

Details Given On Proposed Cotton Research; Mark Your Ballots and Return To Your Local ASC Office

Producers of upland cotton will receive two ballots to be marked and mailed to the ASCS County Office during the period December 5 through the 9th, Arnold J. Navritil, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee said today.

One ballot is on marketing quotas for the 1967 upland cotton crop, the Chairman explained, and the other is to determine whether a research and promotion order should be issued for upland cotton. The two ballots are entirely separate, although the mail referendums are being held at the same time.

The Chairman pointed out that officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service (C&MS) have recently announced the following determinations regarding the vote on the proposed research and promotion program:

- Producers who shared in the 1966 upland cotton crop or its proceeds are eligible to vote in the referendum; where no cotton was planted in 1966 or an allotment farm only the owner and his operator may vote. Each producer is entitled to only one "yes" or "no" vote.
- Approval by two-thirds of the producers voting, or by a majority of producers voting if that majority accounts for two-thirds of the cotton represented in the referendum, is necessary

if the order is to become effective.

If it is necessary to calculate the volume of production by voters to determine the outcome of the referendum, ASCS county offices will make this calculation on the basis of their records of 1966 planted acreage and projected lint yield per acre for each farm.

A farmer with additional production in a county or State other than the county in which he is eligible to vote must establish that interest with his ASCS county office prior to the closing of the referendum on December 9, 1966, in order for that production to be considered.

C&MS officials explain that the proposed cotton research and promotion program, authorized by new legislation, would be administered by a Cotton Board composed of members nominated by cotton producing organizations and selected by the Secretary of Agriculture.

The program would be financed through assessments of \$1 per bale from upland cotton producers, to be collected by cotton handlers designated by the Cotton Board. Collections from any producer who did not wish to contribute would be refunded upon written application. Assessment would start at the beginning of the ginning season for the 1967 crop.

Survivors include one son, J. P. of Roswell, N. M.; one daughter, Ruth Papworth of Knox City; three grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Maggie Youngblood of Lubbock and Mrs. Sallie Waldron of Morton.

Near-Perfect Weather Keeps Gins Extra Busy

In weather that has been perfect as far as harvest is concerned, and with a freeze eliminating the need for the usual defoliation, all fields were ready for machine cotton harvesting at one time. Last week the local cotton gin yards were covered up, and trailers were at a premium.

Damp weather, with no appreciable rainfall, did keep men out of the fields for several days, thus helping cotton gins to "catch up."

In a report Wednesday morning, one ginner estimated that probably 75% of the cotton was in, and he said this was a little ahead of last year at this time.

Gin manager Charles Reese of the Brazos Valley Gin reports that they have ginned 1696 bales as of early Wednesday a. m. Manager of Paymaster Gin, John Crownover, reports 909 bales and O'Brien Co-Op Gin manager S. J. Reeves Jr. reports 3998 bales.

The 141-member organization, known as "The Show Window of TCU," is observing its 61st anniversary this year. Composed of 85 men and 56 women from 29 states and three foreign countries, the band practices its routines and precision drills three after- noons each week, putting in a total of more than 2,000 man hours toward production of one-half time show of six and a half minutes.

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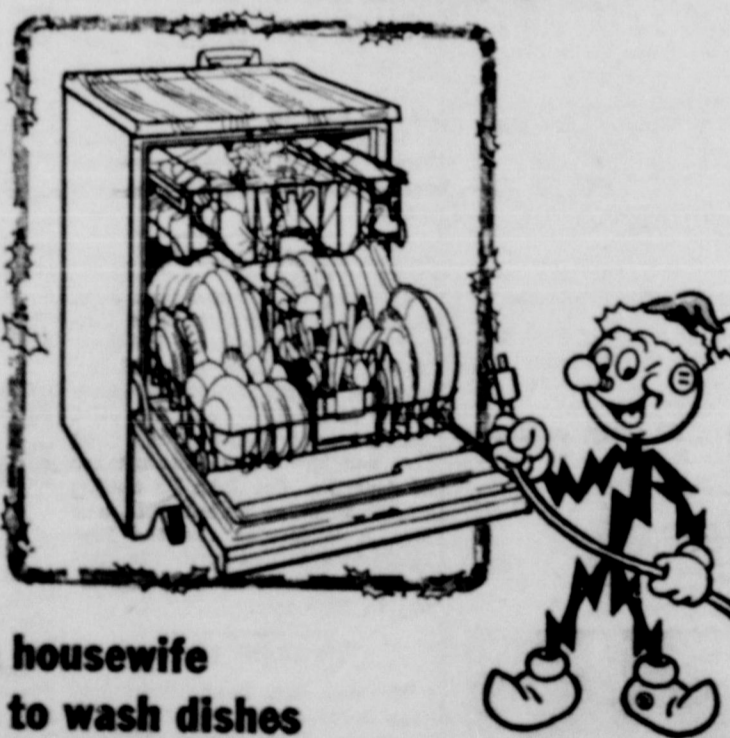

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Cotton Classing Office Returns From Munday

The Munday Cotton Classing Office, of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, returned from Munday, Texas, after a week ending November 25, for the biggest week of the season, according to A. D. Peebles, in charge of the office. This brings the total for the season to over 43,500 samples.

Consumer and Marketing service statistics for the week show grades averaging slightly lower, with 2 percent of the cotton in the White grades; 79 percent in the Light Spotted grades, 17 percent in the Spotted grades and 1 percent in the Tinged grades. 19 percent of the samples were reduced in grade because of bark or grass. Leading grades for the week were Middling Light Spotted 38 percent, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, 39 percent, and Middling Spotted 10 percent.

Peebles said staple lengths averaged about the same as the previous week. The range was about as follows: 7-8 inch and shorter 2 percent, 29-32, 40 percent; 15-16, 53 percent, 31-32, 3 percent and 1 inch and longer, 1 percent.

Micronaire readings for the week show more cotton in the lower "mike" ranges with less in the

high range, and about the same amount in the 3.5-4.9 premium range. About 6 percent was in the 3.4 or lower range; 75 percent and 17 percent 5.0 higher.

Volume of cotton selling at most points continued rather moderate, with little change in prices. Cotton Division summaries show prices mostly ranging from 25 to 65 points above loan value for Light Spotted grades, which were selling greatest in volume.

Average selling prices during the week for the predominate grades were Mid Lt Sp, 15-16, 18.85 cents per pound, Sim Lt. Sp. 15-16, 17.80 cents and Mid Sp 29-32, 16.85 cents per pound.

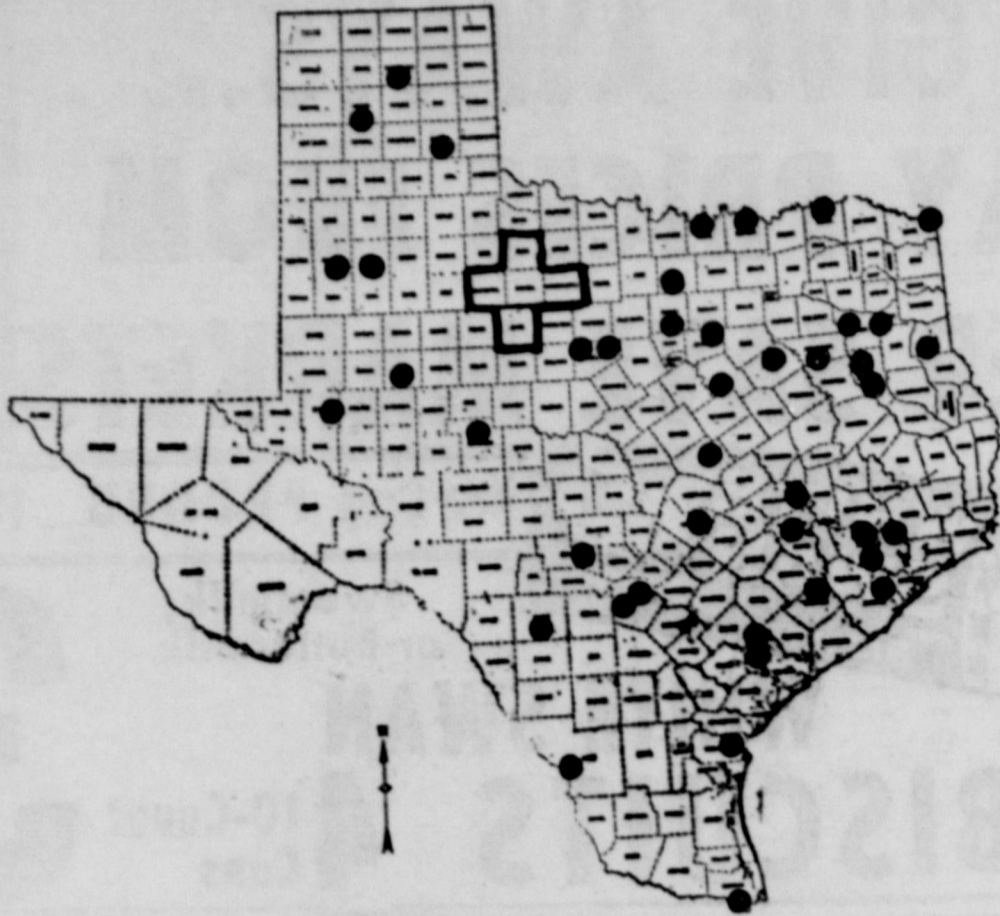
Her title is a member of the Fraternal Visitation Committee, Grand Chapter of Texas, Order of the Eastern Star.

Blind Spot In Junior College

The above map was prepared by B. W. Musgraves, former chairman of the Junior College Division, Texas Education Agency, and a frequent visitor in this area, since the project was launched to establish a junior college in a five county area.

Comprising the five county area are Jones, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Knox and Haskell counties. It points up most graphically the advantageous position in

which the five county area under consideration would be, so far as substantiating a need is concerned.

This immediate area is located in Dead Center of one of the two largest "blind spots" in the entire state where there are no junior colleges. The circle pinpoints the spot where 33 public junior colleges, such as being sought for this area, and 10 privately operated junior colleges

are located in Texas. (Map reproduced through the courtesy of Mr. Musgraves and the Area Junior College Development Fund)

The petition for a junior college has been presented to the State Coordinating Board of Colleges and Universities and referred to the research committee, and after study of the program for this area, the committee recommended that Jones County be added. A survey of the five-county area reveals enough scholastics to create an area junior college.

"The meeting held on Monday night, November 14, saw a discussion by Dr. David W. Hunt, native West Texan, Assistant Commissioner of Education and director of the junior college division as the principal speaker. He discussed the overall master plan for a state-wide Junior College system of education. Mr. Hunt's father, Dr. J. W. Hunt, was at one time president of McMurry College, Abilene. The speaker's brother, Dr. Anthony Hunt, is president of the Howard Junior College.

During the past two years Mrs. Burkett has pointed out time, again that the development of a junior college in this area is very important and may be the thing that spells success rather than failure for the future citizens of our area. "The support, influence and encouragement is needed for the success of the education program in our area," Mrs. Burkett said.

Social S. Benefits For Students

If you are a student between 18 and 22, and the son or daughter of a working parent who is retired or disabled, or who had died, you may be eligible for a monthly benefit check from social security.

Edwin Draughon, social security manager in Vernon, explained that the 1965 Amendments to the Social Security Act provided for student benefits in order to encourage and aid young people in continuing their education. To qualify, the student must be in full time attendance at an accredited high school, vocational school, college, junior college or university.

Think you might qualify? Mr. Draughon urges you to visit the local office of social security and get the facts. Representatives will discuss the requirements and help you complete an application for the benefits.

Anyone who is now receiving social security benefits and is under 18, will have his or her monthly benefits continue until they are 22, if they remain in school. All they will need to do is advise the Social Security Adm. of their school attendance beyond age 18.

Young people who had their social security benefits stopped when they became 18, should apply again if they are full-time students under 22.



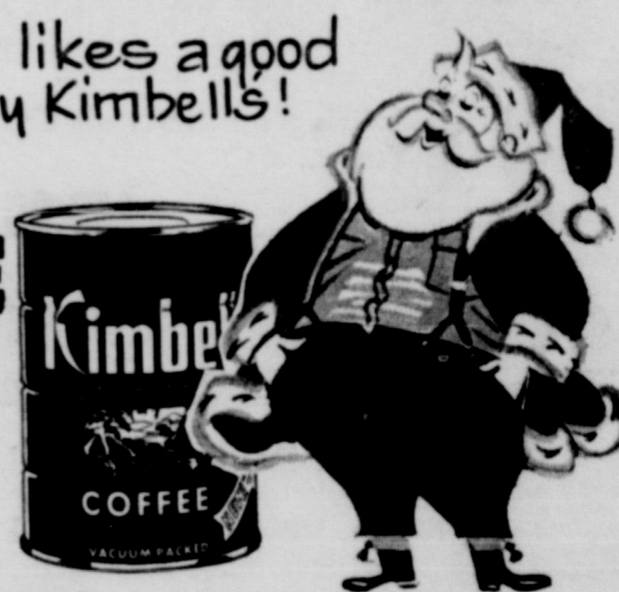

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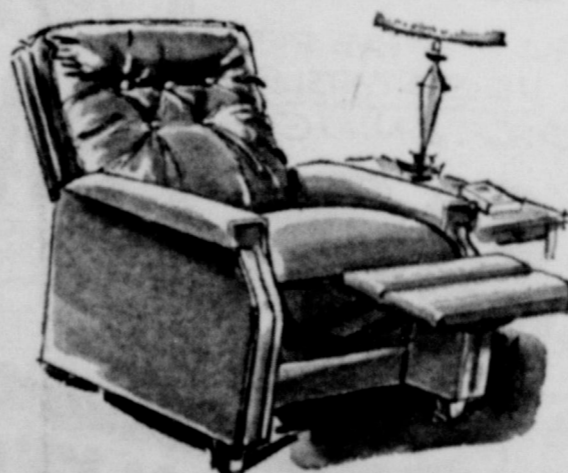
