Grant Approved For Emergency Services

The West Central Texas Emergency Medical Services System has just received word from the Texas Department of Health Resources in Austin that its grant from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has been approved. The grant went into effect July 1, 1977. This is the third year that the 19-county WCT EMSS has received federal funds to upgrade its system.

The EMSS will receive a sizeable portion of the \$300,000 grant. The rest of the grant will be used in Austin for the operation and support of the WCT area.

The goal of this EMSS grant is the progression of the Basic Life Support System in West Central Texas, to an Advanced Life Support System.

The first two grants have been used to form the foundation of this Advanced Life Support System.

West Central Texas EMSS will achieve this progression by nurse and paramedic training, by the improvement of hospital critical care capabilities and patient flow, by improvement of communications, and by the development of a Poison Information Center at Hendrick Medical Center.

Area Men Recognized During Stamford Events

A Knox City man, L.R. Wooley, and an area resident, Son Propps, who manages a ranch for J.J. Gibson near Guthrie, were both featured in articles in the Abilene Reporter-News over the weekend in connection with the Texas Cowboy Reunion in Stamford.

Wooley made the first Texas Cowboy Reunion in 1930 and can't recall missing the trip on a consecutive year basis since 1950. Propps won the Oldtime Fiddlers Contest after entering the contest only twice and won \$50 in the contest.

Born close to Waco in the town of Marlin, Wooley recalled the date as the 27th day of January, eighteen and ninety-six.

Wooley, who has always known the working man's life, said his dad worked on farms and the railroad.

"We came out to Knox County in a covered wagon in 1901...there were eight to 10 wagons in the wagon train," Wooley remembered.

Besides his mother and father, Wooley said there was one brother "and four sisters -- two of them older on the trip."

The cowboy's oldest sister, Mary Evans, 85, is still living back in Marlin.

Knox County was "pretty open country" when the Wooley wagon arrived.

"My dad worked on the railroad north of Benjamin in 1901 and the coyotes were thick as jackrabbits," Wooley said.

Wooley started farm and ranch work seriously at 16.

For a long time, he worked on the Hamilton Ranch at Benjamin. The cow puncher worked for the O.L. Jamison ranch both farming and working cattle for 20 more years at Knox City, and in East Texas and Colorado.

The better half of Wooley's life is his wife of "53 years come July 26." Ila Wooley, the former Ila Masburn, a Stith native, recalled with her husband, "We were married in 1924."

Just like it should be for a cowboy, the Wooleys had three boys. "We had to keep the cowboys going," Wooley said.

However, not all cowboy sons always want to be cowboys...no matter how much of a cowboy their father is. This was the case with the oldest son.

Wilson Wooley "doesn't do any cowboy work," his

father says. "He would rather trade cars and things like that...he's doing real good as a loan collector today in Springer, Oklahoma."

Wooley said he's proud of all his sons and is glad each is doing what they did successfully. And two did make cowboys.

Today, Marshall Wooley, the youngest son, is a state brand inspector in Colorado Springs while William (Bill) Wooley, the middle son, is a "darn good ranch hand" on an East Texas ranch at Leonard.

"We have nine grandchildren at last count," Wooley said.

Propps entered the contest for the second consecutive year and apparently learned a lot from one experience.

It's not that Propps just learned to play the fiddle. He's been doing that ever since he was a kid and he'll be 65 in September. It's just that the fiddling contest is held each year at the same time as the Oldtime Cowboy Calf Roping contest and Propps doesn't want to miss that.

"I had started out the door to get my pickup," he said, when the announcer said he had won.

"I don't plan to ever quit fiddling or cowboying," he said. "I don't want Social Security."
