Texas' Oldest J.P. Dies Saturday At 99

Funeral services for the oldest Justice of the Peace in the state of Texas, William Casper Glenn of Benjamin, were held Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock in the First Christian Church in Benjamin with the Rev. James Patterson, pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Knox City, officiating. Interment was in the Benjamin Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Born February 6, 1878 in Lawrence, South Carolina, he came to Knox County 75 years ago from Young County. Glenn married the former Florence Benedict in 1902 in

Knox County and she preceded him in death in 1949. In addition to being the oldest Justice of the Peace in Texas, he was a former Tax-Assessor Collector and a former Knox County Commissioner. He was a member of the Orient Lodge No. 905 and a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include one son, Dial E. (Charley) Glenn of Amarillo; one daughter, Mrs. Willie Mary Denman of Dumas; three grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren, and three great-great-grandchildren.

Some 10,000 TSTA local association members and guests are expected to attend. Some of the educators will be

voting representatives to the 1977 TSTA House of Delegates.

This official governing body will meet during the convention to act on proposed amendments to the TSTA constitution and consider committee reports, resolutions, and other business. First delegate session begins at 4:00 p.m., March 18.

The official delegates -- numbering about 1,500 -- represent the 500 TSTA local associations throughout the state. They are certified by districts on the basis of one delegate per 100 members or major fraction of 100, to represent the 139,200 members of TSTA. Every local association is entitled to at least one official delegate.

A state production of a musical review will be presented by Houston's High School for the Performing and Visual Arts for the opening general session, at 7:30 p.m. March 17.

Bill Moyers, anchorman and chief reporter for "CBS Reports" of the Columbia Broadcasting System, will be the featured speaker for the 9:30 a.m., March 18, general session.

Mrs. Watson is president of the Knox County Association and a member of the executive committee of the District TSTA Association.

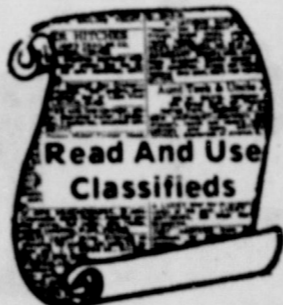
