Knox City's fifth joint election is scheduled Saturday, April 1, at the City Hall from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. Voters will mark ballots in the City of Knox City, the Knox City Independent School District elections.

No contests are cited in any of the races.

Three councilmen will be elected for two year terms in the city election and a one-year unexpired term. Candidates for two year terms are incumbent Lynn Worley and newcomers Celso Gonzales Jr. and Glen Rumley. Bobby Baker also a newcomer, filed for the one year term. Holdover city council members are Mayor C.C. (Duddy) Angle and Carl Shelton.

Incumbent John Cronover and Doug Melzner are opposed for the two seats on the school board of the Knox City Independent School District. Holdover members are Henry J. Jones, Clyde Boudin Oscar Mangis, Allen McGaughy, and John L. Grindstaff Jr.

On the ballot of the Knox County School election, Jack Loh's name appears for County Trustee-at-Large, and County Trustee in commissioner's Precinct 4 is Russell Penick of Munday, while in commissioner's Precinct 2 candidates is Orville Kinnibrugh of Vera.

Election judge is Otis Harbert with Mrs. Harbert and Mrs. Jack Coats as clerks.

Absentee voting was practically "all" as only one absentee vote was made in the city election and none at the school or hospital in those respective elections.

Waldrip HD Club Hears S.B. White

The Waldrip Home Demonstration Club met Thursday, March 16, at 4:00 p.m. in the O'Brien Homemaking Department for its monthly meeting.

Glenna Benson, president, introduced the guest speaker, Sammy B. White from the Knox City office of the State Department of Welfare, which includes Ford and Knox Counties. White spoke to the group on the services offered by the welfare department.

White divided his work into three basic categories: child welfare, adult services, and social services for nursing homes. He felt that the removal of a child from its home because of non-support of physical and mental neglect and placing the child in a foster home was the hardest and by far the saddest part of his work. Before removing a child from a home, he counsels with the family and gives them every advantage to correct the situation, he said.

White felt that more interest by persons in the community for the welfare of children was needed. He urged the group to report any continuous mistreatment of children and not to just turn a deaf ear.

Many times counseling with parents would prevent these children from becoming dependent upon the state. Asked how he found foster homes for children, White described it as hard. First that a couple must really love children. A couple wanting a foster child has a choice of the approximate age and sex of the child. Once placed in a foster home, the child may stay until it is adopted.

The state does pay a support fee to the foster parents but it barely pays for support and not for the effort of raising a child. That must come from love, he said.

White also does studies for the district court in divorce cases to advise as to whom given. He also investigates in cases of adoptions.

Services are offered for adults, and aging citizens are greatly in need of assistance, not only financial support but for someone to care about them. Many old people will go for days without anyone visiting or checking on them.

The State Welfare Department is helping to arrange for a daily check by an outsider on older people. The department is helping to organize the elderly people so they may check among themselves. Sometimes a captain of the group calls four or five in the group by phone at the same time each day. Another method used is a chain, one person begins by calling a certain person, then each person calls a specified person until the first person is contacted again. White stated that at least 80 elderly persons live by themselves in Knox City.

The purpose of a daily telephone check is to make people aware of the needs of the elderly.

White said that a growing part of his work was social services for nursing homes.

He said older people today are very independent and do not want to go to a nursing home. It is a job to determine if an elderly person really needs nursing home care. He said today's generation is going to live much longer and want to be cared for in a care home. Eventually screening will become necessary and only bed patients will be admitted. He stated foster homes for the elderly was a possible solution. The meeting was adjourned and refreshments were served by Mrs. Kay May.

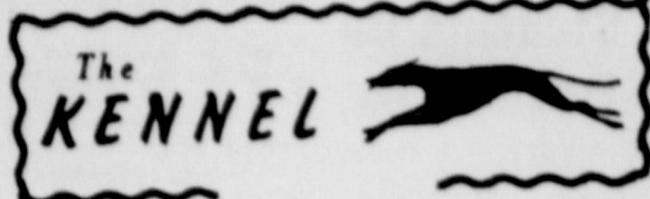

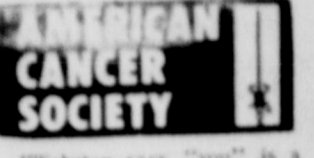

The American Cancer Society came into being under its now familiar title. 'In the years that followed the American Cancer Society poured more than a quarter billion dollars into research. 'You established programs on research, education and service. You have made these programs work. You have made films, written literature, issued news releases, held meetings and used every means at your disposal to educate the public about cancer. You have written booklets which would have been useless had you not worked at the local level, contacting the people of your community and educating them about cancer. You had put in hours of your time to prepare for all of this. 'In your research program strides, with efforts beyond that of the normal human. 'One of our best-known national manufacturers has as its slogan, 'Progress is our most important product.' 'In the battle against cancer, 'Saving lives is our most important product.' and saving lives is due to progress... progress in research. 'In the 1970 American Cancer Society devoted approximately 20 million dollars to vital research. As support grows for research, so does the amount of research which has to be put aside, because of lack of funds. 'You have been able to meet these demands in the past and I am sure you will be able to do so in the future. 'Let's look at some programs you have made. 'Thirty years ago fewer than one person in five survived 5 years after the diagnosis and treatment of cancer. Today one in three is being saved and you could save one in two if you could get everyone to have annual checkups. 'How do we get beyond this 50 per cent cure rate? Only through research and your persistent education of the people to look for signals and have the checkups. 'You are the only one who stands before the terrible onslaught of cancer. You are the Freedom Fighters against cancer. You are the real supporters of our National Research Program. You are the means to the end of cancer. Without you the end of cancer would be indefinite. Your slogan for the Cancer Society is 'To Conquer Cancer in Our Lifetime'. 'Today there are 1,500,000 people alive due to your efforts. We must keep this number growing at an ever increasing pace. The only way this can be done is by dedication to the job ahead. 'You have built a great organization, no matter how small in numbers. You built this with a dedication to a cause. 'I know of no politician who would not like to have your organizing ability. You have built a solid organization but you must keep making it stronger. You are now trying to establish a Headquarters Committee. As you know, any business or organization is run from record. Without the records we will stand still or grow weaker. If you have not established your

Headquarters Committee, then let's make it one of your goals to accomplish in the coming year. 'These records will make it much easier for any incoming officer of Committee Chairman. 'Making you unit stronger by records is just one way. Another way is by a volunteer recruitment program. These two go hand in hand. 'If each one of you would make it your personal goal, to bring in one volunteer in the coming year, then our membership has doubled. 'When you get a new volunteer put them to work. Break your own jobs into different phases and make a job for another volunteer. This will make your job easier and will also enable you to double or triple your own efficiency as a volunteer. 'Hear a speech at a kickoff dinner, made by Dr. Carl Page of Labcock. He told us if we did not give 100 per cent to all our volunteers we would be doing them an injustice. 'I feel sometimes this is the reason we have some 'one-time' volunteers. We may fail to give them a job or proper guidance. 'Of course you sometimes find a volunteer who wants to go it alone having ideas of his own. This is sometimes good. He will usually become dedicated to his work. 'In their second year, volunteers will usually see their mistake or will accept advice freely. They are then on the road to becoming your future officers. 'This is another reason for your Headquarters Committee. You don't always have to offer advice to someone who will read it for themselves and will most likely incorporate it into their plans. 'I sometimes refer to the American Cancer Society volunteers as the 'one percenters'. We have some 2 million American Cancer Society volunteers. This is about one per cent of our total population. 'Look at all your civic organizations in your community and list the number of active

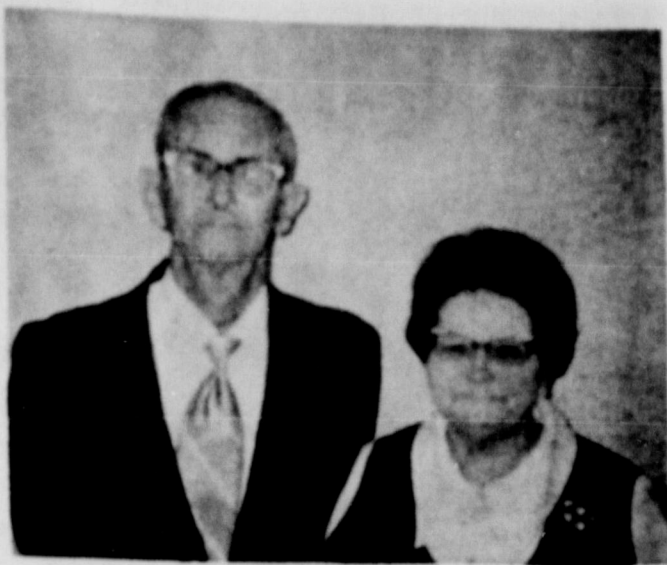

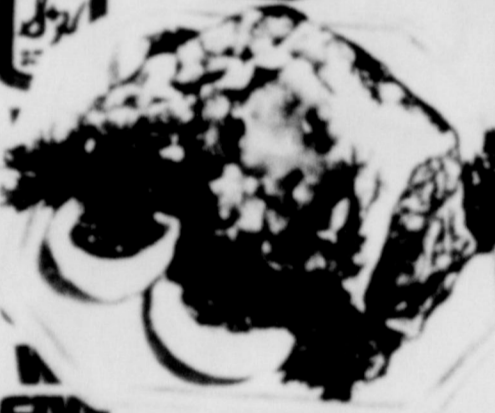

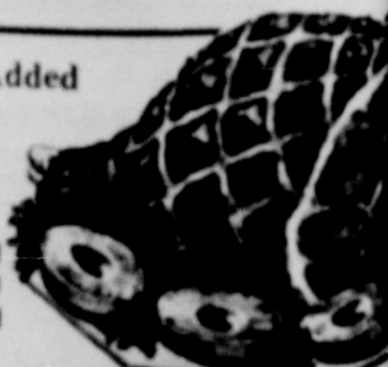
