Mr. Lanier began his business career in Knox County where he established the Knox County Sun.

In 1910 he and his family moved to Crowell, and he had made his home there until his death. He entered the mercantile business, later forming a partnership in the grocery business with the late J. W. Ellis. He remained in the grocery and hardware business for a number of years. Several years ago he joined his three sons, J. H. Jr., G. T. and R. R. Lanier, in the finance business which remained an active enterprise with him as president of the United Finance Corporation at the time of his death. The company has an office in Knox City, managed by Mr. Lanier's sister, Mrs. Carrie Belle Benedict.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, J. H. Lanier, Jr., of Crowell, G. T. Lanier of Bakersfield, Calif., R. R. Lanier of Amarillo; one daughter, Miss Alyne Lanier of Bakersfield, Calif.; one sister, Mrs. Benedict of Knox City; five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Her memory was still vivid, and friends enjoyed listening to her accounts of the Civil War days.

Her husband, John, has been dead for 38 years. Mrs. Miller made her home in Rochester with a granddaughter, Zeola Corley.

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

Ground Observer Corps Organized in Truscott Community

TRUSCOTT, Jan. 17.—Sgt. Wilson, who is stationed in Dallas with the air force, was in Truscott Friday night to organize a ground observer post.
After showing pictures he made a talk on the purpose of observation posts. "Civil defense rests on the principle of self-protection on the part of groups and communities. The individuals who fill the positions of observers are volunteers. They are drawn from all walks of life, and include men and women from farms and cities. They volunteer their time to spot and report the movement of aircraft," the sergeant said.
Qualifications, as listed by Sgt. Wilson, are: Any loyal American with normal hearing; normal eyesight or corrected to normal when wearing glasses; ability to speak clearly and distinctly so that his aircraft flash message can be accurately received at the filter cen-

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

Patrol Captain Warns Motorists of Inspection Deadline

Long lines of vehicles at the doors of the State's 4,000 licensed inspection stations appear to be imminent unless many motorists make haste to have their cars inspected right away.

That was the warning Friday of Capt. K. B. Hallmark, commanding officer of the Wichita Falls district of the Texas Highway Patrol.

The Patrol Captain said that some three million motor vehicles in Texas have yet to be inspected during the current inspection period which ends April 15. He noted that of the 89,131 vehicles registered in the 12 county area of this Patrol District that only 12% have already secured their safety checks in spite of the fact that just three more months remain during which they must secure new approved inspection stickers. Hallmark cautioned that Patrolmen and local officers would begin issuing tickets on April 16 to operators of all vehicles not bearing a current sticker. He said that a maximum penalty of \$200 could be assessed by the courts for this violation.

Washington Letter

By Congressman Frank Ikard

This week I have introduced two bills in the House, the first of which will be known as H. R. 8361 and which will permit a home owner to deduct as an expense for income tax purposes repairs that he made to his residence, including painting and papering to the extent that such expenses do not exceed \$500. This would apply only to a person's principal place of residence. This bill should encourage home ownership in that it will remove some of the penalties that are now imposed from a tax standpoint upon those who are home owners. In all probability, this bill will be considered by the committee sometime within the next two or three months, and I am hopeful that favorable action will be taken on it by the committee and Congress.

The other bill, H. R. 8362, would relieve the farmers from the 2-cent Federal excise tax on gasoline and lubricating oils used exclusively in farm tractors, farm machinery, or other agricultural purposes. It is highly probable that action will be taken on this bill in the House within the next two weeks. In view of the fact that the Federal excise taxes on gasoline and lubricating oil are imposed theoretically for the purpose of raising funds for Federal highway improvement, it is not right that those people who use gasoline and lubricants off the highways should be taxed for this purpose.

A great deal of time will be spent in the coming weeks discussing the tax program for next year. Any new tax proposal certainly requires very serious consideration as to what effect it will have on the Federal income and the National economy generally. This year we must have definite information as to whether or not the Budget will be balanced. It now appears reasonably certain that on June 30 the Budget will be in balance and that we will have a surplus in the Treasury of somewhere around Four Billion Dollars. If this estimate proves to be correct, and if we can adopt some reasonable plan for the orderly reduction of the National debt, then it seems reasonably certain that we can expect legislation to reduce taxes. Present estimates indicate that we will be able to have tax reductions probably in the personal income tax field

in the overall amount of around Two Billion Dollars and still make some provisions for the reduction of the debt and keep the Budget in balance for the next fiscal year.

To get some idea of the volume of legislative work here, it is interesting to know that last year during the first session of the 84th Congress 11,914 bills were introduced in the House. Since the beginning of the second session the first part of January this year, there have been 500 bills introduced in the House and 157 in the Senate which brings the total number of bills introduced during this Congress to 12,471.

Mails Handled More Efficiently During Holidays

Public cooperation today was credited with improved handling of a record volume of Christmas mail in this area. George A. Gray, director of the Post Office Department's Texas-Louisiana Region, said reports now being made to his office in Dallas indicate that there was about a six per cent increase in mail over Christmas of 1954. Postal revenues also increased about six per cent while work hours were up only two per cent.

In Knox City, Postmaster Jeff Graham reports that Christmas mail was up 5 per cent, while work hours were reduced six per cent.

This increased efficiency, which is reflected in reports from the larger offices of the region, is traceable to the best cooperation from the public the Post Office has ever had," Mr. Gray said.

He cited an unprecedented amount of publicity by newspapers and radio and television stations urging the public to separate, face and bundle letters and to mail early.

"The public responded remarkably," he declared. "Most people with Christmas cards to mail carefully separated them into local and out-of-town bundles and faced them for quick processing through cancelling machines, speeding up the dispatch of outgoing mail and helping postal workers keep pace with the deluge that gave the Department its biggest volume in history."

The regional official concluded that this public cooperation and the good work of postal employees and transportation companies kept the mail flowing smoothly. "There was no delayed mail in post offices in Texas and Louisiana on Christmas Eve," he said, "and I give a great deal of credit to the publicity by press, radio and television."

The Post Office "Mail Early" campaign is a continuing thing, he explained, but except at Christmas time it pertains to mailing early in the day.

Clint Harbers Named "Farmer of Year"

Clinton Harbers, outstanding young farmer in Fayette County, Texas, was today named "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture."

"In less than four years, this young muscular, ex-GI, has become better known than any other farmer in Texas—particularly if you narrow it down to working farmers," says C. G. Scruggs, associate editor of The Progressive Farmer.

By using good soil conservation methods, insect control, and other farming knowhow, Harbers has easily tripled his yields and income.

Harbers borrowed money to buy a farm in 1947. He started going to GI agricultural classes and became a cooperater in the Bastrop-Fayette soil Conservation District.

In 1953, Clinton Harbers received the \$5,000 Hohlitzelle Award for the Outstanding Contribution to Texas Rural Life awarded by the Texas Research Foundation.
