Bond Assumption, Tax Election To Be Held Saturday

A combined Bond Assumption Election and Tax Election will be held in the Knox City School District Saturday, because of the recent consolidation of the Knox City and Brock districts.

Propositions to be submitted are whether the district shall assume the bonded indebtedness of the old Knox City district, before consolidation, and whether or not the school board shall be empowered to levy a maintenance tax not to exceed \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation.

School Board President Barney Arnold emphasized that such elections are always required by law following consolidations, and there will be no tax increase in the Knox City district. In a bond election last year the board was empowered to levy a tax of \$1.50, but has held to a levy of \$1.25 and will continue to do so.

The tax rate in the old Brock district was set at \$1.00, but only a 60-cent levy had been used.

Voting for the Knox City east box will be at the American Legion Hall, with G. D. McCarty as presiding judge, and polling place for the west precinct will be at Egenbacher Implements. Voters in the Brock Community will use the box at Egenbacher Implements.

VETERAN FARM PURCHASE PLAN MAY BE EXPANDED

Bascom Giles, chairman of the Veterans Land Board, expects at least 5,000 applications for the purchase of farms by veterans within 90 days, if the land program is extended by the vote of the people on November 13.

The amendment to be voted on, if approved, will increase the appropriation of \$75,000,000 in addition to the \$25,000,000 approved three years ago.

Under the original plan, with \$25,000,000 appropriated, Mr. Giles advises that 4,000 veterans have purchased land costing up to \$7,500 each with a five percent down payment and forty years to pay, at 3 percent interest. Of these, 46 have already paid off their loans from sides using the land for farm- every eight is receiving some payment for mineral rights besides using the land for farming.

Hundreds of applications are now being held in abeyance because the original revolving fund of \$25 million was exhausted six months ago. The proposed additional \$75 million, it is estimated, will provide for 25,000 more veterans. The loans are repaid at a rate not exceeding \$25 per month on each loan.

In the long run this program will not cost the state anything and perhaps will make a small profit, Giles believes, because the veteran pays the loan or purchase price back to the state with 3 percent interest, and the money only costs the state at about 1.7 percent.

FUNERAL AT BENJAMIN FOR FRED L. BROWN

Funeral services were held at the Baptist Church at Benjamin Wednesday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock for Fred L. Brown, 66, who died in the Knox County Hospital Monday following a heart attack.

Mr. Brown had been a resident of Benjamin for 30 years. He was employed by the railroad until he went into the grocery business five years ago. He recently sold his grocery business and was operating a tourist court in Benjamin.

Besides his wife, he is survived by one daughter, Mrs. C. O. Phillips of Birmingham, Ala., and two granddaughters.

Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 Myrtle White, a mile east of town, was at 4440 feet this morning, and operators are expecting to encounter the Strawn formation soon. No lime was encountered in the Palo Pinto section.

Stanolind has staked the No. 2 J. W. Howell estate, a 4700-foot Palo Pinto Reef test 467 feet from the south and east lines of 378.77 acres in the west half of sub-division No. 7, survey No. 6, D. G. Burnett survey 6 1-2 miles northeast of town.

The company has also staked the No. 1 Herman Egenbacher, et al. 467 feet out of the northwest corner of the Egenbacher 160 acres, south of the Travis tract.

"And whatsoever we ask, we receive of Him, because we keep His commandments, and do those things that are pleasing in His sight." 1 John 3:22.

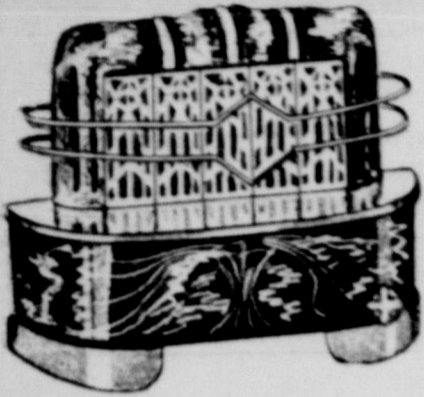

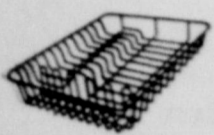
