Grass Planting Time Is Here

by ARCHE LIEB, DISTRICT CONSERVATIONIST, SCS

The grass planting season in the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District is here. Many farmers in the district are already in the process of planting grass. The best time to plant grass is in March and April, but no later than June 1. Our spring rains usually occur in April and May and the grass seed, or sprigs need to be in the ground to take advantage of the moisture.

The seeding of native rangeland must be done immediately following seedbed preparation made by mechanical means such as rootplowing, treedozing, or rootraking. The seeding operation can be done during the seedbed operation by tractor mounted seeders, or with a grass drill following rootraking and burning of brush piles.

Pastures must be deferred following seeding until grass is well established if good results are to be obtained. Good examples of range seedings can be seen on the A.L. Cox ranch near Benjamin, on the Eugene Brown farm near Rhineland, and the Glenn McWhorter farm near Vera.

Landowners are advised to sprig Bermuda grass on grassed waterways and on critical areas. Bermuda grass should be sprigged in a moist firm seedbed. It is important that Bermuda spriggs be kept moist and protected from wind and sunlight between digging and sprigging opera-

The native grasses such as Sideoats grama, Switchgrass Green Sprangletop and should be seeded in a dead litter crop or mulch litter. Native grasses are planted very shallow and litter or mulch is needed to protect the young plants until a root system is extablished.

Grasses planted in cut areas such as waterways and critical areas should be fertilized. Soil tests in the Wichita Brazos SWCD show that about 30 pounds of nitrogen and 40 pounds of phosphorus per acre should be applied for proper establishment on most soils in the district.


The Knox City High School golf team played host to an eight team tournament at the Knox City Country Club on Wednesday, March 31. The local teams did very well, gaining first and third place

students came to the United States for a year's stay with a family and attendance at a high school.

The eager response, both

here and abroad, to these early exchange efforts provided the momentum for Youth for Understanding's expansion to other parts of the world. In 1955, the first American students were sent to Europe to live with families for the summer. Also in that year, the program spread to Scandinavia and other European countries. YFU bridged the Pacific in 1958 when the first students came from Japan. In 1958, Mexico became the first Central American country to participate and South American countries followed two years later.

As the program increased in size, it was decided in 1964. to incorporate YFU as a nonprofit educational organiza-

To win these rights, you Patriots of the thirteen struggling colonies fought the British Empire, a nation that had humbled both France and Spain. That was the line up. Almost everyone said it was crazy, but you did it. You built a nation and became heirs to a

From the very outset you stood up to British General Thomas Gage and his Redcoats. On March 5, 1770, they killed four Bostonians and wounded six in the street brawl historians call the 'Boston Massacre". It was John Hancock and Samuel Adams who were instrumental in their removal from the

Soon came the shocking news of the battle of Bunker Hill, June 17, 1775, Colonel William Prescott, though your troops lost the battle for the hill, yours was a victory in the spirits and hearts of your poorly armed soldiers who literally fired when they could 'See the whites of 'their eves". Two times you turned the Redcoats back before you

ran out of powder and bullets.

We, in 1976, stand taller when we read perhaps the proudest chapter of American Revolutionary history. It was during winter of 1777 and 1778 when General Washington led ten thousand troops into winter quarters at Valley Forge. Here the cause of Liberty was supposed to have been frozen, beaten, and starved to death. Instead, General Washington, your troops survived the bitter struggles of Monmouth. Strong Point. Ninety-Six, King's Mountain, and Yorktown. Then you came across the Potomac to ultimate victory and freedom.

In freedom's defense arose other great American heroes: Benjamin Franklin the diplomat, Patrick Henry the orator. Thomas Jefferson the statesman, Israel Putnam the rugged fighter, and Nathan Hale, who spoke the immortal words, "I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country". We consider the many humble farmers and mechanics who fought in the ranks great heroes also.

Great American Patriots from your revolution thirteen colonies became an empire. It is not by accident that our most cherished symbol, the Liberty Bell at Independence Hall, Philadelphia, is inscribed with the Biblical quotation: "Proclaim liberty throughout all the land into all the inhabitants thereof.' (Lev. XXV-10)

Honored Patriots, if there is a just vision of superhuman understanding reaching from your generation to mine, you will know what we mean when

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
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
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
