Rogers' Knox Hounds will be trying to win their district for the fourth year Thursday at the District and field meet. ## Benjamin Has Storm Thurs.

Benjamin residents were warned by their storm signal about 5:00 o'clock last Thursday afternoon when a tornado was spotted by law officials southwest of town. Many barely had time to reach their cellars when the twister hit the southwest corner of the Benjamin School lifting the roof from the ag shop and doing roof damage to two other rooms in the school proper. Quite a bit of water damage was noted at the school, according to officials, but no estimate was given. Many TV antennas were downed and a new mobile home recently purchased by Sheriff H.C. Stone which had not been anchored down, was moved several feet from its blocks. Damage was also noted in the big storage tank at Chickasha Elevator as one side was caved in.

Knox City residents were also warned by the storm siren, but no notable damage was reported as the front moved through about 5:00 p.m., and a total of one and a half inches of precipitation was recorded as rain fell intermittently for several hours. High winds and sand accompanied the front.

A highlight of the meeting will be the election of one director by the association's membership to fill the place held by Lasater Hensley of Guthrie, who has declined renomination. Fred Neaves and Willard H. (Snooks) Williams, both of Spur, have been nominated to fill this vacancy.

According to R.C. Cobb, association's president, keynote speaker for both sessions of the meeting will be Norman Brints, Area Economist, Extension Service of Vernon.

The Angle Sisters, recurring artists of Knox City, will

provide entertainment at both sessions of the meeting.

Other program items include the report from the association's board by W.C. Mann. James N. Smith of Munday will give the nominating committee report. Mr. Cobb will give the president's report.

A meal for participants will follow the business session, which starts at 10:00 a.m. Attendance prizes will be awarded at each session to those whose names are drawn. All stockholders and their wives are eligible for participation in the awarding of prizes.

## All-Out Effort Underway To Locate KC Doctor

Despite black clouds, tornado warnings, and a steady downpour of much-needed rain, 53 persons turned out for the important meeting held here last Thursday night in the school auditorium to organize various committees to help in the Knox County Hospital District's attempt to find a doctor to replace Dr. R.G. Howell, who is closing his practice May 31 after 13 years in Knox City.

Not only were persons from Knox City invited to attend but all persons in Knox County as well as the neighboring towns of O'Brien and Rochester, just over the line in Haskell County, because "they, too, use the Knox County Hospital," Glen Rumley, hospital administrator said.

The search began several months ago to locate another doctor to help Dr. Howell, but since his announcement that he would close his practice here, the hospital board has been intensifying its efforts to find another doctor to come here.

Joe Reeder Jr., local lawyer, served as moderator for the town meeting and told the interested group of persons that it must be a team effort, both in time and money, to secure another physician.

Mr. Rumley reported on the steps that had been taken thus far and reported that he had just returned from Springfield, Missouri, where

he and board member Richie Smith of Munday had gone to interview a prospective replacement for Dr. Howell. The physician and his wife are due in Knox City this weekend to "look over" the situation, he said.

A steering committee was named to represent the group and also to name other committees at a Tuesday night meeting at the hospital.

Steering committee members include Glen Rumley, Joe Reeder Jr., Bruce Campbell Jr., W.R. Baker, Hob Smith, and Martha Jones, all of Knox City; Mrs. Stanton Brown, Benjamin; Mrs. Grady Ellis, O'Brien; R.A. Shaver Jr., Rochester; R.C. Daniel, Truscott; Arnold Navratil, Gilliland; Claudell Bratcher, Vera; Charles Baker, Munday; Mrs. John L. Lambeth, Goree; and Leo Fetsch, Rhineland.

Named Tuesday night to head the steering committee were Rumley, chairman;

Reeder, first vice chairman; Campbell, second vice chairman; and Suzie Ray, secretary.

Named to the all-important finance committee were Lee Smith of Knox City, W.O. Smith of Munday, and Mrs. R.A. Shaver III of Rochester.

Members of the steering committee will meet again next Monday night at 7:30 o'clock in the hospital dining room, Mrs. Ray said.

Having a doctor in the town is more than a desire, according to the administrator. He said that it actually could be a "matter of life or death" to persons in the hospital's drawing area, which covers more than a few towns in neighboring counties, as well as Knox County.

Estimates are that about 6,000 persons are potential patients for the Knox County Hospital, and certainly there is enough patient load here to justify two doctors, Rumley said.

## Three Churches To Hold Time Ceremony

While the rest of the U.S.A. changes their clocks from standard to daylight time at 2:00 a.m. Sunday, April 25, three participating churches in Knox City are requesting their members to wait until Sunday after church to make the time change. It is an attempt to encourage Sunday School attendance rather than to let government decree do its usual harm with a missing hour every spring, the Rev. Paul Anderson explained.

The churches will close their services by observing

together a time change ceremony where all of the watches are advanced together.

According to Rev. Anderson, First Baptist Church pastor, at least one church (O ye of little faith) is going to have coffee ready for anyone who may miss this message and come by the new time.

Anderson said, "Leave those clocks alone Saturday night. Get a full night's sleep and come to Sunday School and worship by the old time like you usually do."

The participating churches include the Foursquare Church, the First Christian Church, and the First Baptist Church.

The First United Methodist Church chose not to participate in this as will be noted in another story elsewhere in this week's News.

## Methodist To Observe DST

The First United Methodist Church has declined the offer to participate in the time change Sunday at the conclusion of the morning worship service as the First Baptist Church, the Foursquare Gospel Church, and the First Christian Church are planning to do.

According to the Rev. James Patterson, Methodist pastor, the Council of Ministries voted to go along with the 2:00 a.m. time change Sunday morning and hold services by Daylight Central Savings Time instead.

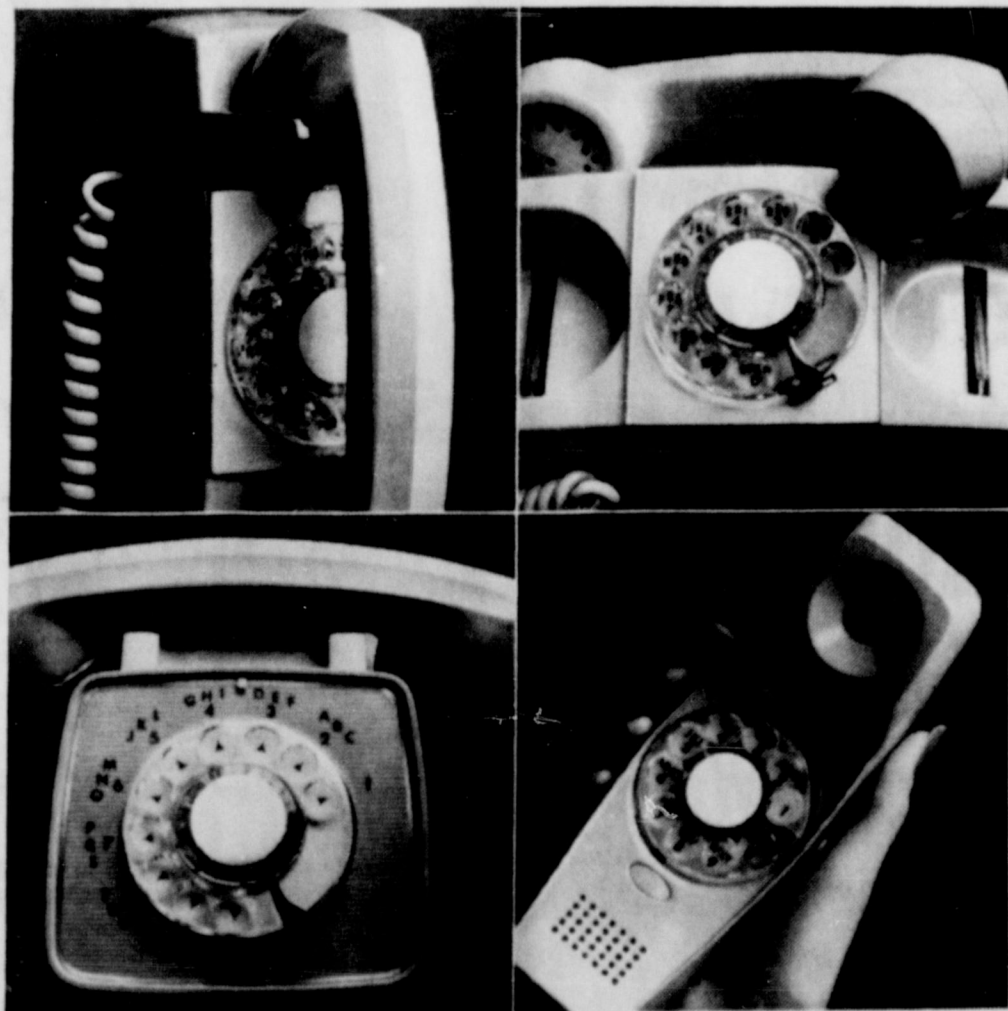

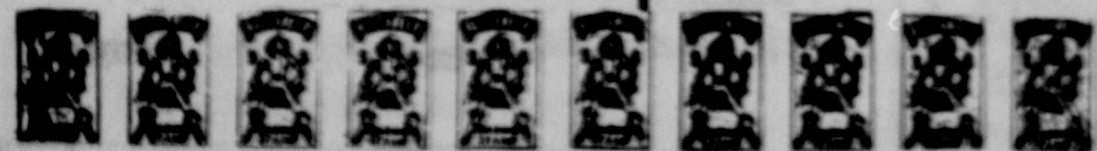
