Expressing deep concern about tendencies abroad, President Roosevelt Friday night spoke out for world peace, but at the same time warned that this country could and would defend itself and its neighborhood. "I hate war," said the President in a foreign affairs speech urging a building of public opinion for neutrality if war should break out on another continent. He asserted that some would seek to evade neutrality in order to gain riches. He expressed anxiety over the conditions centering around the conflict between the Spanish rebels and the Spanish government.

When there is thought of war coming from every part of the world, the old discussion of the preparedness of war appears. Senator Borah, former chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations committee, issued a public statement through the press on January 22, 1928. He cited the World War in refutation of the value of preparedness, and said: "The nations responsible for it were armed to the teeth. They have bled their people white in the name of the hoary lie that, arms means peace." But there is always another angle if we desire to avoid insult, we must be able to oppose it. If the problem of war and armaments was in the hands of the women of the nations, they would in Carrie Nations' style dump all thoughts of war and implements in the oceans and say, "Let Peace reign among us all." Men love physical combats; women must teach the next generation that combats do not mean progress.

Nathan Gruben Seriously Injured

Whatley, pastor of the First Baptist church, conducted the service at the Clifton home and burial was made in the Willow cemetery.

George was riding with Nathan Gruben at the time of the accident, said to have been caused by a tire blowout. The car swayed over the pavement some distance then left the road and turned over three times. George was killed and Nathan Gruben was seriously injured. Which of the two was driving at the time of the accident is yet undetermined. Passing motorists carried them to the Seymour Hospital.

George Clifton, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Clifton, was born August 2, 1892, Haskell Texas, where he spent most of his life. On December 29, 1915 he was married to Miss Fannie Lee Fitzgerald to which union two children were born, both dying in infancy.
