#### **Funeral Services** Held For Miss Clara Cutbirth At Dudley

Funeral services for Miss Clara Cutbirth 23, of Dudley, who was killed in/a car wreck near Baird Monday morning, were held at the Bapist Church at Dudley Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock with Rev. Dick Bright, veteran Baptist minister of Potosi, conducting the rites. Burial was made in the Dudley cemetery beside the graves of her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Cutbirth, who died within ten days of each other during the flu epidemic in the fall 1918 e was born near Dudley Dec. 16 With her older sister, Pansy, now Mrs. Don Young and her brother Ray, she was taken into the home of J. E. and Miss Annie Cutbirth brother and sister and great uncle and aunt of the Cutbirth children who reared them in their home.

Miss Cutbirth is survived by her sister, Mrs. Young and brother, Ray Cutbirth, who is in the air and the aged uncle and aunt.

The accident which took the lives of Miss Cutbirth and Mr. Kinney occured at about 12:15 Monday morning near the Hutchisen lauch one mile east of Baird on highway 80, when athe coupe in which they were traveling east hit a guard rail post at a bridge and turned upside down in a creek where the water was about four feet deer. Mr. Kinney was driving the car at the time of the accident.

W. O. Wylie Jr., of the Wylie Functal Home who was called to the stene, estimated that the vic tims were under water about 45 minutes before he and JohnSimons of Abilene, were able to free them from the wreckage, their efforts being delayed by having to turn he car upright. #### New Texas Seed Law Baird Bears Play Will Protect

were issued at the local A A A will help eliminate one of the hazards of farming, that is questionable seed, according to J. E. McDonald, State Commissioner of Agriculture. The law requires that all seed offered for sale for planting or sewing purposes must be tagged, giving commonly accepted name, germination percentage mechanical purity and other information. Thus, farmers will be able to buy seed for planting purposes without taking risks as to its actual value:

"The use of good seed is a vitally important factor in any farm production program, states a phamplet on the new law issued by J. E. McDonald Commissioner of Agriculture and Linden Jones Chief of the Seed Laboratory Division. "If the farmer will will plant seed of known quality, more more uniform stands will be obtained resulting in a substantially increase income for our farm families."

Does Not Restrict Sales There, is nothing in the Act to prevent one farmer from selling to another farmer seed grown on his farm when such seed is not advertised in the public press out side the vendor's county, and not shipped by common carrier.

If the farmer leaves an sonsign ment or sells planting seed to a merchant, processor or seed dealer in his home county, the dealer is required to have the seed easted and tagged before it is offered or exposed for sale.

Anyone shipping seed to other states must comply with the esed laws of the state into which such shipments are made. "The Texas State Department of Agriculture will be glad to furnish shipper with information as to the noxious weeds of other states and will make free examination of such seed to find if any noxious weeds are present in their shipments, McDonald said.

## Is Classified as a "National Defense Utility"\_

This Company is serving Camp Barkeley, Abilene; Goodfellow Field, San Angelo; Bruce Field, Ballinger; Arledge Field, Stamford; Victory Field, Vernon; and other associated and cooperative projects, all of which are defined as National Defense Premises.

The Company, therefore, is classified as a National Defense Utility, and its property is protected by an Act of the Congress of the United States (Chapter 926-3D, Session 76 Congress) approved April 20, 1918; and Texas Labor-Violence Law (H. B. 800) passed by the Legislature on April 4, 1941.

Section 5 of the Federal Law reads as follows:

"That whoever, with intent to injure, interfere with, or obstruct the national defense of the United States, shall wilfully injure or destroy, or shall attempt to so injure or destroy, any national-defense material, national-defense premises, or national-defense utilities, as herein defined, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment not more than ten years, or both.'

Section 1 of Texas H. B. No. 800 reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person by the use of force or violence, or threat of the use of force or violence, to prevent or to attempt to prevent any person from engaging in any lawful vocation within this state. Any person guilty of violating this Section shall be deemed guilty of a felony and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by confinement in the State Penitentiary for not less than one (1) year nor more than two (2) years."

Section 2 of Texas H. B. No. 800 reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person acting in concert with one or more other persons to assemble at or near any place where a 'labor dispute' exists and by force or violence prevent or attempt to prevent any person from engaging in any lawful vocation, or for any person, acting either by himself or as a member of any group or organization, or acting in concert with one or more other persons, to promote, encourage, or aid any such unlawful assemblage. Any person guilty of violating this Section shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by confinement in the State Penitentiary for not less than one (1) year, nor more than (2) years."



The Callahan County A A A office has been advised by the State office that November 30, 1941, is the closing date for accepting requests for 1942 new grower wheat

allotments. Farmers who have not planted any wheat for harvest during 1939 1940 and 1941, but desire to plant wheat for the first time in 1942 are considered new growers. The acreage which new growers will receive is taken from a county reserve, which in most cases, represents approximately 3 percent of the county allotment.

All farms receiving wheat acreage allotments for the first time this year, regardless of the size of the acreage, will be classified as non-allotment farms. DON'T LET THE BORERS RUIN YOUR PEACH TREES

Now is the time to start some action against the peach trees borers. Our Extension Entomologist, Cameron Siddall, gives the following suggestions:

Paradichlorobenzene Method -No preparation of the soil is neccesary except to break the crust for 15 to 18 inches around the tree and to remove any grass and weeds. PDB crystals should be placed in a circle around the tree, about three inches from the base. For mature of average size, 1 oz. by weight should be used; for unusually large trees an ounce and a half is sometimes needed; for trees four to five years old, 3-4 of an nounce; and for trees one to three years of age, 1-2 ounce, or sightly less, should be used, Immediately after the crystals have been applied, they should be covered with several shovelfuls of dirt, and the dirt packed with the back of the shovel to make a cone mound. The material should be applied between October 20 and November 5. After about six weeks the mound of earth should be torn down and the residue of crystals removed.

#### HOW TO FERTILIZE YOUR YOUR ORCHARD

Commercial fertilezers will be higher in 1942 Home grown fertilizer in the form of vetch, clover, oats or rye are cheaper ways of adding plant food. In East Texas apply 50 to 100 lbs. of superphosphate per acre and sow 20 t 30 lbs. per acre of vetch. In Central Texas giant burr clover or rye may be used, and in West Texas oats, wheat or rye is suggested. There is moisture aplenty now. Let's get these crops planted.
