

Insect Control Guide Available

cetton farmer has to be told ter last week. about the reduction in profits that insects can cause. But luckily, cotton insects can be controlled economically by the use of the proper poisons at the

Controlling damaging infestations of boll weevils, bollworms and other insects on cotton growing on fertile soils returns substantial profits even when a large number of applications is necessary for maximum yields. On upland soils where insects infestations do not last long, fewer applications may be needed.

Giving information and recommendations for the control of the various cotton insects is the theme of two leaflets recently released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service-L-218. "Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects," and L-219, "Ways to Fight the Pink Bollworm in Texas.

L-218 deals with the more Northwest Texas Council, harmful cotton insects. 


