## O'Brien Okays School Bond Issue

Voters in the O'Brien school district Saturday overwhelmingly approved the issuance of \$180,000 in bonds to finance construction of a new school plant. The new structure will replace the old school building which burned Jan. 2 with a loss estimated at \$100,000. Insurance on the old building amounted to about \$40,000. The ballot in Saturday's election was divided into three parts. The vote was 108 for and two against the levying of a maintenance tax for upkeep of the proposed building; 101 for and one against the assumption of \$29,000 worth of bonds now outstanding; and 105 for and one against the issuance of \$180,000 in new bonds.

## Cotton Season Comes to Close

Knox County farmers ginned a total of 28,813 bales through mid-January, as compared with approximately 18,000 bales during the 1956 season, County Agent Roy England reported this week. Although yields increased more than 50%, net profits dropped off sharply due to extremely low grades brought on by wet weather and an unusually early freeze. ## MECHANIZATION REQUIRES GREAT INVESTMENT FOR TEXAS FARMERS

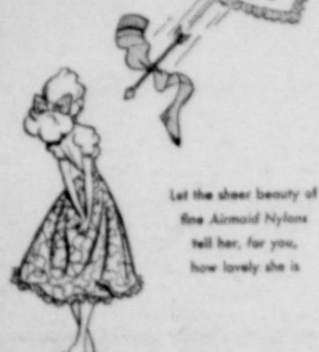
COLLEGE STATION. — Efficiency is the key to profitable farm production, points out W. L. Ulich, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He says in a year-end summary, covering farm power and machinery, that Texas farmers are now using approximately 300,000 tractors and more than 2,500,000 allied farm implements in order to gain the advantages of efficient mechan-

ized farm production. Mechanized farming, his report shows, requires tremendous capital investments. In addition to over a billion dollars invested in equipments, Texas farmers spend approximately \$95,000,000 annually for petroleum products and \$75,000,000 for farm equipment repairs. The total cost of operating and maintaining this great array of mechanized equipment represents slightly more than a third of crop production costs. Because of improper adjustments and maintenance and failure to give serious consideration to farm machinery selection problems, the farmers' profits each year are drastically reduced, he says.

In a determined effort to reduce these losses, the specialist reports that farm machinery training schools and field days were used to good advantage for passing on to farmers educational information. County extension agents in 163 counties with assistance from 640 trained leaders conducted farm machinery conservation programs. During the past year county agents held 124 countywide machinery training schools while more than 36,000 farmers received assistance on farm power and machinery problems by attending educational meetings. Too, reports Ulich, more than 21,000 farmers carried out machinery maintenance recommendations.

During the past year more than 5,400 4-H Club boys were enrolled in the tractor maintenance demonstration program.

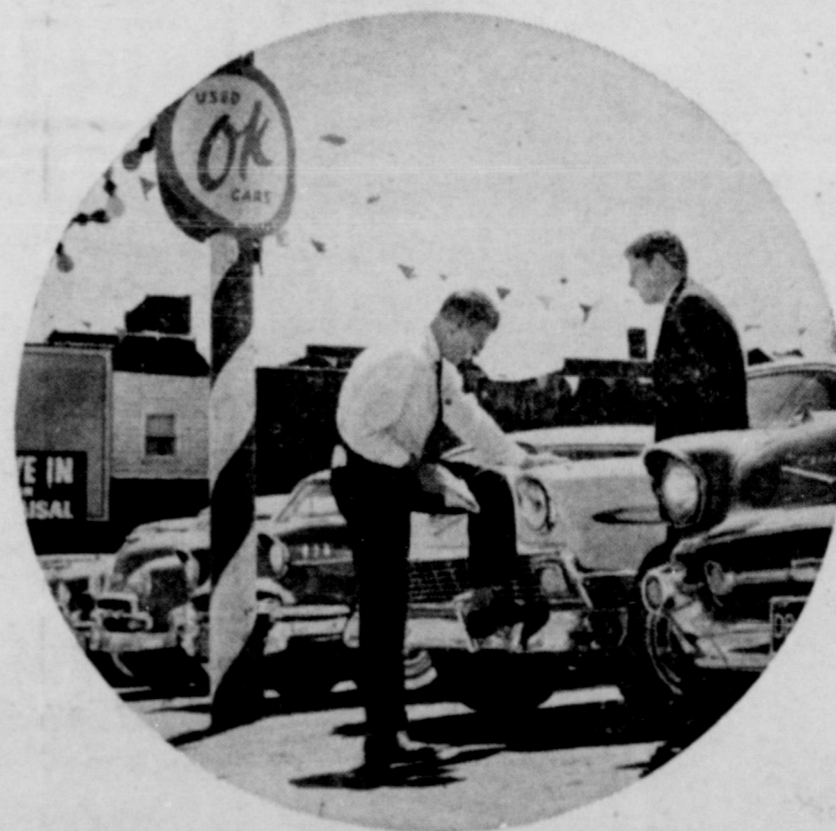

**Insect Control Guide Available**

COLLEGE STATION. — No cotton farmer has to be told about the reduction in profits that insects can cause. But luckily, cotton insects can be controlled economically by the use of the proper poisons at the right time.

Controlling damaging infestations of boll weevils, bollworms and other insects on cotton growing on fertile soils returns substantial profits even when a large number of applications is necessary for maximum yields. On upland soils where insects infestations do not last long, fewer applications may be needed.

Giving information and recommendations for the control of the various cotton insects is the theme of two leaflets recently released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service—L-218, "Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects," and L-219, "Ways to Fight the Pink Bollworm in Texas."

L-218 deals with the more harmful cotton insects. It contains a chart giving the recommended controls and also general information including points on the safe handling of insecticides.

L-219 deals with the pink bollworm specifically. It tells about the habits and damage of the insects and gives special attention on the ways to fight it.

Copies of the leaflets may be obtained from the local county agents or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

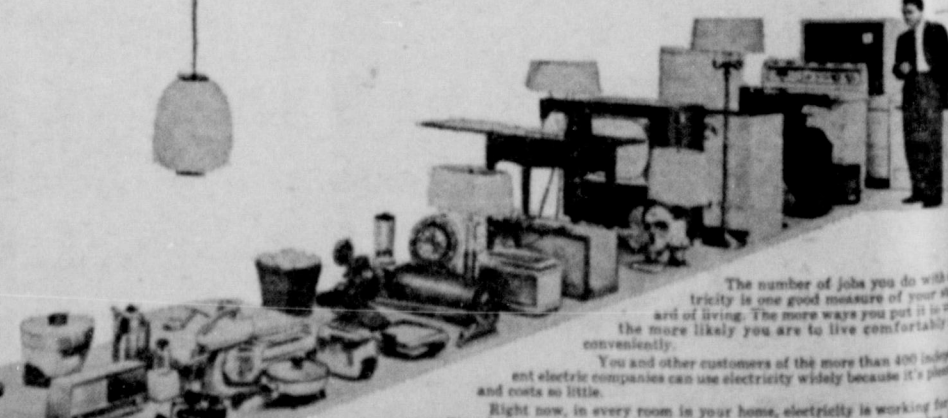

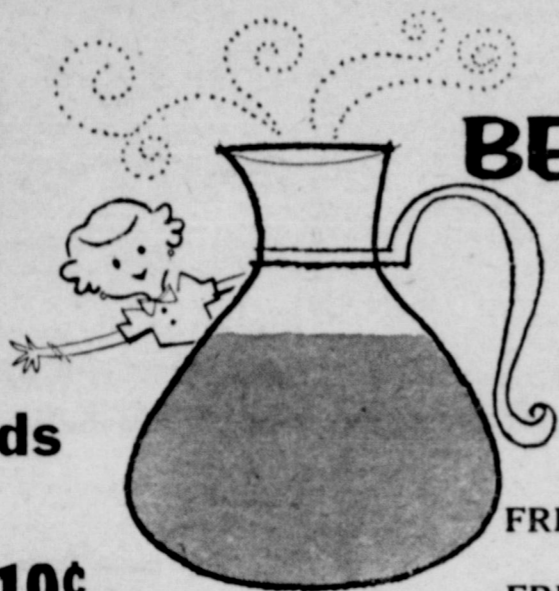

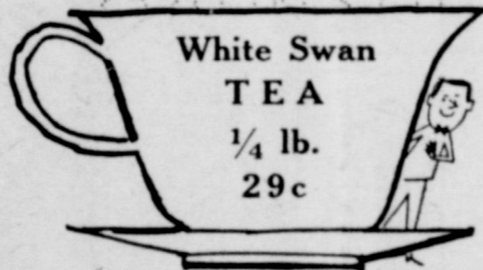
