Texas Schools Need Interest of Public, Speaker Tells Lions

The Texas Public School system is facing three major problems. E. L. Galvean of Austin, director of research and records for the Texas State Teachers Association, told members of the Knox City Lions Club Wednesday.

Galyean listed the problems as: (1) Lack of adequate buildings and facilities: (2) Scarcity qualified teaching personnel; and (3) A lack of public understanding of the first two problems.

Educators have been fairly successful in waking the public to the need for more classrooms, the speaker said. However, with the schools gaining 75,000 children for the two elections. each year, 2,500 classrooms are tion is not keeping up with the need
