Travis B. Dean, Former Resident, Dies in Ft. Worth

Travis B. Dean, 47, former teacher in the Knox City school, died Monday at his home in Ft. Worth after an illness of a year. Dean, an independent oil operator, was a native of McCauley. He served in the Texas legislature from 1937 through 1941 from Jones County. He also served in the New Mexico Legislature from Lea County during 1947 and 1948. He had been in the oil business since 1947 and moved to Ft. Worth in 1949. His wife is the former Lenora English, sister of Mrs. Horace Finley of Knox City.

Dean was a member of the Baptist Church, Masonic Lodge, Rotary Club, Petroleum Club and Texas Bar Association. Prior to entering the oil business he had practiced law in West Texas. Survivors are his wife; a daughter, Susan Dean, 12; his mother, Mrs. Susie Dean of Abilene; two brothers, W. W. Dean of Abilene and Ira Alton Dean of Ft. Worth; and five sisters, Mmes. W. B. Splawn of Clyde, Wesley Redus of Hamlin, Lola Miller of San Angelo, L. L. Shell of Abilene and Jess Long of Venezuela.

Funeral services were conducted at 3 p. m. Tuesday at the Broadway Baptist Church, Ft. Worth.

Feb. 15 Deadline On Applications for Emergency Feed

Knox County farmers and ranchers have until Feb. 15 to apply for emergency feed, Wilburn A. Satterwhite of Seymour, County FFA Supervisor, has announced.

Satterwhite received official notice of the deadline Monday from the national Farmers Home Administration office.

No applications for assistance under the emergency feed program will be approved after Feb. 15, and Satterwhite urged all stockmen who need emergency feed to make application before that deadline.

Applications for a 60-day supply of feed will be accepted.

High School Boxers Win Team Trophy In Regional Tourney

Knox City boxers, coached by Charles Reese, won the team championship in the High School division of the regional Golden Gloves tournament at Abilene Monday night, winning all four of their bouts in the finals.

The local team also won the High School trophy last year.

V. R. Roberts, defending Open Novice champ, successfully defended his title with a TKO in 1:55 minutes of the first round over Ricardo Lopez of Ballinger. Roberts will go to the state tournament in Ft. Worth again this year.

Two Knox City entries in the Novice division, featherweight Harold Alcock and welterweight Paul Burt, lost their matches in the finals, both by close, roundly booted decisions.

In the High School division Jim Burt, classy featherweight, used his left to good advantage to decision Paul Jones of Baird. Jim Busby, last year's co-champion in the welterweight class, decisioned Johnny Wilkinson of Sweetwater, last year's Novice champ. Wilkinson was badly battered by the end of the first round, but fought back gamely until the final bell.

In the middleweight division Billy Joe Hollingsworth, Rochester student boxing with the Knox City team, floored his opponent, Don Thurman of Abilene, in the opening seconds of the first round, and was awarded a TKO in 1:05 of the second.

Bob Jensen, heavyweight, decisioned Jim Yarbrough of Abilene.

Two other Knox City boxers, John Traweek and Lester Burnam, did not reach the finals.

The winning fighters were presented championship jackets by the Abilene Reporter-News.

Poll Tax Payments Lowest in Years

Fewer poll taxes were paid this year than at any time since he has been in office, tax assessor-collector M. A. Bumpas, Jr., said this week.

Only 1,548 taxes were paid before the deadline, Bumpas said, and eleven exemptions were recorded. Total last year was 2,267 poll taxes and 35 exemptions.

In the last off-election year about 1,700 poll taxes were paid.

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

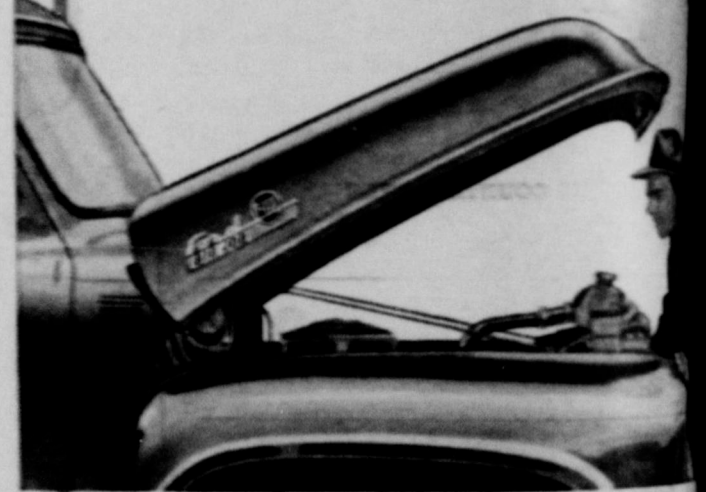

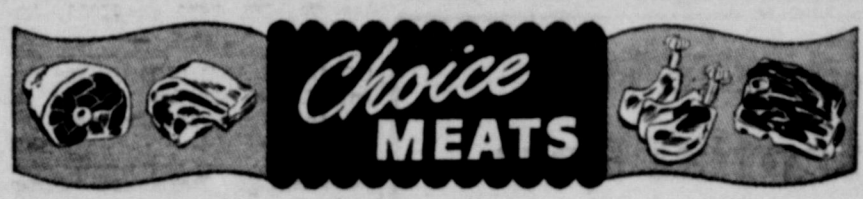

LOVE OF CHRIST FOR THE CHURCH. "Christ loved the church, and gave himself for it" (Eph. 5:25). "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). No more tender relationship could be imagined than that which caused Christ to give his life for the life of his church. This powerful lesson ought to silence those who so minimize the church as to say it has nothing to do with a man's salvation.

This lesson makes impressive THE SINGULARITY OF the Lord's church. So emphatically did Paul teach this lesson that he referred to the church in the singular twelve times in ten verses (Eph. 5:23-32). Although the world has learned to accept broken homes, divorce, and adultery a man stands on treacherous ground when he teaches a doctrine that would make the Lord a spiritual adulterer by saying he has more than one bride!
