## Progress Seen In Highway, Lake

The proposed municipal lake and the rebuilding of Highway 80 were projects under discussion at the Callahan County Club Wednesday noon. E. L. Woodley, city councilman, told the group that all details had been worked out whereby Baird could build a lake impounding an abundance of water and that the final survey by engineers and bond men will soon be made. If the engineers and bonding firm men report favorably on the project, an election will be called, at which time citizens of Baird may vote on an issue to provide \$175,000 in revenue bonds and another \$50,000 in tax bonds to provide funds for the lake's financing.

County Attorney P. E. Mitchell reported that the county commissioners had obtained almost all the right-of-way from Baird to Clyde for rebuilding Highway 80 and that this might be completed this week. Mitchell stated that it was urgent that the right-of-way be obtained as soon as possible that bids could be placed for construction by May 1st on this section. The highway department is desirous to have the entire distance through the county under contract by June 1st.

The club agreed to hold their regular first meeting in May with the West Texas Historical Association meeting here on Saturday, May 3. The Callahan County Club and the Junior Chamber of Commerce are joint hosts to the historians and plans are working out nicely for a splendid meeting. The West Texas visitors will open their annual meeting at the Baird Legion Hut at 9:30 Saturday morning and at noon a luncheon will be served in the basement of the Methodist Church, with the ladies of the Presbyterian church preparing the food.

After the business session in the afternoon the group will visit the Callahan county library and museum, being escorted by local business people.

## Pioneer Minister Dies At Abilene Sunday

The career of one of the last survivors of the pioneer ministers of this section of West Texas came to an end Sunday at 12:00 p. m. with the death of Rev. R. D. Carter at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

Rev. Carter, 88, had been ill since late summer of 1946, and had been in the Abilene hospital for fourteen days. Funeral services were held Monday at 3:00 p. m. at the First Baptist Church at Anson, with Rev. George W. Parks of Roscoe, pioneer co-worker with Mr. Carter in the Callahan County Baptist Association, assisted by Rev. Henry Chambers, pastor of the Anson church, in charge. Taking part in the services also were Rev. Ben Richbourg of Brownwood, pioneer minister of the Cross Plains area, and Rev. John P. Hardesty of Abilene, former pastor of the family at Cottonwood.

Pallbearers were the six sons. Born Nov. 23, 1858, in Jefferson County, Tenn., he and Mary Louisa Helm were married in Tennessee Dec. 20, 1874. Of this union nine children were born, two dying in infancy in Tennessee. Seven children surviving, all of whom have been with him in his last illness and attended the funeral rites, are: D. P. of Brownfield; J. B. of Houston, A. F. of Dallas, J. D. of Austin, J. B. of Houston, Mrs. L. P. Henslee of Anson, and T. H. Carter of Ft. Worth. Eighteen grandchildren and sixteen great-grandchildren also survive.

Ordained as a minister of the Missionary Baptist Church by the White Oak Grove Baptist Church of Tennessee Feb. 24, 1882, he was denied the benefits of common school education, but attended Carson Newman college, a Baptist school, and pastored four churches in Tennessee prior to migrating to Callahan County, coming to West Texas for benefit of his health, in 1891. The family resided in and near Cottonwood for a number of years, moving to Pecos in 1908, and to Cross Plains in 1911. Mrs. Carter passed away Nov. 28, 1934.

The Rev. Mr. Carter came to Callahan County when there were two Baptist church buildings in the county. He served as pastor of churches at Admiral from 1891 to 1897; at Cottonwood from 1897 to 1908; at Antioch 1905 to 1907; Eagle Cove, 1891 to 1894; Cross Plains, 1892 to 1893; Pioneer in Eastland County, 1905 to 1906, and at Burkett in Coleman County for one year.

During his long ministerial work he served as missionary of the Callahan County Association for six years, beginning in 1896 and again from 1903 to 1905, and of the El Paso Association for two and a half years from 1908.

A man of boundless energy, he overworked himself and had to retire after the loss of his voice with 27 years active service.

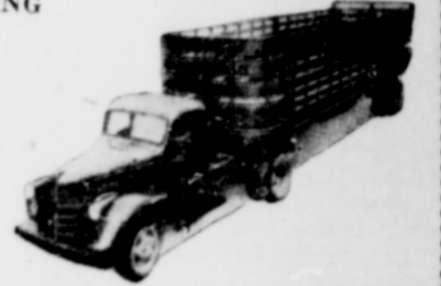

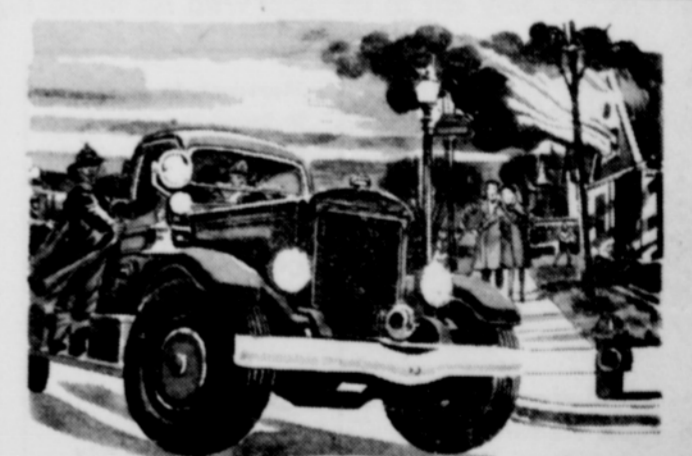

## TRUMAN URGES PRICE CUTS

President Truman expresses the hope that business men will follow the example of the Ford and International Harvester Companies and cut prices in order to avoid the inflationary dangers of rising costs.

Lew Hahn, president of the National Retail Drygoods Association, agrees with the President and suggests that the "smart operator" will see the need of getting prices down. He warns that if prices go higher, "the public will stop buying and we will have to sell goods at any price we can get for them."

Along the same line, Secretary of the Treasury John W. Snyder reports a "number of indications" that big industries plan to cut prices but adds that, while he is encouraged, he is not "too optimistic."

Despite the example of some forward-looking manufacturers and the good intentions of many business men through the nation, there is little reason to expect relief from high prices as long as the public continues to buy goods. With demand ahead of supply in many lines, and buyers competing with each other for deliveries, prices are going to stay up. There is only one way to bring them down and the means are in the hands of the people themselves.

What business leaders fear is that the point will be reached when buyers will suddenly refuse to purchase goods. This change-over from a buying psychology will inevitably disrupt the processes of distribution and manufacturing and may possibly produce serious intervals of unemployment. A reasonable and reasonable adjustment of prices before a buyers' strike develops will avoid injury to our economic system. This is well known to leading business men and explains their efforts to bring it about.

## IS THE BIG DEBT A DANGER?

The income of the Federal government, it seems, will be greater than expected for the present fiscal year which ends on June 30th.

This news encourages those who demand a reduction in taxes. For some strange reason it does not seem to inspire those who believe that the time to pay the national debt is when there is a surplus income.

In view of the fact that Congress gave some tax relief last year, mostly to cor-

porations, it would seem advisable to devote any cash surplus to trimming the \$260,000,000 debt. This is much more than the debt that caused so many financial and business experts to predict, a few years ago, national insolvency.

What has become of all these experts? If a national debt of \$100,000,000,000 constituted a threat to national security, some years ago, what must be the peril of a debt more than two-and-a-half times as much?

Can it be that the experts were only disturbed about the way the Government was using its money some years ago, that they were not worried by the size of the indebtedness and that their warnings represented nothing more than hokum? Can it be that the temptation of tax reduction which might put money in their pockets, silences the protests of the financial wizards?

## ABOUT BUYING POWER

Without going into an argument as to the effectiveness of price controls during the war, we call attention to figures quoted by Ray Tucker, Washington columnist:

In 1940, he says, dollar sales of consumer goods amounted to \$46,400,000,000. In 1946, sales amounted to \$96,700,000,000. This was a gain, in dollars, of 108 per cent, but represented the purchasing power of only \$62,600,000,000 in terms of 1935-39 prices.

As the columnist remarks, "Buyers spent ninety per cent more money and got only thirty-six per cent more goods."

## SAYS BOTH WANT PEACE

Elliott Roosevelt says that Russia is in a "very bad economic condition" and that her economic rebuilding is being handicapped by a lack of manpower.

The son of the late President thinks that this government is following a "short sighted" policy and that "we are scared of a people that can't fight as yet." He admits, however, that Russia might be in a position to wage war in a few years.

Mr. Roosevelt says that the great mass of the people of this country will do anything, with honor, to preserve peace and that in Russia he saw the same thing among the people. In fact, he believes that the majority of officials in both countries desire to achieve peace.

## County Agriculture Agent's Column

By A. R. Grote, Jr.

### DDT IN THE GARDEN

There are two classes of insects that are likely to attack your garden this year. The chewing - which chew holes in the leaves of fruit, and the sucking insects - which suck juices from the foliage, stems and fruits.

DDT will control both types of bugs, except the plant lice and red spider. Of course, we all know by now that DDT is not the answer to all our prayers on insect problems, and in fighting vegetable insects there are some things to watch. For example, DDT will burn the foliage on vine crops like squash, cucumbers and melons, so we'll be wise to use some other insecticide on these crops.

DDT cannot be safely used on leafy vegetables that are harvested every day, or even each week, since the residue of the insecticide is hard to remove from the leaves. This residue can be harmful if eaten.

Now, you can use DDT on beans, peas, tomatoes and cabbage, provided you apply it early in the season. It cannot be safely used with three weeks of harvest time. So there's a rule for us. No DDT on beans, peas, tomatoes and cabbage later than three weeks before these vegetables are ready for harvest.

On root vegetables, potatoes, carrots, beets, onions, and the like, you are safe in using DDT throughout the season.

DDT can be used either as a dust or spray. Three to five per cent dusts are good for garden insects, and an effective spray can be mixed with two ounces of 50% wettable powder in a gallon of water.

### TURKEY STEAKS

There's a new development in the poultry industry that promises to be a real booster for you folks in the turkey business, and that's turkey steaks.

Turkey breeders have been experimenting with the turkey steak idea for several years, and recently the steaks have been showing up in restaurants and meat markets here in Texas. Turkey men are saying that the idea shows a lot of promise of becoming a big industry. They believe it can mean a year-round market for our turkeys, not just the usual holiday market demand.

The process of turning turkeys into steaks is fairly simple. There are two processes being used. In one process, the bird is boned, rolled up, frozen, and then sliced the same way a boned ham is cut.

By the other method, the wings and legs are removed, the rest of the bird is frozen and sliced lengthwise through the bones. In either case, the birds are dressed, drawn and the tendons removed, to prevent the meat from being stringy. An experienced boner can fix up a bird in as little as five minutes.

On the cooking side, the steaks can be fried in deep fat the same way we fry chicken or chicken fried steaks. Experienced cooks let the steaks thaw slightly, pound them lightly with a meat hammer, dip into an egg batter and then into flour that's seasoned with salt and pepper. And they're ready for the skillet. Folks are saying turkey steaks are a real treat. Just ask W. B. Wilson, W. W. Winkleman, and other turkey raisers about turkey steaks.

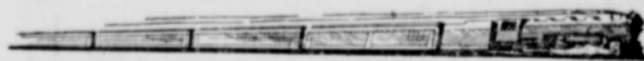
