Important Elections Set for Saturday and Tuesday

Mayor, Five Aldermen To Be Named Tuesday

1946 Study Club Wins Recognition for Community Service

The Community Service award was given the 1946 Study Club at the 53rd annual convention of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, First District, held in Vernon.

Mrs. Neil Perdue is chairman of the club's community service committee and other members are Mrs. Charles Markward and Mrs. H. E. Stephens.

Listed as outstanding achievements of the club in the community service department were:

Sponsoring a tennis tournament for teen-agers in July and August; Story Hours at The Woman's Club during the summer for three age groups; purchase of 25 new books for the children's shelf of the library; sponsoring the organization of the Blue Birds and Campfire Girls, with the help of the Knox City Study Club; sponsoring a program on the Comic Book Menace and a local study of the problem; writing 27 personal letters to state senators and representatives urging passage of Driver Training Education legislation; conducting the Emergency March of Dimes last summer and sponsoring the Mothers' March on Polio; with the cooperation of the Knox City Study Club, sponsoring an old-fashioned political rally; sponsoring a "Get out the vote" campaign and providing transportation to the polls; arranging a class in conversational Spanish, designed to help local merchants, clerks and farmers converse with Mexican laborers; sponsoring a visit of the Free Chest X-Ray Unit of the State Department of Health to Knox City where 1561 x-rays were made in a day and a half; mailing approximately 200 gifts to patients in the State Hospital at Wichita Falls, with the help of the Knox City Study Club; recommending to city commission the purchase of trash containers for downtown streets, "stop" and "slow" signs near school, and passing of an ordinance for removal of catches on stored or abandoned refrigerators, etc.

Attending the convention in Vernon Tuesday were Mrs. Dan Steakley, president of the club, Mrs. Markward and Mrs. C. C. Hoge.

Knox Citizens will elect a mayor and five aldermen in the annual city election to be held Tuesday.

Also to be named is a city judge. Loyce Teague, incumbent, is a candidate for re-election without opposition.

Candidates for mayor are Barney Arnold and Buddy Angle. Angle is now a city alderman.

Mayor Guy Glenn, who is completing his second term in office, did not seek re-election.

Candidates for aldermen are O. A. Green, W. F. Shannon, G. W. Coats and Doyle Graham, all incumbents, and E. R. Carpenter, Z. E. Cone, Russell Boyd and Otis Cash.

Election of a full slate of aldermen was made necessary by the Knox City changing to the aldermanic form of city government last July. Green, Shannon and Graham were elected to office in the special election, to serve until the next regular election. Coats was a city commissioner before the change was made.

After the election, aldermen will draw lots for one and two-year terms.

Balloting will be at the American Legion Hall, with Porter Lowrey as election judge. City officials have urged all qualified voters in the community to vote.

Workers Sought for Vegetable Harvest

On Friday, April 1, representatives of the Holly Sugar Company, Denver, Colo., and other vegetable processors, and the Texas employment Commission will interview workers in this area for employment in sugar beets and other vegetable harvest work.

The work will be in Colorado, Montana and Wyoming. The employers desire to employ U. S. citizen workers of Mexican or other Latin-American extraction.

This year, for the first time, all hiring commitments and travel advances will be made between the company representative and the worker or crew leader at the reception center in the south edge of Monday.

The workers will be needed until about September 15 at which time they will be free to return to Texas for the cotton harvest.

Interested workers may meet with the hiring representatives Friday, April 1, from 10 a. m. to 3:30 p. m.

Funeral Held Here For Mrs. Ellen Boyd, Former Resident

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church Monday at 2:30 p. m. for Mrs. Ellen Boyd, former Knox citizen, who died Saturday at the home of a daughter in San Antonio. Rev. E. V. Becker, pastor of the church, officiated, assisted by Rev. Walter Driver, pastor of the Knox City Methodist Church.

Mrs. Boyd died at 10:30 a. m. Saturday, March 26, after being critically ill six weeks.

She was born Ellen Ferguson in Fort Payne, Ala., August 4, 1869. She married Charles Forrest Boyd in Collinsville, Ala., August 18, 1892. They moved to Comanche County in 1900 and lived there until 1912 when the family moved to Knox City and began operating the Boyd Hotel. Mr. Boyd died July 9, 1924, in Knox City. Mrs. Boyd continued operating the hotel until 1931 when she moved to San Antonio to make her home with her daughter.

She joined the Methodist Church at an early age and at the time of her death was a member of the Trinity Methodist Church in San Antonio. She is survived by two sons, Russell of Knox City and Ferguson of California; a daughter, Mrs. Rowena Lutz of San Antonio; and a sister, Mrs. Dan Clayton of Comanche.

Interment was in the Knox City Cemetery under the direction of Warren Funeral Home. Active pallbearers were Henry Jones, E. R. Carpenter, Otis Harbert, C. H. Clarke, Claude Reed and Buddy Angle. Two School Trustees To Be Elected Here Saturday

Texas Schools Need Interest of Public, Speaker Tells Lions

The Texas Public School system is facing three major problems, E. L. Galyean of Austin, director of research and records for the Texas State Teachers Association, told members of the Knox City Lions Club Wednesday.

Galyean listed the problems as: (1) Lack of adequate buildings and facilities; (2) Scarcity of qualified teaching personnel; and (3) A lack of public understanding of the first two problems.

Educators have been fairly successful in waking the public to the need for more classrooms, the speaker said. However, with the schools gaining 75,000 children each year, 2,500 classrooms are needed each year, and construction is not keeping up with the need.

"We have not done so well," he went on, "in educating the public to the need for unified program to recruit qualified teachers. We need a new teacher for every new classroom. We will have 2,000,000 children in Texas schools in five years, and frankly, I don't know where the necessary teachers are coming from."

Mr. Galyean pointed out that the average salary of all teachers in Texas is now \$3,400 a year, and many men and women do not enter the teaching profession because industry offers them a beginning salary almost equal to the average teacher salary.

Too many citizens, he continued, do not know what the schools are doing—and do not care. "Before we can have a workable teacher recruitment program, the public and teachers must get together and plan a program that will meet the needs of our children."

Cost of public education in Texas is \$400,000,000 annually, Galyean said. "However," he added, "this figure does not sound so high when you compare it to the number of people being served and the money being spent in other states. Money spent per student is only \$226 annually—which is cheaper than baby sitting."

Among other states, he pointed out, Texas rates 27th in annual teacher salary, 28th in amount spent on each child, and 34th in tax burden.

"You may ask where the increase in the cost of education is going to end," he concluded, "and the only answer I can give is—without salary increases—as long as children increase the public school system will need more money."

C. Bohannon has been named election judge for the school trustee election Saturday, April 2, it was announced Wednesday.

Bohannon replaces C. C. Hoge, who asked to be replaced since his son, Paul, is a candidate for trustee.

Clerks will be Claude Reed and Carl Chafin. The election will be held at the American Legion Hall.

Five men have filed as candidates to fill two places. Members whose terms are expiring are R. B. Howell and Guy Robinson, both candidates for re-election. Other candidates are Hoge, A. P. Denton and J. T. Gilpin.

Also to be elected is a county trustee from the Knox City precinct. Ben Farmer, incumbent, is a candidate for re-election and has no opposition.

Separate ballots will be used for the two elections.

All eligible voters in the school district were urged to go to the polls Saturday.

The O'Brien Co-op Gin office will be the voting place for residents of the O'Brien school district in the trustee election to be held Saturday, it was announced this week.

Two places on the board will be filled from a slate of four candidates, Ray V. Stark, O'Brien superintendent, said. Milton Rowan and R. H. Underwood, present board members, are candidates for re-election, and other candidates are Oather Poe and Orville Manning.

On a separate ballot Tolbert Beason, present member of the Haskell County board of trustees, is an unopposed candidate for re-election.

Mr. Stark urged all residents of the school district to vote in the election.

On the ballot in the school trustee election at Benjamin Saturday will be seven candidates—with only one position on the board to be filled.

Earl Cox, present board member, is opposed for re-election by Howard Barnett, Pat Meizer, Albert Alexander, Bill Ryder, Jr., Willard Kilgore and Leon Bivens.

Another election will be held in the Benjamin school district Saturday, April 9, to decide if the Benjamin Common School District shall be converted to an independent school district.

A public meeting to discuss the matter is to be held in the district court room tonight.
