G.E.D. Test Slated at Rule

The General Educational Development (GED) test will be given at 8 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 4, at Rule High School. Registration fee is \$10. Students may contact Irene Stewart, director, or school superintendent Lavon Beakley for information. Those who pass the test will qualify for a high school equivalency diploma issued by the Texas Education Agency.

Cotton Harvest Below Normal

Due to the lateness of the crop and the absence of a killing frost only a small amount of cotton has been harvested so far in the area serviced by the Munday Cotton Classing Office, reports Shirley A. Sewell, Officer-In-Charge. According to the USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service, 494 samples were processed this past week, compared to 34,300 samples by the same date last year.

Quality statistics for the week ending Nov. 19, 1971, show 26 percent of the cotton classed was Strict Low Middling, 16 percent was Middling Light Spotted, 16 percent was Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, and 20 percent was Low Middling Light Spotted. The predominant staple lengths showed 16 percent 32's, 20 percent 33's, 32 percent 34's and 16 percent 35's.

The micronaire readings were reasonably good with 8 percent reading 3.4 and below, 88 percent reading in the desirable range of 3.5-4.5, and 4 percent reading 5.0 and above. There has been very little market activity due to the small amount of cotton that has been harvested.

Coaches' Comments

Basketball season is here! Both high school and grade school teams saw action last week as our season officially opened. Our Varsity and Jr. Varsity boys were nosed out by Crowell last week. Certainly we would have liked to begin the season with two victories but we saw a determined effort by both our teams and just cause for a lot of enthusiasm and optimism for the rest of the year.

You probably noticed we were two platooning on the varsity, with each group playing approximately four minutes each. There are several reasons behind this type of play. None of our boys are in good enough condition to play a sustained length of time without getting tired, so this gives us fairly fresh players in the game at all times. Also it allows the coaches ample opportunity to see all our players perform and enable us to better decide who will eventually be our starting five.

Naturally it's a healthy situation with regard to competition and player interest. Our starting five will probably be chosen in mid-December and we will stop platooning at that time. However, I do plan to substitute frequently because we do have a lot more depth this year. In general our boys are much further along at this point than they were last year. For our opening game I felt we made a minimum of errors.

The fact that we hit an icy cold 29 percent from the floor hurt us. But this is expected to a certain degree in the early season. Our stress this year is to be on defense and the Hounds

will be attempting to give up an average of only 50 points per game. Last year we gave up 60 points per game and scored for an average of 45 points per game. We tend to overlook the importance of good defense in basketball and be more concerned with flashy offensive play. But if the opposition doesn't score they can't beat you.

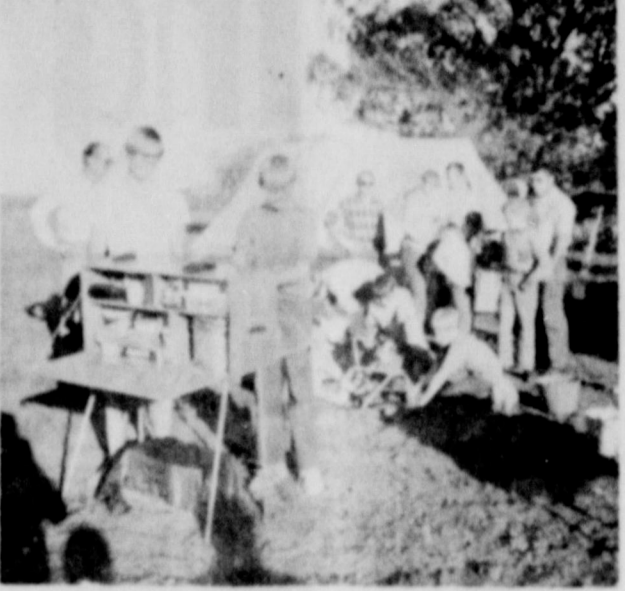

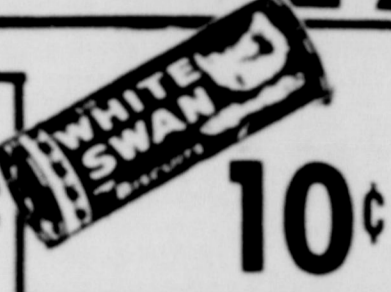

recently completed a study of natural salt pollution control of the Brazos River Basin.

The Brazos River Authority commended the Corps of Engineers for its thorough study of the natural salt pollution of the Brazos and for the remarkable improvement in water quality which will result from implementation of the plan developed in the Corps' study.

The Brazos River Authority concurred wholeheartedly in selection of the four reservoir plan regarded by the Corps as the most favorable of the various alternatives developed for alleviating the natural salt pollution of the Brazos River, and the Authority urged that this plan be recommended to the Congress for authorization and funding at the earliest practicable date.
