storage purposes, costs of which were given as approximately \$3,500.00 and included in the sum asked, could be used as the Senior Citizen Center. The center would provide a place in which the senior citizens could all congregate and be helped with handicraft and hobbies, and would also provide a place for youth activities as well as continuing to be used by the women's clubs. A full time case worker would need to be employed to supervise the center and the voluntary workers and to purchase the materials needed for projects, now scavenged by the voluntary workers. Mrs. White concluded with the comment that people within the age span of 60 years on constitute 24 percent of our population and that the sum requested is just a small amount in comparison to what we are providing for our youth today.

Raymond Hardin from the Munday Volunteer Fire Department asked help in purchasing a rural fire truck. The truck they now have is a '57 model. They have maintained a rural fire truck since 1950, making fires anywhere in the county, including Gilliland, Goree, and Truscott. The past year they made some 40 rural fires. To keep maintaining rural fire assistance, they feel they need \$20,000 for the purchase of a new truck. The city of Munday will provide one-half of the amount, making this a one-time item of expenditure of \$10,000.00. Mr. Hardin stated they were not trying to take away from any city or fire department, that he thought it would be good to have a rural truck in every town; but that the way the county precincts were divided, they more or less take care of at least 100 percent of the fires in one precinct and probably 90 percent in another precinct.

Gerald Brown of Rhineland, representing the Parish Council, asked for assistance to provide a better water system for the parish cemetery. They now have a small pump with adequate lines running to the cemetery, but only small inadequate lines branching out from there, making it difficult to replace those that are inadequate and risers would cost \$500 installed; and to place a new pump in the hole they now have would cost \$336. The community acquired land adjacent to the cemetery when they lost their school and wish to have three acres of it grubbed, cleared and leveled to make a ball field for the youth of the community. Cost for this would be approximately \$550, making a total cost for both

Area Citizens Asked To Beware Of House Bill 2

In Plainview Tuesday of last week to attend a Chamber of Commerce leaders' seminar were J. B. Tabor, incoming president; Mrs. Doris Crowover, secretary-manager; and Bobby Baker, new director.

Mrs. Crowover reported a very informative meeting and said that of special interest to the group was a report on House Bill 2, the so-called "Lobbyist Control Bill or State Ethics Commission Bill" that has passed the House and now goes to the Senate.

This bill, if it becomes law, would apply to "an individual corporation, association, firm, partnership, committee, clubs or other organizations or groups of persons" who might have any interest however small in state governmental affairs. It could require them to register as lobbyists, file public monthly voluminous reports, disclosing names of members and amount of money each member contributed to the club, church, or organization.

Groups in our town including Churches, Lions Clubs, Ex-student Associations, Boy Scout Troops, Women's Clubs, Sunday School Classes, Chamber of Commerce, School Board, American Legion Post, Future Farmers of America, Girl Scout Troops, Quarterback Club, Church men's and women's organizations, 4-4 Clubs, and Garden Clubs, could possibly be required to register as a lobbyist and file complicated, voluminous reports showing all members of the group and the amount of money each member paid into the group if the group asked any candidate for the legislature, a member of the legislature, a candidate for a state office, a state officer, an employee of any state agency department of the Legislature or a state official to attend any function of the group and members of the group asked any questions or expressed any opinion regarding state government at any time or any place, either in person or by telephone or letter or if the group contacted the above state officials or employees at any time or any place about any State of Texas matters.

Also, the Bill could apply to new media when their reporting activities could be interpreted as influencing legislation or administrative action or to ministers and church staffs when they expressed an opinion or asked a question about state governmental affairs to state officials or employees outside the church.

It could also affect any local committee or group with state governmental affairs interest as well as agriculture organizations, city council, and a large number of individuals who take an active interest in candidates for state offices and state governmental affairs.

State employees apparently can spend any amount of tax monies or time lobbying for higher appropriations and higher taxes as far as this bill is concerned because it exempts them from all provisions of the bill.

Mrs. Crowover and the other Chamber officials thought it wise if interested persons, and we are all affected either directly or indirectly by the bill) would wire or write Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby, Austin, Texas or call, wire, or write State Senator Jack Hightower that you object to the registration and reporting requirements of House Bill 2. That this bill would prevent you and groups of your friends and associates from taking part in the Texas governmental processes. Urge him to see that the people's right to petition on the government is not harassed or blocked.

Write House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. Austin, Texas. Express your disappointment and regret that he passed House Bill 2 that would prevent you and groups of your friends and associates from taking part in the Texas governmental processes.

They will be up against Seagraves Friday evening at 6:00 o'clock.

Coach Jerry Lowrey's Greyhounds boast an enviable 23-6 season record while Aspermont fell to 22-7.

A good turnout of fans watched the Hounds take early control of the bi-district game, when the Hounds took the lead at 2:42 of the opening quarter. The Hounds held the lead the entire game although the Hornets managed a weak rally in the fourth quarter. At the end of the first quarter KC lead 18-12. By halftime the Hounds had increased their lead to 36-20. In the third quarter the Hounds finished 20 points ahead of their opponents, 58-38. In the fourth quarter the Hornets narrowed the lead to 10 points but were never any closer.

Will Whiteley scored 24 points, Greg Cloets, 20, Billy

Baker, 10, Eddie "Bo" Johnson, 8, Stanley Newton, 4, and Robert Taylor, 2.

For Aspermont, Gus Moore and Eugene Johnson led the scoring with 12 each.

Coach Jerry Lowrey reported that the Hounds would be leaving Friday morning about 8:45 o'clock and that a boost-

er send-off is being planned for the boys. It is hoped that fans will line the street on both sides from the Citizens State Bank to the City Hall to let the bi-district champions know that they have our support. Remember to be on hand Friday at 8:45 a.m.!

Voter Registration Cards Still Good

Knox Citizens are reminded to keep that registration card that they received last year. It's still good for future use.
Under the present registration law, anytime a citizen votes, he automatically renews his right to vote for another three years. This means that all who voted in any election last year need not be concerned with registering this year.

Original registration cards are good for one year and are subject to renewal by voting. If registration took place late in the year, then that registration may be renewed by voting this year, it was explained.

However, in the event a voter moves from one county to another, it is necessary to go to the tax collector's office in the new county and make application for a new certificate.

projects \$1,386.00, a one-time item.

Kenneth Carrol of Gilliland stated that in all probability they would lose their school this year, and they need a community center and would like the cemetery to be worked perhaps purchasing another mower for the cemetery, and graveling the roads. A request was made for \$2,000.00 the first year to start the projects and then assistance in paying the balance in the next five years, for a total of \$10,000.00. Inquiries have been made about a pre-fabricated building, but a definite figure on the price had not been received at the present time. They plan to use the building for Home Demonstration meetings, homecomings, and just a general community center used by the community.

Jack Brown of Truscott stated they are in the same situation as the Gilliland community. They are in need of a community center. Plans now are to use the old drug store in Truscott, since the youth use the land next to it for a playground already. The building is 25 by 75, a sound brick structure. Mr. Brown requested \$2,000.00 the first year in one amount, and then \$4,000 to \$6,000 to be scattered over a period of seven years.

Vernon D. McCantles, mayor of Benjamin, stated they voted in council meeting to ask for all of the funds to be received by them to go for all-weather material for roads. He stated they had no definite figures, but that they would need a sum each year, repeating it until everyone was on all weather roads in town and also out in the country. He summed up by saying his request was for general road improvement.

Elmo Todd, stating that he was retired, but that he had been asked to represent those living on the wrong side of the river, asked that the poor side of the river be remembered in both roads and community centers, and said they could use all the money that the other side doesn't need.

Mrs. Edith Hobart, representing the city and county library, informed the Court that to become eligible to receive State aid and a grant, there must be an increase in income to \$6,000 or that you must have 10,000 volumes. Mrs. Hardin petitioned the Court for \$2,000 for the City-County Library over the above the \$1,500 per year provided. She stated that once you are a recipient of the state aid program, the situation can be re-evaluated.

Charles Griffith urged the Court to use priority on all-weather roads for the county, this being an agricultural county and stated the streets in town also were in need of improvement. He suggested all the money spent anywhere could

do no more lasting good than on roads.

Claudale Bratcheer stated he backed up what Mr. Griffith said, but that nobody from his community was asking for a community center because they couldn't get to one if they had it.

Kenneth Carrol of Gilliland made an inquiry of the Court as to how many roads were maintained. Upon being informed there were approximately 430 miles maintained by the county, he made a suggestion that an estimate be obtained on how much it would take to put those roads in a condition at least to make it possible for the mail carrier to deliver the mail.

Mrs. Jack Brown stated that she understood the need for good roads in the county for without good roads, there would not be much produced, but that there is a need for the community center, especially in a smaller community, and that the roads we needed so they could make money for the purpose of building a community center.

Judge Clonts concluded the meeting with an announcement there would be a meeting with the cities of the county Thursday morning (today) at 10:00 o'clock and then after a decision of the commissioners Court as to priority, the results would be published in the county newspaper.

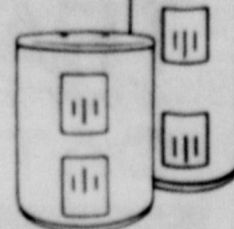
