Bobby Lee, vocational agriculture teacher at Wilson, will be judging the entries shown Friday, while Eddie Puckett, who teaches vocational agriculture at Sweetwater, is to judge the animals shown Saturday.

General chairmen of the show this year are Charles Lankford of Knox City and Gene Thompson of Munday.

Swine division superintendents are Jimmy White of Knox City and Bill Benson of Benjamin.

Bob Cude and Bob McWhorter, both of Munday, will share duties as superintendents of the beef division.

Sheep division superintendents are Sammy Abbott of Gilliland and John Earl White of Munday.

Presentation of showmanship awards and introduction of sweetheart candidates will be at 3 p.m. Saturday followed by the premium sale.

Douglas Myers of Munday has been named chairman of the sale committee this year.

In Knox County, the animals in the premium sale earn their young owners the difference between the market price and the sale bid price. The owner keeps his animal.

Last year, the owners of animals in the sale received \$3500 in prize and sale premiums.

Animals eligible for the sale are the grand and reserve champion gilts and boars, and first and second place winners from each class of market swine.

Twelve market lambs and the five top steers are to be included in the sale, also.

## In All Area Water

# County Residents Told Nitrate Level Increasing

In a monthly meeting of the City Council Monday night, Knox County Health Officer Dr. Robert G. Howell and City Health Officer Dr. Ted C. Alexander Jr., who was recently appointed to the council to fill an unexpired one-year term, met with Mayor Buddy Angle and councilmen Carl Shelton, Lynn Worley, Celso Gonzales, and A.P. Denton.

Also present were city secretary Faye Railsback, water superintendent James Hewitt, and Supt. of Schools W.R. Baker.

The doctors advised city officials that they were not there to unduly alarm residents, but explained that it was their responsibility to inform the public when the nitrate level in the water samples within the county increased to their present proportions.

Dr. Howell and Dr. Alexander were joined by Dr. R.L. Newsom in preparing the following statement addressed to the attention of all citizens in Knox County:

"Please be advised that a chemical water analysis report performed by the Texas Water Development Board on random water samples in Knox County revealed the nitrate level to be above the recommended limit. This problem of the rising nitrate level in our water supply has been followed closely for several years by Public Health Officials and local physicians, but the most current report received on December 20, 1973, revealed a marked rise above the normal level. This information was given to public Health Officials, Pediatricians, and Internal Medicine Specialists in several states and their statements and recommendations are as follows.

Although this increased nitrate content does not prohibit the usage of these water supplies for most purposes, they should not be used for drinking or feeding very young children, due to the possibility of the development of methemoglobinemia. Care should also be used in drinking such water by mothers nursing infants.

All citizens regardless of age should increase their intake of fruit juices because it is thought that vitamin C or ascorbic acid will break down the nitrate levels in the body.

We do not feel there is any cause for alarm among the citizens because this problem will be corrected when the new lake is completed; however, until that time, we urge you to follow the precautions listed above.

The Regional Band performed in concert at Vernon's Wilbarger Memorial Auditorium Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

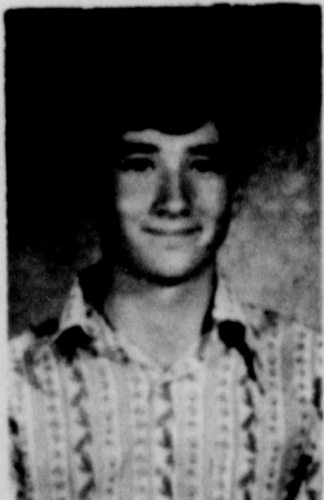

Knox City seniors and some of the Knox City faculty will man the clocks, keep the books, and serve as referees. Also assisting with the tournament will be Jerry May, executive

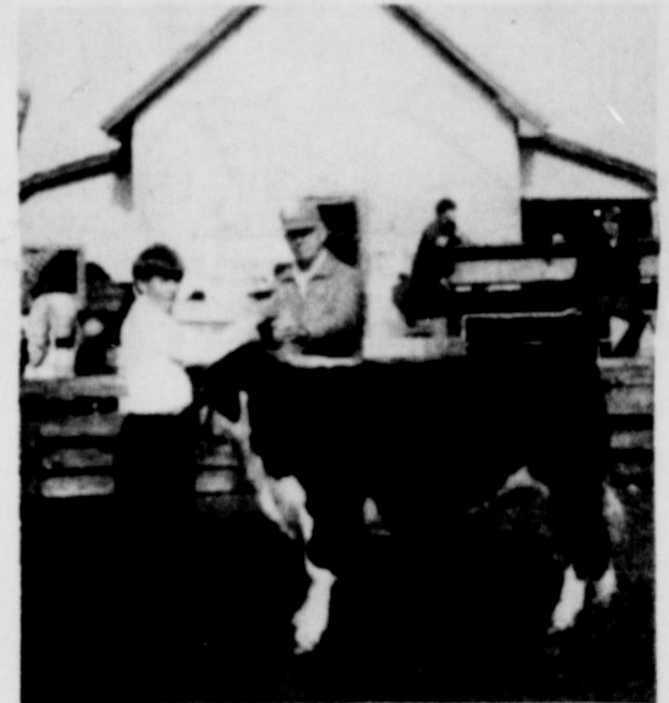

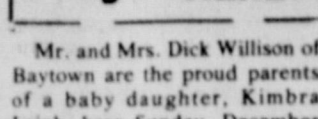

1. For savings on energy, set the thermostat on the temperature setting that provides adequate comfort (the President suggests 68°). Don't continually switch it up and down. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the more money you save on energy.

Clean filters keep the heating unit operating at maximum efficiency and economy. Filters are the most neglected part of any forced-air heating system.
3. A wood burning fireplace should be equipped with an efficient damper. Be sure to keep the damper closed when not in use. A chimney with the damper open carries warm air out the house, wasting heat.
4. To decrease heat loss and reduce energy cost in rooms that are not in use at night or in extremely cold weather, draw the draperies and lower the shades over the windows, glass panels and doors. If the sun is shining on glass areas, open the draperies. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.
5. Some wall heaters have fan-forced circulation. To clean, turn the unit "OFF". Blow dust out of unit with vacuum exhaust attachment. Clean the grill cover with a vacuum or warm detergent water.
6. Proper insulation and weather stripping will make your home more comfortable. It will help keep dust and dirt from blowing in, and will help to eliminate cold drafts in the winter time, thus saving money on your heating bill.

Contract was awarded by the District Engineer, U.S. Army Engineer District, Corps of Engineers, Fort Worth, Texas 76102. Work consists of enlarging and improving existing drainage channels and construction of drainage chutes, grade crossing and drop structures.

The release stated that plans and specifications were furnished 20 prime contractors, and three bids were received. Contract number DACW63-74-C-0058 has been assigned.

Cotton Samples

Now Total 97,800

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service Office classed 4,800 samples during the week ending Friday, Jan. 4, according to Sidney Ferrell, in Charge. This brings the season total to 97,800 samples classed.

White cotton accounted for 55 percent of the cotton classed, while light-spots dropped to 41 percent. Grade 41 was predominant with forty-eight percent, and grades 31 and 51 had three and four percent respectively. Grade 32 accounted for fifteen percent, grade 42 was twenty-five percent, and spotted cotton was four percent.

The predominant staple continued to be staple 31 with seventy-four percent, followed by staple 32 with eighteen percent, and staple 30 with seven percent.

Mike readings of 5.0 and higher went up to twenty-two percent, while readings of 3.5 - 4.9 dropped to seventy-seven percent.

Cotton activity was slow during the New Year period, and prices were off 300 to 400 points from the previous week. Cotton with staple 31 and longer was bringing from 4200 to 4600 points over CCC Loan prices.

Miss Fuhrken will make her home in Benjamin where the Knox County Extension Office is located in the Courthouse.

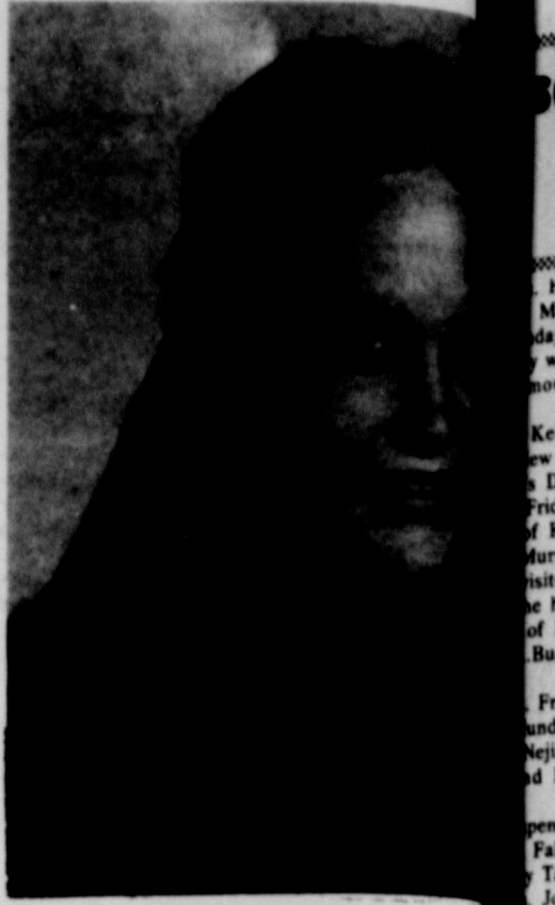
