'Hounds to Begin Conference Play Friday Night

When the district Basketball season opens Friday night, Jan. 5, the Greyhounds will go to Benjamin with an excellent pre-conference record.

Prior to the holidays the team had won three games in the Benjamin tournament from Rule, O'Brien and Megargel. During the holidays they went to Duncanville and played two of the strongest teams in that area.

First they played Midlothian and easily won by a score of 50 to 18. Before returning to Knox City they engaged the power of that area, a strong Cedar Hill team. However, the 'Hounds were too much and won by a 51 to 31 score.

Last Monday night, the Greyhounds played the first game of the season on their home court as they entertained the Class A Munday Moguls. It was a fast and rugged game until the fourth quarter when the 'Hounds took definite control and coasted to a 37-30 decision.

But on Tuesday, they returned the match on the Moguls' home court and received their first set-back of the season. They were handily beaten in a 39-27 contest.

The defeat was partially assuaged by the fact that the volleyball girls played and easily won their first game of the season, with the 'B' girls playing frequently. The final scores were 30 to 18.

The next home game will be a conference game with Rule on January 12.

Fans were urged to attend the games, both at home and away.

GAUNT'S DEATH WOUNDS CALLED SELF-INFLICTED

"Death by self-inflicted wounds" was the verdict reached last week in an investigation of the death of G. A. Gaunt, 52, prominent, Haskell County farmer.

Gaunt was discovered critically wounded at his home east of Rochester Christmas Day. A .22 rifle lay nearby.

He was rushed to the Knox County Hospital for first aid, and transferred immediately to Dallas, where he died at 10:00 a. m. Tuesday, Dec. 26. He suffered three wounds in the area of the heart.

Sheriff Bob Cousins of Haskell said that Gaunt had been in ill health for several years.

Owner of several farms, Mr. Gaunt was well known in this area. He is survived by four sons, Clarence, Troy and Jack, all of Rochester, and Pete of Ft. Worth; one daughter, Mrs. Win-cill Maupin of Sweetwater, and four grandchildren.

ELECTRONIC SCOREBOARD INSTALLED IN LOCAL GYM

LOCAL WTU MANAGER HAS SERVED 25 YEARS

(The following article is reprinted from the December issue of The Electric Times, magazine published by the West Texas Utilities Co.)

Guy T. Glenn, local manager at Knox City, O'Brien and Rochester, is one of WTU's veterans who has spent twenty-five years of service in one town, and has served as local manager for



more than 23 years. He completed a quarter of a century of service in the electric industry December 1, and is now a member of the WTU Quarter of A Century Club.

The Knox City local manager was born in Anderson, South Carolina in 1903 and spent his early life working on his father's farm and attending school at Shilo, South Carolina. When he was 18 he began farming for himself, but after several dry years he gave up farming and started west. He picked cotton in Oklahoma, worked on farms and finally went to Lubbock, where he was employed by a power company on a construction crew. His first job was digging holes.

His cousin, L. F. Glenn, was working as WTU's local manager in Knox City, and Guy made several trips to Knox City to visit his cousin. In 1925 the serviceman resigned and Guy was offered the job. He worked as a service man until 1928, when L. F. Glenn resigned and Guy was made local manager.

Mr. Glenn has been very active in civic affairs in his home town and during World War II served on the Knox County ration board, and later on the tire rationing board. He is an active member of the Lions Club, and served one term as vice president. The following year he was offered the presidency of the club, but he declined the office. He was very active in the War Bond Drives, and since the war has been helping with the Red Cross, the March of Dimes and other drives that are held each year. He is a member of the Methodist Church.

Mrs. Glenn, the former Lillian Buckner of Rochester, was married to Guy on November 30, 1933 in Abilene. They are the parents of two sons, Guy Robbins, age 17 and Mike, 18 months.

The inquest cleared Jack Teaff of Knox City in connection with the shooting. Investigation showed that Teaff believed the .22 pistol to be unloaded when he playfully pulled the trigger.

Survivors are his wife, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmo Morrow of Munday, and a brother, Glen Ray Morrow, a member of the armed forces.

Rev. Polnac Named Head of Dimes Drive

Rev. Huron A. Polnac, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Munday, has been named campaign director of the 1951 March of Dimes in Knox County. It was announced this week by the county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The dimes and dollars given by Knox Countians in the past helped more local victims of polio during 1950 than all the other years combined, officials of the county chapter said. Fortunately, Knox Countians had fulfilled their pledge that no polio sufferer need go without treatment and care for lack of funds—regardless of age, race, creed or color—and the best of care was given to every victim.

The cooperation of every individual and civic organization in the county will be needed to make the 1951 campaign a success. One-half of every dollar given to the March of Dimes remains in the county funds, while the other half is sent to the National Foundation for research, equipment, etc. Last year the National Foundation furnished money to Texas, after three years in succession of polio epidemics in the state.
