Former Resident And KC Mayor Dies Thurs. Jan. 19

William R. (Bob) Condon, 95, died in the Knox County Hospital, Thursday, January 19, at 7:45 p. m. after several months of failing health.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Saturday in the Goree Baptist Church with the Rev. H. D. Graves, Munday Baptist Pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Genos Goad, Goree pastor.

Burial was in the Goree Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home of Knox City and McCauley Funeral Home of Munday in charge.

Born June 12, 1871 in Elgin, he came to Throckmorton in 1898 where he worked on the Swenson Ranch.

He married Belle Patton, Dec. 21, 1892 in Throckmorton. She died October 12, 1942.

He was the last living charter member of the Goree Masonic Lodge.

A former resident of Knox City he served as mayor from 1924 to 1928. He also was engaged in the grain elevator business in Knox City.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Vance Favor of Quanah, also a former resident of Knox City, Mrs. Wallace Moorhouse of Munday, and Mrs. Jennings Barton of Amarillo, seven grandchildren, and sixteen great-grandchildren.

Grandsons served as pallbearers.

Former Resident Dies In Lubbock

Word was received this week of the death of a former resident, Mrs. Julie Hendon, 70, who died Tuesday, January 10, at St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock where she had been a patient for seven months.

Funeral was held in the Lorenzo Methodist Church on Thursday, January 12, at 2:30 p. m., with the Rev. Bruce Barks, pastor and the Rev. Jesse Young of Sundown. Burial was in Ralls Cemetery.

Born near Fayetteville, Ark., March 26, 1896, she was married to Arch Hendon in Knox City about 1915. They farmed near Knox City until 1923 when they moved to the South Plains area.

Survivors include her husband, two sisters, Mrs. Ollie Howard of Boperville and Mrs. Mattie Ingram of Alexandria La.; and two brothers, Andrew Dutton and Loy Dutton, both of Lubbock.

Soil Conservation Service Will Help You Plan Future Business Deals

In this the "Space Age" our lives are being influenced more and more by our fast moving society. The phrase, "To just get away from it all for awhile," is being heard more and more. People are looking and seeking for ways to get away from the pressures of everyday living in this fast moving society.

A day seldom passes that one cannot see at last one type of vehicle that has been outfitted to accommodate the vacationer pass by. The most common seems to be the "Camper" either mounted on a pickup truck or being towed by the family automobile. One glance at the license plates on these vehicles and it is evident that they come from one of the continental 48 states, Canada and Mexico. All these people are looking for that place to rest, relax and get away from the stresses of every day living.

Their interests, likes and dislikes as to the type or form of relaxation they are seeking will vary, but one would be safe in assuming that in each of these vehicles very neatly tucked away is that favorite fishing rod or possibly that favorite shot gun or rifle, ready to be put into action at a moments notice.

Many of these vehicles pass through our communities only because the highways, "It will take them to that much read and heard about vacation spot," just happens to pass through them. They travel on not realizing that some very beautiful places to rest and relax may be but a few minutes away, or, a place to put that fishing and hunting equipment into action.

As summer nears more and more of these vehicles carrying these vacationers will be seen on our highways, traveling to the recreational areas that they have read and heard so much about. A place where Daddy can hunt or fish or perhaps both, and Mother and the children can swim, sunbathe, or some other type of relaxation that may suit their liking.

Wesley Robbins, working with cooperators of the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District reports that one of their District cooperators has taken advantage of the natural resource on his farm to establish a recreational area to supplement his farm income, while in addition, he has also made it possible for many people to have a place where they can take the family and rest and relax for one or more days without having to travel several miles.

Mr. M. H. Mansfield, whose farm is located eight miles north of Knox City has been a District Cooperator since 1950. He started developing his recreational facilities in 1955 with two-three acre ponds with assistance from the

Soil Conservation Service. When his neighbors started using this pleasant spot for swimming and fishing, the word spread and a new business was born. He has added a picnic area, wading pool, another pond for fishing and dove hunting. Housing for dressing and eating were added, and the business grew.

The owner stated that the business now grosses about \$700.00 annually, and that most of his guests are families out for just the day, but of course others stay much longer to enjoy the recreational facilities he has to offer them. He feels that by advertising this amount could be greatly increased, but he is satisfied with the patronage of his friends and neighbors and their friends and relatives.

Other farmers and ranchers have found that their farm income can be supplemented by leasing their land out for quail, duck, and goose hunting.

Information pertaining to the development of an income producing recreation enterprise on your land is available at your local Soil Conservation Service office reports Robbins.

Federal cost-share assistance through the Agricultural Conservation program varies by county from \$500.00 to \$1500.00 per farm to assist in establishing recreational areas by the construction of ponds and developing wildlife habits. The Farmers Home Administration is financing for the construction and installation of facilities for a recreation area, with long term loans at moderate interest rates. Financial assistance is available through the Great Plains Conservation Program which is administered by the Soil Conservation Service, who also furnish technical assistance for the other agencies.

The idea of recreation as a crop has taken hold and is growing yearly as the demand for more and more recreational areas increase. As the population expands more and more land owners stand to benefit from income producing recreational areas.

If you are a land owner and feel that income could be harvested from your facilities or if you are interested in developing a recreational area on your land and need financial or technical assistance or both, contact your local Soil Conservation Service office and get in on the recreational area expansion, and all will stand to profit from conserving and developing our natural resources.





Co. Group Seeks Inclusion In 27-Co. Area TB Assn.

A group of Knox County's most civic-minded citizens met January 24 in Munday to discuss bettering TB control in this county.

Called by Judge Sam E. Clonts, the group discussed the inclusion of this county in an area TB association, which will involve bringing local TB services to all cities and towns in a 27-county radius.

Attending were Mrs. Don Combs, Mrs. Jean Smith and Weldon Smith of Munday; Judge Clonts, Lyndol Cypert, Mrs. Wretha Fitzgerald and Mrs. Doris Crownover of Knox City and Miss S. C. Kinsey of Benjamin.

They heard two field consultants from Austin and the Texas Tuberculosis Association, Mrs. Marie Peik and Miss Fran McDonald, outline the necessary steps to make this county have such local services. Said Mrs. Peik, "Last year in Texas, 3141 more people fell victim to TB. Many others who had been previously treated for the disease had a recurrence. Tuberculosis is a contagious disease, and it is stubborn about recurring. But today, we have means to rid ourselves of this disease. But it will take citizen action on a local level to do so."

The Knox County group, under Judge Clonts leadership, agreed to work toward this county's participation in the area tuberculosis association. By doing so, local representation will be had on a board which will direct activities of the association. There will be a headquarters site and a staff which will travel to each county for local services.

Judge Clonts, and others, representing the Knox County group will attend a meeting in Fort Worth on February 18 at which all counties will be represented, and further organizational plans will be made.





E. O. Act Amendment Offers New Resources For Rural Poverty War

Additional and much needed resources for hard-pressed, low income Texas rural people desiring to improve their farm income or start small businesses will be provided through an amendment to Title 111 of the Economic Opportunity Act recently signed by President Johnson.

This fact was pointed out this week by Joe T. Boone, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor for Knox County.

"This important Economic Opportunity Act amendment increases from \$2,500 to \$3,500 the maximum war-on-poverty loans that the USDA Farmers Home Administration can make to individual Texas farmers or other rural residents," Supervisor Boone said.

This amendment also authorizes additional credit to borrowers as long as their outstanding indebtedness for an economic opportunity loan does not exceed \$500.

The new economic opportunity loan provisions will more adequately cover the financing of needed land, working quarters and equipment needed to establish many Texas economic opportunity individual enterprises on a sound basis," Boone explained.

"Another important point is that the program can now supplement original loans with capital for improvements or expansion."

Since this office of Economic Opportunity loan program started in 1965, the Farmers Home Administration has extended \$2,851,000 in credit to some 1,705 Texas families and \$52 million in loans to cover 39,000 families throughout the United States, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Economic Opportunity borrow-

ers throughout the Nation are operating more than 400 different kinds of non-agricultural enterprises—in addition to farming—as a result of credit extended through this program. Texas loans average \$1,672.

Texas Employment Commission Asking Help In Obtaining Applicants

The Texas Employment Commission has been designated as the recruiting and screening agency for male applicants who are interested in training in the Job Corps Programs. The local office, located in the City Hall in Munday, would appreciate the assistance of church groups, public officials, welfare agencies, or others who might be interested in helping locate eligible applicants. Anyone interested in obtaining more information should contact this office.

The Job Corps is a major program of the Office of Economic Opportunity which coordinates the nationwide war on poverty. It is a voluntary program that will give

underprivileged youngsters between the ages of 17 and 21 an opportunity to help themselves.

Although this program was organized primarily to help school drop-outs, it is not designated to contribute to the already excessive drop-out rate. Rather, it is to provide some form of training outside normal public school curriculum or environment for youths who will not re-enter school or who cannot be expected to profit from the public school program. In some cases, a high school graduate may be eligible if he meets the other eligibility requirements.

Those who qualify will be assisted to a training center most suited to their personal abilities,

where they can learn to develop skills and self-confidence. They will be given basic education and sound work experience which should be of great help to them in earning a livelihood in the years ahead.

While at the center, they will get room and board, clothing, and spending money of \$30 a month. When they leave, they will get \$50 for each month of satisfactory service in the Job Corps.

Applicants who successfully meet all the requirements can be placed on the payroll within ten (10) days, and will be assigned temporary duty at any of the regional, district or sub-district DPS offices over the state until a recruit training school begins. Periodic training schools will be held at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin.

To qualify for a position in the uniformed services, a man must be between the ages of 20 and 35, not less than 5 feet 8 inches in height, a high school education or its equivalent, sound physical condition, good vision, a citizen of the United States, and a resident of Texas.
