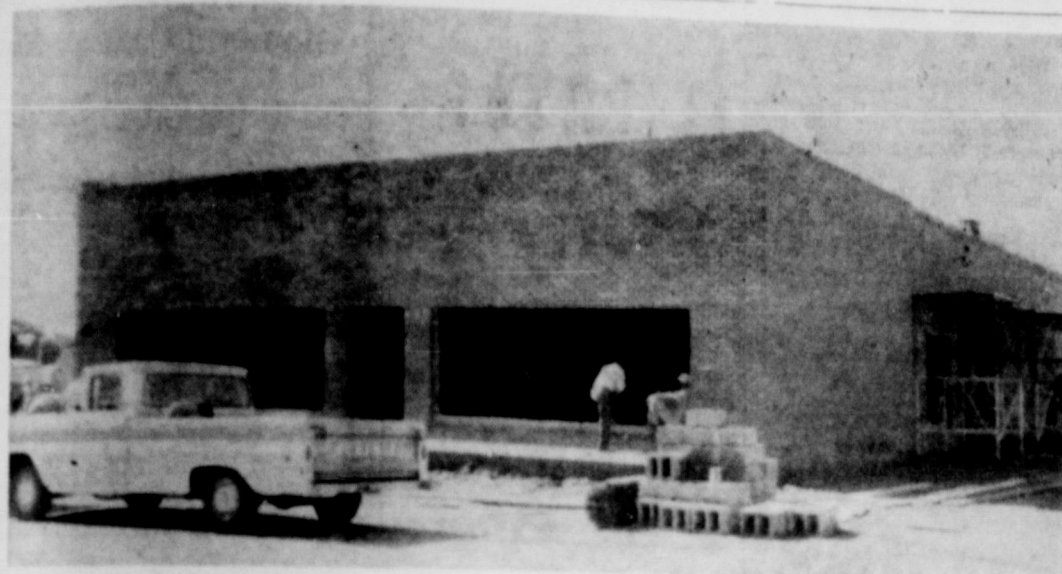

## Knox City Receives Five Days Of Rain; 2:51 In.

Knox City received 2.51 inches of rain from Friday night at 9 p.m. until 7:00 p.m. Tuesday. Weatherman Horace Finley has reported his weather chart as follows:

Saturday	0.16
Sunday	1.82
Monday	0.00
Tuesday	0.53

Although it DID rain for five days in a row, Weatherman Horace Finley said the rain gauges were read and emptied each evening at 7:00 p.m.

Although it rained here Friday, the rains came after 7 p.m. (9 p.m. to 11 p.m.) so the chart will show no rain on that date. The same thing is true of Monday.

High wind, rain and hail hit Knox City approximately at 2:30 p.m. Sunday. A tornado alert had been issued before the storm hit and the all clear whistle was blown at approximately 3:30 p.m. No damage was reported in the

city because of hail, and damage was slight to the farms in the immediate vicinity of Knox City. Most hail damage was reported north and east of the city with one farm reporting approximately 25 per cent damage to his crop. Most farmers were in agreement that the rains did more good than harm to their crops, despite the hail damage.

Cropland for most of the county was suffering from lack of moisture until the past weeks

rains. Reports from different parts of the county measure the rainfall from two inches to nearly four for the past week.

Wednesday showed promise of more rain, but later in the day the sun came through and most people believed the rains were over for a while.

With the exception of hail, this year has promised to be one of the best in the county's history—for wheat and cotton. So far, the rains came at the most opportune time for most of the county's farmers.

It is too early to tell how the average wheat crop will compare to years past, but the ones that missed the hail, were, for the most part, bumper crops.

## Council Gives Mayor Glenn Authority To Hire W. E. Lovelace As City Judge

Knox City's City Council held their regular meeting Monday night and below is the minutes of the meeting.

Presiding at the meeting was Mayor Guy Glenn with aldermen Otis Cash, Monty Penman, C. G. Markward, and A. T. Holcomb in attendance. Other councilman Vaughn Gruben was absent.

City Attorney Joe Reeder, Jr., was also in attendance.

Discussion on getting a city judge for the city was made.

Motion was made by Charles Markward and seconded by A. T. Holcomb for the mayor to have full authority to hire Mr. W. E. Lovelace to serve as City Judge.

All fines under \$4.00 goes to the judge. Any over \$4.00 goes to the city.

All voted in favor of the motion.

Motion was made by Monty Penman and seconded by Charles Markward to move the radio from the City Secretary's desk to the house of the Chief of Police, and move radio from upstairs downstairs.

All voted in favor of the motion.

## Four Injured In Two Accidents

Three persons suffered cuts and possibly other injuries about 4:45 a.m. Sunday when the car in which they were in hit a bridge one-half mile east of Goree on U. S. 277.

A man named Torres of Lockney was driver of the car. He apparently went to sleep at the wheel, Knox County Sheriff H. T. Melton said.

With Torres at the time of the accident were Alex Saenz and his sister, Esther Saenz, both of Knox City. The car belonged to Raymond Gonzales of Lockney.

All three were hospitalized at Knox County Hospital where they are reported in fair condition.

R. H. Garrard of Shreveport, La., suffered a broken leg in a truck-car accident seven miles east of Benjamin at 2 a.m. Saturday.

Garrard was driver of a 1961 Ford enroute from Roswell, N. M., to Wichita Falls.

Driver of the truck was Jeff Adair of Littlefield, who received no injuries. Both car and truck were a total loss.

## Minimum Fine Too High In Knox City

Knox City's new chief of police J. J. Hester has been kept fairly busy the past month writing warning tickets and issuing fines to speeders.

The Herald called upon Justice of the Peace J. G. Robin Wednesday to check the court docket, but the judge was ill.

In answer to the query of how many tickets were issued in the past month he replied, "13 or 14, and it could have been 15, I'm not sure," he said.

Speeding, the judge said, accounted for all but one or two of the fines.

A large number of warnings have also been received by vehicle operators.

Knox City has been in dire need of a city judge as the cheapest fine administered—\$1.—costs the recipient, \$20.50.

In other words, a double parking violation will cost the offender \$20.50 or he goes to jail. The law also gives 10 days for payment, though.

This is the way the \$20.50 is arrived: \$1.00 fine; arresting officer receives \$4.00; County Attorney receives \$10.00, and paper work, warrants, etc., take \$1.50, making a total of \$20.50.

If the Highway Patrol arrests a person his fine is \$4.00 less, as they are not allowed to receive extra pay for their work.

In their Monday meeting the city has authorized the mayor to hire a city judge.

In this way, the \$1.00 fine will be \$1.00, instead of \$20.50.

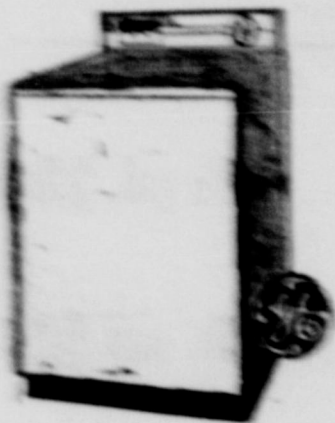

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# THE CAPITAL Highlights Sidelights

"But," said the governor, "if this is really what a majority of the people want, I don't see how I can go on fighting it."

He believes, however, that a very limited sales tax, which he terms "selective excise taxes," on only more expensive items, with the balance to be raised from gas pipeline taxes and increased interstate corporation franchise taxes, would be more fair and more acceptable to most Texans.

Only bill which came close to passing the Legislature was one in which the main money-raising feature was a retail sales tax on food, medicine and farm

items costing 25 cents and more, necessities exempted. It also levied increased gas and corporation franchise taxes. Speaker James Thurman cast the crucial vote that prevented the bill's being sent to the governor.

Actually, the difference between the governor and those voting for the sales tax "package" is mostly one of degree.

Governor Daniel grants the need for some sales (or excise) taxes, but feels that they should be stringently limited. A majority of the Legislature cast votes indicating they felt Texas has reached the point where only a broad-based "growth" tax, such as the sales tax, can raise enough money to meet the state's increasing needs.

Now it is the people's turn to say what they think. If enough speak up, the legislature will have little difficulty in deciding what to do when it reconvenes July 10.

At that late hour, getting broad agreement in the Legislature will be more important than passing a bill that suits the governor. Bills passed by only a simple majority cannot become effective until 90 days after the session ends, but bills passed by a two-thirds majority of both houses can take effect immediately. That late in the summer, the legislature will need to get a two-thirds vote for immediate effect so there will be money authorization to keep the state going after the new fiscal year begins Sept. 1.

And a two-thirds majority is also sufficient to override a governor's veto.

SENATE ALSO PASSED AN EQUALLY INEFFECTIVE \$810 A YEAR RAISE FOR school teachers before adjourning.

All was naught, however, when the tax bill failed to pass.

14 AMENDMENTS PROPOSED — Texas voters can get ready for a bumper crop of 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be on the November ballot in 1962.

Some of the amendments are of major importance; some are only local in effect and application. Among them are proposals to:

1. Increase maximum possible yearly payments to the permanently disabled from \$1,500,000 to \$2,500,000.
2. Allow the state water development board to purchase water storage space in reservoirs constructed by other units of government, such as the federal government.
3. Permit the Veterans Land Board to sell forfeited land to non-veteran buyers to liquidate land the state is "stuck with."
4. Authorize the Legislature to provide for "trial de novo" (trial anew) in appeals from decisions of state agencies.
5. Allow the Legislature to name successors to officials knocked out by a major catastrophe such as enemy attack.
6. Raise the present \$47,000,000 a year ceiling on public welfare payments to \$52,000,000.
7. Allow the Legislature to set up hospital district without a special constitutional amendment for each one.
8. Allow the Legislature to delegate to local government control of traffic, parking and sanitation on public beaches.

OIL ON TROUBLED WATERS — A number of lawmakers had their "backs up" before the governor made his statewide "report to the people" after the regular session closed. But the governor's message smoothed some feathers.

Many lawmakers expected Daniel to roast the Legislature for its failure to take care of money matters during the 140-day session. They had their hot replies all ready for press release.

Instead, Governor Daniel adroitly praised the lawmakers as one of the hardest working legislatures he had ever seen. He even singled out for kind words some leaders who had opposed his program.

It was those infernal lobbyists who were to blame, said the governor. He described hordes of lobbyists, choking the hallways and bothering members while they were in session.

Governor Daniel has announced that he will name a new citizen's committee to study the state's fiscal problems and make recommendations before the special session begins.

GRAND GESTURE — Before adjourning, the Senate gave approval to a \$2,600,000,000 general appropriations bill for the two years beginning Sept. 1.

But without passage of a money-raising bill to back it up, appropriations had no meaning.

Senate adopted the appropriations conference committee report — a plan that called for spending \$385,500,000 from general revenue, compared to the present \$320,000,000 general revenue appropriation. Welfare programs, the state hospital system, junior colleges and the state senior college and university system would be among the main beneficiaries.

NEW POWER FOR PROBERS — Future witnesses before legislative investigating committees can be compelled to tell the truth or face perjury penalties under a measure that passed both houses.


Last year the perjury conviction of former Insurance Commissioner J. Byron Saunders was voided by the courts on grounds the anti-perjury statute did not cover statements to legislative committees.

This bill spells out the right of legislative committees to make investigations and makes it a penal offense (two to ten years) to lie deliberately to such a committee.

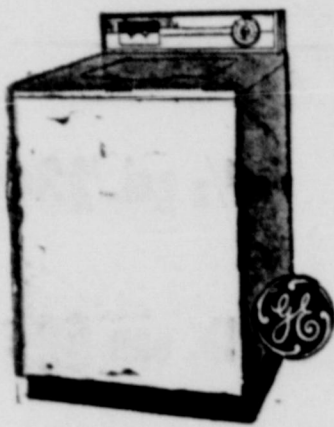

# THE CAPITAL Highlights Sidelights

"But," said the governor, "if this is really what a majority of the people want, I don't see how I can go on fighting it."

He believes, however, that a very limited sales tax, which he terms "selective excise taxes," on only more expensive items, with the balance to be raised from gas pipeline taxes and increased interstate corporation franchise taxes, would be more fair and more acceptable to most Texans.

Only bill which came close to passing the Legislature was one in which the main money-raising feature was a retail sales tax on food, medicine and farm

Items costing 25 cents and more, necessities exempted. It also levied increased gas and corporation franchise taxes. Speaker James Thurman cast the crucial vote that prevented the bill's being sent to the governor.

Actually, the difference between the governor and those voting for the sales tax "package" is mostly one of degree.

Governor Daniel grants the need for some sales (or excise) taxes, but feels that they should be stringently limited. A majority of the Legislature cast votes indicating they felt Texas has reached the point where only a broad-based "growth" tax, such as the sales tax, can raise enough money to meet the state's increasing needs.

Now it is the people's turn to say what they think. If enough speak up, the legislature will have little difficulty in deciding what to do when it reconvenes July 10.

At that late hour, getting broad agreement in the Legislature will be more important than passing a bill that suits the governor. Bills passed by only a simple majority cannot become effective until 90 days after the session ends, but bills passed by a two-thirds majority of both houses can take effect immediately. That late in the summer, the legislature will need to get a two-thirds vote for immediate effect so there will be money authorization to keep the state going after the new fiscal year begins Sept. 1.

And a two-thirds majority is also sufficient to override a governor's veto.

Senate also passed an equally ineffective \$810 a year raise for school teachers before adjourning.

All was naught, however, when the tax bill failed to pass.

**14 AMENDMENTS PROPOSED** — Texas voters can get ready for a bumper crop of 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be on the November ballot in 1962.

Some of the amendments are of major importance; some are only local in effect and application. Among them are proposals to:

1. Increase maximum possible yearly payments to the permanently disabled from \$1,500,000 to \$2,500,000.
2. Allow the state water development board to purchase water storage space in reservoirs constructed by other units of government, such as the federal government.
3. Permit the Veterans Land Board to sell forfeited land to non-veteran buyers to liquidate land the state is "stuck with."
4. Authorize the Legislature to provide for "trial de novo" (trial anew) in appeals from decisions of state agencies.
5. Allow the Legislature to name successors to officials knocked out by a major catastrophe such as enemy attack.
6. Raise the present \$47,000,000 a year ceiling on public welfare payments to \$52,000,000.
7. Allow the Legislature to set up hospital district without a special constitutional amendment for each one.
8. Allow the Legislature to delegate to local government control of traffic, parking and sanitation on public beaches.

**NEW POWER FOR PROBERS** — Future witnesses before legislative investigating committees can be compelled to tell the truth or face perjury penalties under a measure that passed both houses.

Last year the perjury conviction of former Insurance Commissioner J. Byron Saunders was voided by the courts on grounds the anti-perjury statute did not cover statements to legislative committees.

This bill spells out the right of legislative committees to make investigations and makes it a penal offense (two to ten years) to lie deliberately to such a committee.



**OIL ON TROUBLED WATERS** — A number of lawmakers had their "backs up" before the governor made his statewide "report to the people" after the regular session closed. But the governor's message smoothed some feathers.

Many lawmakers expected Daniel to roast the Legislature for its failure to take care of money matters during the 140-day session. They had their hot replies all ready for press release.

Instead, Governor Daniel adroitly praised the lawmakers as one of the hardest working legislatures he had ever seen. He even singled out for kind words some leaders who had opposed his program.

It was those infernal lobbyists who were to blame, said the governor. He described hordes of lobbyists, choking the hallways and bothering members while they were in session.

Governor Daniel has announced that he will name a new citizen's committee to study the state's fiscal problems and make recommendations before the special session begins.

**GRAND GESTURE** — Before adjourning, the Senate gave approval to a \$2,500,000,000 general appropriations bill for the two years beginning Sept. 1.

But without passage of a money-raising bill to back it up, appropriations had no meaning.

Senate adopted the appropriations conference committee report — a plan that called for spending \$385,500,000 from general revenue, compared to the present \$320,000,000 general revenue appropriation. Welfare programs, the state hospital system, junior colleges and the state senior college and university system would be among the main beneficiaries.

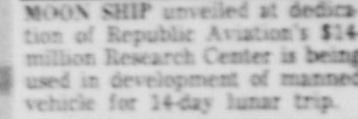

## IT'S THE LAW in Texas

ABSTRACTS

While driving around a lake, John and Mary saw a "For Sale" sign on a piece of lake property which they thought they could afford to buy.  
They made inquiries of the owner and agreed on a price. They inquired about a title and the owner assured them that he would give them an "abstract."

They took the abstract, which was a lot of papers, and the deed, filed the deed at the courthouse and thought no more about it, assuming as many people do, that an "abstract" is an assurance of good title.

Some years later they went to sell to a buyer who was better informed. He insisted that either the abstract be examined and an opinion given by an attorney that the title was good or that the seller must provide title insurance. When they sought an opinion as to whether the abstract showed good title they were dismayed to find that the title was not in good order, and that there would have to be a quiet title lawsuit to dispose of some flaws in the title before the buyer would accept it. Neither would a title insurance company write a policy of insurance for them without legal action to clear up the title.

John and Mary were astounded to learn that they were wrong in assuming that an "abstract" was an assurance of good title. An abstract is merely a record of every document which has ever been filed at record at the court house affecting the title to a particular piece of property. It may show good title or bad title, or no title at all. It is only a bundle of papers, as John and Mary discovered, which summarizes the state of the title. Its possession does not in any way assure good title.

Thus while one may be able to get possession and peacefully occupy a property with an abstract title, difficulties will arise when the property is to be sold or mortgaged. To do so is to call to judgment and perhaps increase the trouble and expense of clearing the title. It makes good sense to correct any title defects when you buy a property.

This necessitates, prepared by the State Bar of Texas, is written to inform—ask advice. No person should ever apply or interpret any law without the aid of an attorney who is fully advised concerning the facts involved, because a slight variance in facts may change the application of the law.
