### Sample Receipts Heavy

Sample receipts continued to be heavy as favorable weather allowed harvesting to continue at maximum capacity in the area serviced by the Munday Cotton Classing Office, reports Sidney Ferrell, Officer-in-Charge. According to the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, gathering operations are approximately 70 percent complete.

Quality statistics for the week ending Dec. 29, 1972, remained about the same as the previous week. Eighteen percent of the cotton was classed as Strict Low Middling (41), compared to 16 percent last week. Twelve percent was Low Middling (51), and 43 percent was Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42). Eighteen percent of the cotton classed was reduced in grade due to bark or grass, compared to 20 percent the previous week. The staple length showed 12

percent staple 30, 45 percent staple 31, and 38 percent staple 32.

The micronaire readings continue to be reasonably good with 79 percent reading in the desirable range of 3.5-4.9. Twenty percent read 5.0 and above.

The Pressley fiber strength tests conducted by the USDA's fiber laboratory at College Station, shows that the average strength was 78,000 pounds per square inch, unchanged from the previous week.

## REAP Program Ended

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Nixon administration, with no advance warning, last Friday ended two popular conservation programs specified by Congress to pump more than \$200 million a year into rural areas.

The Agriculture Department disclosed Tuesday that notices to state offices were sent out Dec. 22, ending the long-standing Rural Environmental Assistance Program and a year-old Water Bank Program intended to help preserve migratory waterfowl areas.

"These two programs are among those selected after a review of federal programs to identify those of low priority that can be reduced or eliminated without serious economic consequences", the department said.

Congress specified \$225.5 million for the assistance program in 1973, including pay-

ments to farmers for carrying out conservation and antipollution measures on their land.

The Water Bank Program aimed at preserving wetlands for ducks and other migratory water fowl, was authorized at up to \$10 million a year.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service said it notified state offices Dec. 22 to terminate both programs immediately and to pass the cancellation order on to county units by phone if necessary.

Officials said Tuesday, in formally announcing the action, the payments under the two programs are no longer necessary because farmers can afford to do the work themselves. Under the assistance program, which dates from the mid-1930s, farmers can collect from the government about half the cost of carrying out

approved conservation measures on their land.

The Water Bank Program was created in 1971 to help landowners in designated areas preserve waterfowl habitats.

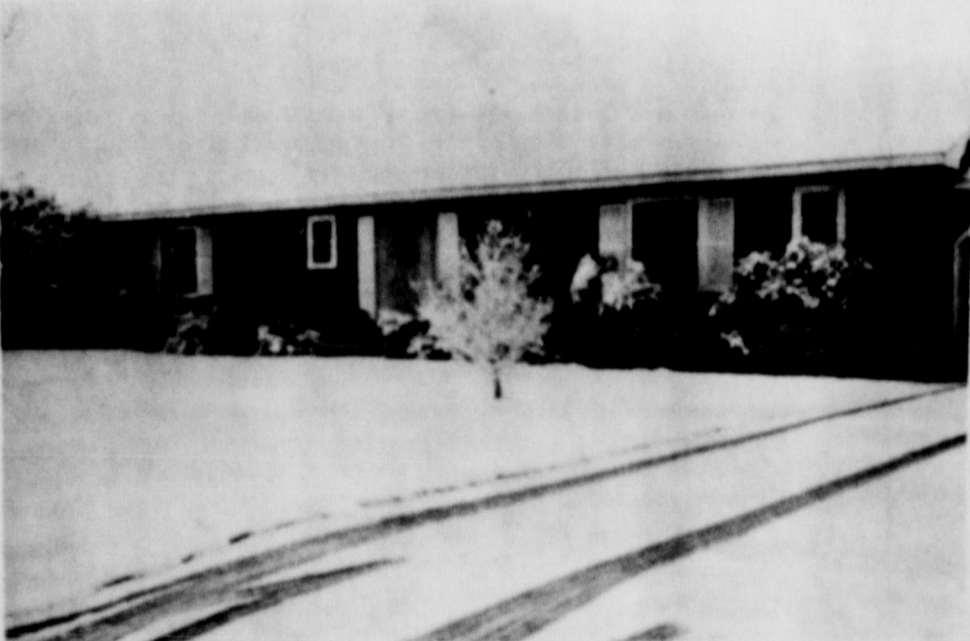
"Realized net farm income in 1972 will reach an all time high of nearly \$19 billion," the department said.

"In view of this, and because of the general acceptance and profitability of certain practices, it is believed farmers will continue to implement a significant number of them without supplemental income from the federal government."





### Farm and Ranch News

PLANT HOME LANDSCAPE NOW

Winter hardy plants can be planted in most of Texas during the late fall and winter so as to develop a good root system by next summer.

In areas where the soil may freeze, it's important to water plants, especially evergreens. Drying winds and cold can quickly dehydrate evergreen plants, causing leaf burn or even death if prolonged over a period of time.

Newly planted trees and shrubs should be staked as high winds can loosen the roots and ball of surrounding soil, causing air pockets and broken feeder roots.

Homeowners are advised not to fertilize at planting time but to wait until the tree has had a chance to become established for a growing season. Over fertilizing the first year is one of the major causes of initial plant loss.

When selecting landscape plants, be sure to look for freeze damage. Plants growing in containers that have been exposed to prolonged cold may appear healthy but can actually be damaged. Freeze damage sometimes can be identified by splitting bark on limbs and trunks of the plant.

Since container plants have their roots more exposed to cold than those in the ground, a mulch such as dried grass clippings, hay, leaves, pine bark, cane pulp or similar

material is recommended. Mulches are beneficial during both the winter and summer as they prevent fast changes in temperature and moisture conditions in the root zone of the plant.

Many nurseries and garden centers have a larger selection of plants and often at more reasonable prices at this time of the year. Also, nurserymen and garden center personnel are generally less rushed during the fall and winter seasons.

WINTER CARE FOR HORSES

Don't neglect your horse just because it's winter and you aren't riding it. Adequate nutrition and a parasite control program are important during the winter months.

Young horses, especially those weaned this fall, need special attention because they are still growing and need an adequate ration to help them mature.

If good quality hay is fed, grain may not be needed. Dust-free leafy legume hay (alfalfa or clover) is a good feed for wintering horses. However, it's a good idea to feed a grain supplement with grass hay or other low energy hay.

Internal parasites, especially strongyles (blood worms) and bots are damaging during winter months. Such parasites can cause horses on a borderline

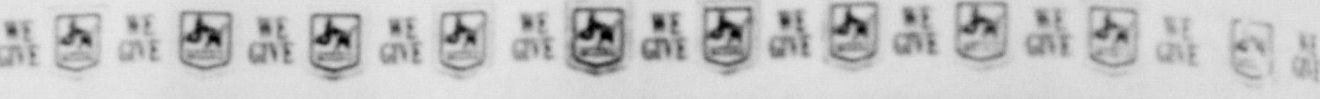

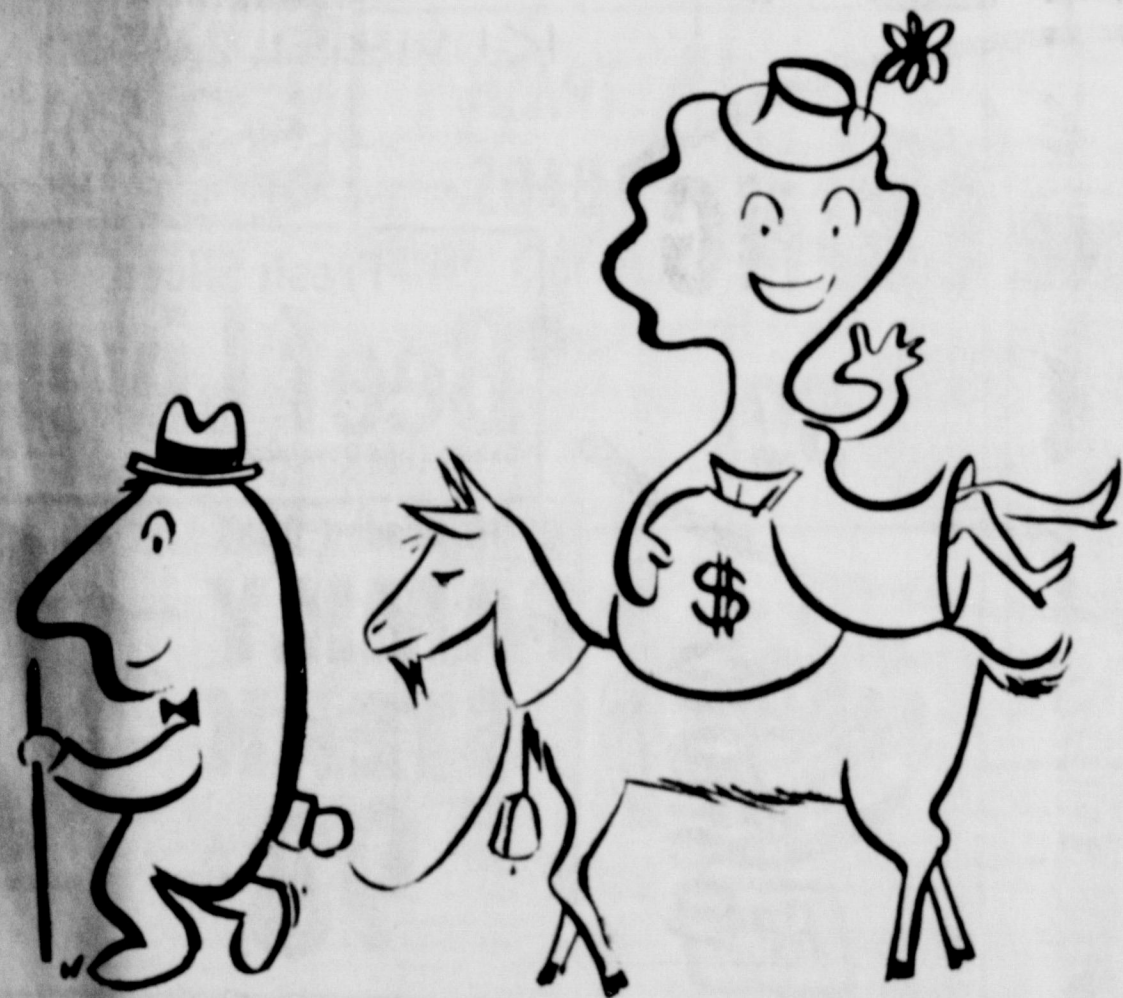

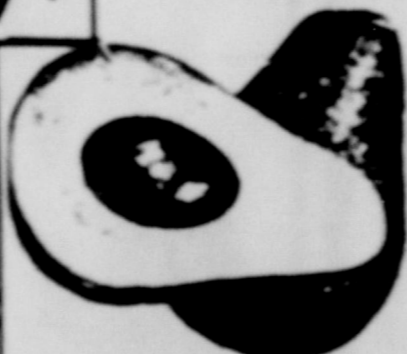
