the Hounds took over on the Steers' 29 yard line.

It took the Hounds nine plays to get the ball into the end zone with Huff going in from the 2. The series included a 12 yard pass from Swain to Cloots on 4th down and 8 at the Steers' 27. Swain kicked the extra point and the score read 21-0 with 50 seconds left in the first quarter.

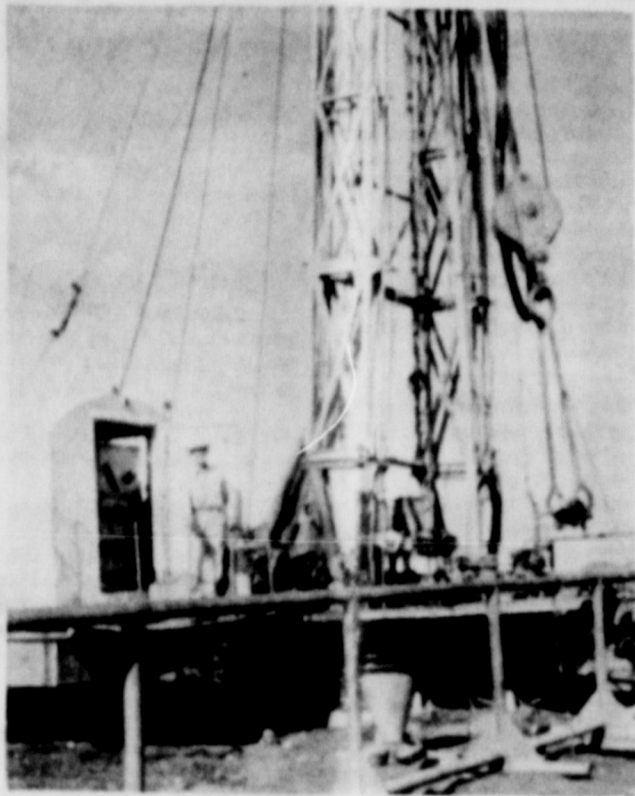
The Hounds' defense held after the kickoff. The Steers punted with ball on the Steers' 42. The Hounds scored in 5 plays with Phillip Newton taking a Joey Swain pass for 28 yards into the endzone. Swain's kick was good on the extra point try but the Hounds were caught holding and penalized out to the 18 yard line where Swain threw incomplete to Huff. The score was 27-0 with 9 minutes and 27 seconds left in the first half.

After the kickoff the defense led by junior guard Stanley Newton and senior tackle Bobby Reeves made the Steers' punt still needing 19 yards on 4th down.

The Hounds got the ball on the Steers' 43 yard line. After 2 passes fell incomplete, sophomore Gary Carver ripped 43 yards for the Hounds fifth touch down. Swain kicked the extra point.

Following the Hounds' kickoff the Steers made their only first down of the 1st half on a 12 yard pass from Hollingsworth to English on 3rd down and 10. On the previous 2 plays junior Billy Baker and junior Randy Egerbacher had stopped the Steers for no gain. The Steers then threw 3 incomplete passes and were forced to punt. The Hounds made their only costly mistake on fielding the punt. The ball was fumbled and Rochester recovered.

Area Drilling Underway

Petroleum Programs Inc. of Abilene has staked two wildcat locations in northwest Haskell County.

Drilling is now underway for No. 1 E.R. Carpenter, staked as a proposed 5,000-foot test three miles southwest of Knox City. A southwest offset to a plugged producer, it spots 330 feet from the south and 2,267 feet from the east lines of the north half of Section 23, Block 14, H&TC Survey. The lease is composed of 149 acres.

Other drilling is on the No. 1 T.E. Robbins, one mile south of Knox City. Having a

proposed depth of 4,900 feet, it is on a 156 1/2 acre lease.

Drill site is 1,650 feet from the north and 1,500 feet from the east lines of Section 49, Block 2, D&W Survey.

The No. 1 Dave Whitford was staked by Glen S. Soderstrom of Amarillo as a 2,300 foot well-out six miles east of Knox City in a 108.5 acre lease and 330 feet from the south and east lines of Lot 93, Block 2, D&W RR Survey. The wildcat was a dry hole and plugged early this week, according to reports received Tuesday.

Lone Star Gas Increase Refused By City Council

At the regular city council meeting Monday night September 11, the members of the council voted to refuse Lone Star Gas Company's request for a rate increase.

Council members present were Carl Shelton, Lynn Worley, Bobby Baker, Celso Gonzalez Jr., and Glen Humley, Mayor C.C. (Buddy) Angle and city secretary Mrs. Faye Baisback were also present.

Lone Star Gas Company manager Guy White of Seymour and Bill Price of Knox City met with the city council to discuss the rate increase application. White

informed the council that Lone Star Gas Company would lower its request to approximately 4% rather than the 5.01% previously requested and that they would not delete the automatic rate clause. After this request was denied, White reiterated that Lone Star Gas Company would lower its request to a 3.85% increase but would not delete the rate clause. However, council members agreed their decision would remain as voted on.

In other action, the council approved a Resolution permitting contractors for North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority to construct a water supply line from Avenue L west up South Second Street to the water tower. An ordinance regulating wastewater was approved.

Before the meeting concluded the council members were informed of the Chief of Police Doc Clark's intention to resign as soon as a suitable replacement could be obtained.

Clark, who accepted the position last December 15 is resigning because of health reasons.

The Knox City Band Boosters annual calendar and membership drives have been scheduled to begin Monday, September 18 and continue through Friday, September 29. It was decided at the regular meeting Monday night of this week.

President Mrs. John E. Helms told members that Mrs. Oscar Mingis has agreed to take the secretary's position filling in for Mrs. Clyde Baulin who moved recently to Branger and that Mrs. John McGaughey accepted the office of second vice president, in place of Mrs. Kenneth Russell, who resigned due to illness in the family.

Mrs. M. Gaughey is chairman of the band calendar drive and met with her committee Tuesday afternoon. The calendars will again be \$1.25 with 25 cents for each listing, she said.

Members voted to have another membership contest among the bands at school with a "Coke" party going to the winners. Mrs. Helms said that band memberships are only 1.00 per family and band members from the fifth grade up will be selling.

Large Turnout Here For Field Day Wednesday

More than 400 persons from throughout Texas and Oklahoma, as well as several from other neighboring states, were on hand here Wednesday, September 13, for the Field Day at the 70-acre Plant Materials Center located northwest of Knox City.

Plant manager J.C. Garrison, and his crew had the Center in tip top shape and visitors enjoyed viewing the well-kept grounds as well as learning of the Center's productivity.

Ranchers, seed producers farmers, and soil and water conservationists joined other interested citizens for tours conducted from 8:30 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. and again from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00. Guides were on duty as buses and wagons with portable bleachers made the rounds of plots and fields of grasses, shrubs, and forbs.

One of the highlights of the day's events was the address by guest speaker Harvey Davis, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

Davis told his audience of the splendid cooperation between the Soil Conservation Service and the Soil and Water Conservation District as they work evaluating new plants to solve vegetation problems. Since 1965 over 300 plantings on farms and ranches of the Soil Conservation Districts cooperatives have been made and include over 30,000 pounds of seed and 50 new plants, so it is easy to figure the terrific impact the Center has on agriculture, especially in Texas.

Present for the Field Day were such dignitaries as state conservationist for Texas Edward E. Thomas, the number one man in SCS, W.L. Vaughn, state conservationist for Oklahoma, C.A. Rechenbin, state resource conservationist of Texas, John Ann, state resource conservationist of Texas, Fred Fortney, state resource conservationist of Oklahoma, W.C. Young, re-

gional Plant Materials specialist in eleven southeastern states and Hubert Kelley, information specialist, SCS, from Washington, D.C.

According to Garrison, the Center is furnished seed varieties from a number of sources. He explained that an SCS worker may find one particular plant of a known variety which is producing better or withstanding weather pressure better than other plants and will take the time to gather a handful of seed. Or perhaps a grass in another nation might have production capabilities which interest an agronomist and he sends USDA officials a sample. Sometimes a state or federal agriculture agency feels a grass native to its area would do well

in Texas or Oklahoma and it is sent to the local center.

The seeds are planted in test plots and observed by center personnel. If promise is indicated in the new plant, the seeds are harvested and a larger plot is planted to increase the seed.

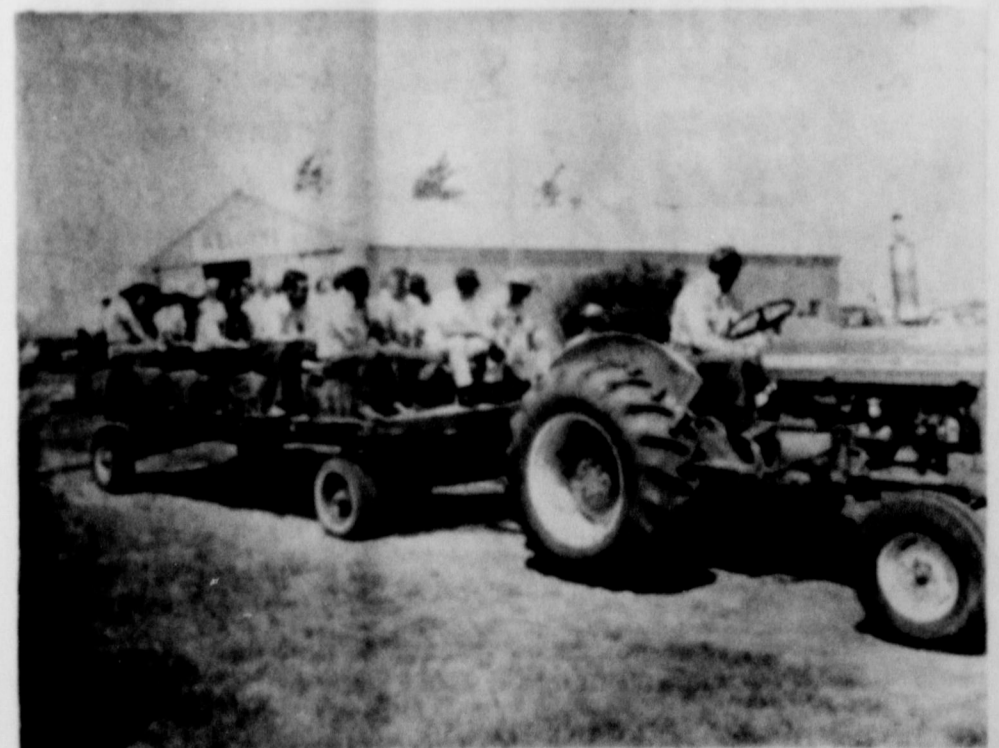
It then undergoes another close check for forage production and hardness to drought and freeze. If it still indicates promise it is increased again in planting quantity and enough seed is harvested to test on a ranch or farm location.

If the seed proves successful after this last trial, it is passed on to commercial seed growers and commercial seedsmen who produce seed for sale to the public and for rural use.

NOTICE AND INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS

ITEM 1

1. Sealed bids will be received by City of Knox City, Texas hereinafter referred to as the "Owner", for performing the work as set forth in the Plans and Specifications attached hereto for Wastewater Treatment Plant improvements on or before 2:00 p.m., Friday September 22, 1972 in the city Hall at Knox City, Texas, at which time said bids will be publicly opened and read.

2. All bids must be made on the blank form of the Proposal attached hereto.

3. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or bidder's bond payable to the Owner for five per cent of the total amount of the bid. As soon as the bid prices have been compared, the Owner will return the check or bond of all except the three lowest responsible bidders. When the contract is awarded, checks or bonds of the two remaining unsuccessful bidders will be returned. The check or bond of the successful bidder will be retained until the contract and surety bond have been executed and approved, after which it will be returned.

4. Separate performance and payment bonds for public bodies such in the amount of 100 percent of the contract price with a surety company (corporate) approved by the Owner and the

Engineer, will be required for the faithful performance of the contract, and the bidder shall state in the proposal the name and address of the surety of sureties who will sign these bonds in case the contract is awarded to him.

5. The party to whom the contract is awarded will be required forthwith to execute the contract and surety bonds within ten calendar days from the date when the written notice of award of the contract is mailed to the bidder at the address given by him. In case of failure to do so, the Owner may at his option, consider that the bidder has abandoned the contract, in which case the certified check or bidder's bond accompanying the Proposal shall become the property of the Owner.

6. The Owner reserves the right to reject any and all bids or to accept any bid. Contractors' Proposals shall hold firm for sixty days to allow the Owner to complete its financing arrangements and to secure necessary approvals for awarding contracts. Mutually agreed upon extensions of time, may be made, if necessary.

7. Before the award of the contract, any bidder may be required to furnish evidence satisfactory to the Owners and to the Engineer of the necessary facilities, ability, and pecuniary resources to fulfill the conditions of the said contract.

8. Prior to signing the contract, the Contractor shall submit to the Owners and the Engineer, an overall construction schedule for the project. This construction schedule shall start with the proposed date of signing the contract, and the completion date shall be the date specified in the contract.

9. Bidders must satisfy themselves by personal examination of the location of the proposed work, by examination of the Plans and Specifications and requirements of the work and the accuracy of the estimate of the quantities of the work to be done, and shall not at any time after the submission of a bid dispute or complain of such estimate nor assert that there was a misunderstanding in regard to the nature or amount of work to be done.

10. The Construction Contract and the Detailed Specifications contain the provisions required for the construction of the project. No information obtained from any officer, agent, or employee of the Owner on any such matters shall in any way affect the risk or obligation assumed by the Contractor or relieve him from fulfilling any of the conditions of the contract.

11. Proposals which are incomplete, unbalanced, conditional or obscure or which contain additions not called for, erasures, alterations, or irregularities of any kind or which do not comply with the Notice and Instructions to Bidders may be rejected.

12. A bidder may withdraw any proposal he has submitted at any time prior to the hour set for the closing of the bids provided the request for withdrawal is signed in a manner identical with the proposal being withdrawn. No withdrawal or modifications will be permitted after the hour designated for closing bids.

13. For the purpose of clarification it is understood that the work to be done will probably be financed in whole or part by means of funds secured from the Federal Government, or others. The bidder hereby agrees to comply with all requirements of the Federal agencies, or others.

14. Computations of quantities that will be the basis for payment estimates, both monthly and final will be made by the Engineer.

15. The word "Owner" means the City of Knox City, Texas. The Owner will be responsible for payment in accordance with terms of the contract. The word "Contractor" means the person, firm or corporation to whom the award is made. Sub-contractors as such will not be recognized. The word "Engineer" refers to Ernest L. Andrews, P.E., Consulting Engineer, designated by the Owner as its engineering representative during the course of construction to make appropriate inspections and computations of payments.

16. Plans and Specifications may be obtained from the Engineer, Ernest L. Andrews, 2015

Santa Fe, Wichita Falls, Texas, 76209, upon a deposit of \$25.00. Full amount of deposit will be returned to bidder returning plans and specifications along with a fully qualified bid. Only one-half of the amount of the deposit will be returned to bidder returning plans and specifications if fully qualified bid is not filed.

17. Inspection trips for bidders will be arranged by the Engineer.

18. Notice of Requirement for Certification of Non-segregated Facilities; Bidders are cautioned as follows: By signing the contract for which these bids are solicited, the bidder will be deemed to have signed and agreed to the provisions of the "Certification of Non-segregated Facilities" as contained in the specifications for this project.

19. Notice to Prospective Federally Assisted Construction Contractors:

(A) A certification of Non-segregated Facilities, as required by the May 28, 1968, order of F.J. 7908, May 28, 1968) on Elimination of Segregated Facilities by the Secretary of Labor, must be submitted prior to the award of a Federally assisted construction contract exceeding \$10,000 which is not exempt from the provisions of the Equal Opportunity Clause.

(B) Contractors receiving Federally assisted construction contract awards exceeding \$10,000 which are not exempt from the provisions of the Equal Opportunity Clause will be required to provide for the forwarding of this notice to prospective subcontractors for supplies and construction contracts where the sub-contracts exceed \$10,000 and are not exempt from the provisions of the Equal Opportunity Clause.

20. Non-discrimination in Employment:

Bidders on this work will be required to comply with the President's Executive Order No. 11246. The requirements for bidders and contractors under this order are explained in the specifications.

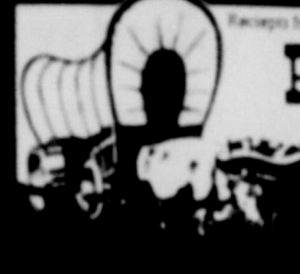

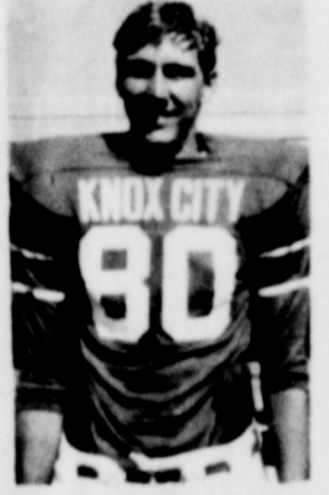

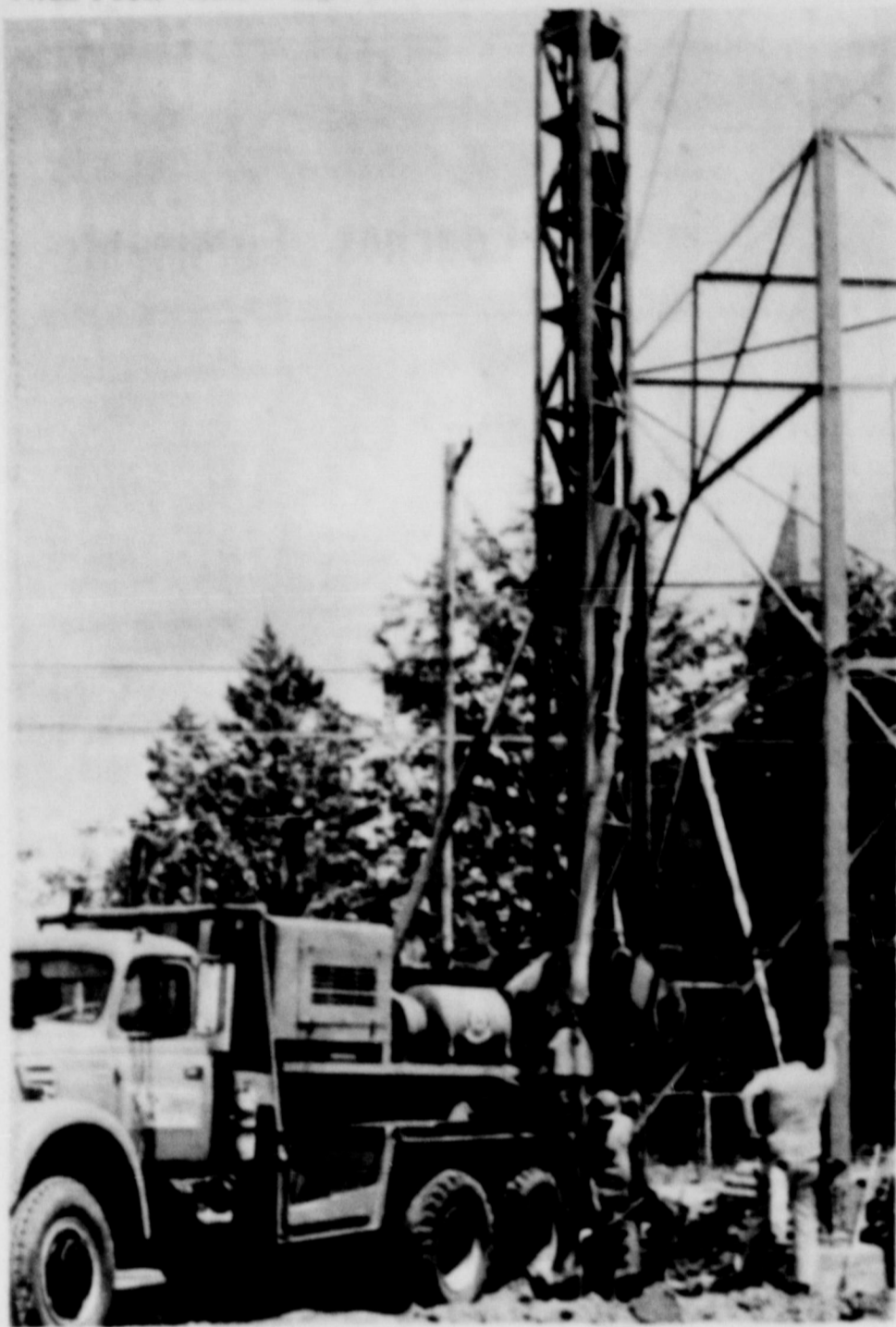

CONTRACTORS FOR GENERAL TELEPHONE are on schedule with the central office building expansion at 400 North Main in Seymour. Eight thousand sq. ft. of floor space are being added, including 2,000 sq. ft. of basement that have already been constructed. The microwave tower in the background will be raised to the top of the new building. One plus DDD service is scheduled for 17 towns in this area in 1974. The building is to be completed in February, 1973.

DDD Service Planned For KC And Area Towns

Plans to provide Haskell customers and other area towns with (1 + DDD) Direct Distance Dialing service were announced today by Gerald Kehoe, division manager for General Telephone.

Kehoe said starting in May, 1974, and continuing through July, 1974, the following towns will receive DDD: Seymour, Olney, Garrettsville, Knox City, Bonanza, Crowell, Asperment, Haskell, Rochester, Rule, Weisert, Throckmorton, Lovell, Jermyn, Magarzel, and Newcastle.

The first phase of building construction is underway at Seymour, and involves an \$8,000 sq.

ft. expansion to house new toll switching equipment and automatic ticketing equipment. In 1973, new exchange buildings will be constructed in Knox City, Munday, and Rule to house new central office equipment and provide for DDD equipment.

All other towns will require extensive equipment arrangements and additions. Much of the toll lines leading into Seymour will be replaced with underground cable.

Olney and Newcastle will be changed from the Graham toll center to the switching center in Seymour. Operator assistance will be furnished these

two towns by Seymour operators, Kehoe said.

The 1 + DDD equipment identifies the calling telephone number, times the call, and records this information for use in the billing and accounting procedures of the telephone company.

Although highly complex in design and construction, the equipment is relatively simple in the way it works.

When a caller picks up his receiver to make a 1 + DDD call, he dials the access code "1" which connects his telephone with an automatic recording device known as a "ticketer." This is comparable to the usual procedure of dialing a number to reach a long distance operator. He then dials the area code and telephone number.

From this point, the call is completed under the control of a computer which determines the route the call should take, and then transmits the electrical signals to direct the remote switching equipment.

Special civic club programs concerning DDD and the time schedule for the 17 towns will be available starting in 1974, by contacting the division office in Seymour, Kehoe said.

Testings are made at the Center using row crop type farming methods in order to reduce weed competition and to provide for irrigation when necessary. Heavy farming is necessary to insure rapid testing of new grass, forb and shrub.

Seeds tested at the Center this year include those having potential for use in range and pasture planting, critical areas, recreation and beautification projects, wildlife, and plants for watershed structures.

County Roadside Erosion Control Project Continues

Progress continues on the roadside erosion control project in Knox County, according to Arche Lieb of the Soil Conservation Service.

Lieb stated that recent heavy rains damaged several projects which had not been completed

long enough to get adequate grass cover established. He advised that producers who have completed projects should take steps to get a temporary cover of small grain established until grass can be seeded next spring.

Two projects have just been started on the Alonzo Cartwright farm and M-Bar ranch units are located south east of Munday.

The purpose of the project, started in January of this year, is to improve county roads, reduce water erosion, control silt pollution, and beautify the country side, Lieb said.

The pollution abatement project is a result of joint efforts by the Knox County Commissioners Court, Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District, Knox County Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Committee and the Soil Conservation Service.

County road equipment is being used for work needed on the roads and local conservation contractors are contracted to do necessary work on the landowners property.

To date 15 projects have been completed. Five have been designed and are ready for construction.

This special roadside project will aid in improving our county roads, aid our local economy as well as improve the property adjacent to the road.

Roadside project money is available through the Rural Environmental Assistance Act at 80 per cent cost sharing. Interested land owners should contact the ASCS or SCS office for assistance in obtaining needed help.

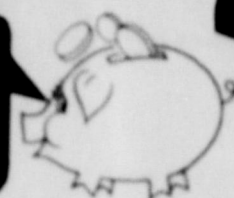
