

The seeds are planted in test plots and observed by center personnel. If promise is indicated in the new plant, the seeds are harvested and a larger plot


is planted to increase the seed. It then undergoes another close check for forage production and hardiness to drought and freeze. If it still indicates promise it is increased again in planting quantity and enough seed is harvested to test on a ranch or farm location.

If the seed proves successful after this last trial, it is passed on to commercial seed growers and commercial seedsmen who produce seed for sale to the public and for rural use.





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
