

The Knox City Volunteer Fire Department was doing its very best Monday afternoon to answer a fire alarm. and finally found the blaze. A long-distance operator

was notified Monday afternoon about 2:00 o'clock that the Baptist parsonage was on fire. The operator said the woman failed to identify herself and hung up before she could get any further information. In relaying the call, the operator assumed the fire was in Knox City and promptly called the fire station at City Hall.

City secretary Fave Railsback reported that the truck went immediately to the local Baptist parsonage and as there was no fire there, made a hurried check on the O'Brien Baptist parsonage.

Here, they found a grass fire that had caught from burning trash. However, the pastor's wife had it under control by the time the local firemen had located the blaze.

Fireman Alton Fitzgerald asked that the News remind its reader that when it becomes necessary to report a fire, the caller should report all information before hanging up regardless of the situation. Fitzgerald said that a building could be completely destoyed before the volunteers reach it if all the information is not available, especially the location.
