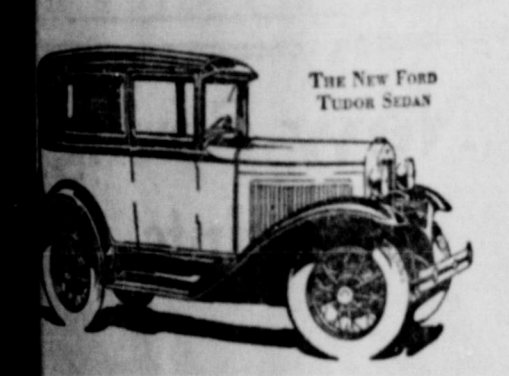

OPERA

Deems Taylor, American composer has had another opera produced in New York. That doesn't mean much to most people. Grand opera is a form of musical entertainment which appeals to only a comparatively few people, with highly developed musical tastes. One reason is that the theme of grand opera is always tragic. Most of us prefer so-called "light" opera, which is tuneful and amusing.

To be accepted by any of the world's great opera-houses, of which there are not more than a dozen, however, is a great triumph, for any composer. For only musical compositions which are purely original in every phrase and bar can pass the rigid tests.

Few composers of popular music are original. Nearly all of them feign old musical themes, most of them originally composed by the composer of grand opera.

CHAPLIN

The funny little English Jew who has for years been the world's most popular entertainer has proved once more that, in the hands of really competent artists, pantomime, is as effective as words. Charlie Chaplin's new picture is a "silent" film, one of the kind that needs no translation to make it intelligible to everybody, whatever language they may speak. Long ago Chaplin began to discard "titles" from his pictures relying on the actions alone to tell the story. And he has a larger following and has made more money than any other figure in the pictures.

There was a time when it seemed as if the movie would make it necessary for actors to learn the art of expressing emotions by action, but the talkies have dispelled that hope. It is so much easier to do it with words, but also so much less effective. It takes a real artist to be a good pantomimist, and except for Chaplin and W. C. Fields I think of no first-rate pantomimist playing either on the stage or in the pictures.

SILVER

Forty years ago the dominant political issue in the United States was whether we should put silver on an equality with gold as the basis of money, by coining silver without restriction at the ratio of sixteen ounces of silver to the one ounce of gold. That would have given silver a stable price in the world's market of \$1.25 an ounce, or thereabouts, gold being worth about \$20 an ounce.

Only once has the price of silver reached the ratio of 16 to 1. That was in 1915-1920, when for two years the price ranged between \$1.25 and \$1.24 an ounce on the London market. Early in February this year silver was sold in London and New York for 26 1/2 cents an ounce! The principal reason for this is the establishment of the currency of India on a gold basis in 1926 leaving in the hands of the Indian government some five hundred million ounces of silver bullion to dispose of, of which only about a fifth has found a market.

There is not enough gold today to meet the world's needs as a basis of money. There was a long period after the gold discoveries in the Rand and the Klondike, when there was more gold than was needed. Probably the present situation will revive the movement for bimetalism. But in time we shall measure money values neither by silver nor gold but by the average supply and demand

DEATH

The automobile death toll for 1930 has been compiled, and it is a terrifying record 32,500 Americans were killed in motor accidents, an average of almost a hundred a day. Nearly a million others were injured, 962,325, to be exact. The total number of automobile accidents reported for the year was 835,250.

These figures mean only one thing reckless driving. Not fast driving, necessarily, for one may drive recklessly at 20 miles an hour. Turning a sharp corner at even that speed is reckless driving. Almost half of the deaths occurred when a car struck a pedestrian. Sometimes it was the pedestrian's fault, of course. A quarter of those killed were crossing streets in the middle of a block. Less than a quarter of the deaths occurred from collision with another car.

The pitiful thing about the figures for 1930 is the number of children between five and ten who were killed in motor accidents was nearly double during the year.

Two things may help this needless slaughter. Every state should require a license after an examination, before anyone is permitted to drive a car. And every person should of reckless driving should have his or her license revoked and in aggravated cases be sent to prison without the option of a fine.

From State Depart- ment of Agriculture

Austin, Texas, Feb. 18, Complaints
charging excessive bills on natural
gas have been more numerous this
year than ever before, according to
M. S. Frazee chief of the division
of weights and measures in the state
department of agriculture.

So many requests have been made
for services of the sole inspector as-
signed to this work that it has been
impossible for him to give the im-
mediate service requested.

While the inspector was investigat-
ing complaints from the Rio Grande
valley, a hurry up call came from
Dallas county for the state's testing
apparatus, followed by requests
from such widely separated counties
as Grayson and Reeves. Many other
complaints are on file, some of them
brought by delegations who made
special trips here for the purpose.

The inspector will attempt to an-
swer all calls for his services as fast
as possible, Frazee said.

Investigations often disclose faulty
meters, the division chief said, but
he suggested that citizens in the com-
plaining cities also look to the qual-
ity of their gas. The weights and
measures division does not report on
quality.

other advantages besides the use of
mott cotton which farmers should
consider in comparing the relative
merits of cotton and jute bagging,
according to W. E. Williams, chief
cotton classifier, and R. H. Fincher,
gin inspector chief in the state de-
partment of agriculture.

One point overlooked, they pointed
out, is that cotton from a bale
wrapped in cotton bagging, would
not adhere to the bagging when it is
removed, as it sticks to jute bag-
ging. Jute, a coarse material pulls off
a quantity of cotton when it is
taken from the bale, ranging, ac-
cording to Williams, from a half
pound to two and one half pounds.
While this may seem an inconsid-
erable amount on a 500 pound bale,
the amount, when computed in terms
of the total cotton crop, becomes
worthy of consideration. The amount
lost depends upon the dampness of
the bale.

One of the principal arguments
against the cotton bagging has been
that it weighed less, the farmer
erroneously believing that the buy-
er pays for the jute when he pur-
chases a bale. Fincher declared that
the buyer does not pay for the weight
of the bagging, but figures his price
with the estimated weight of the bag-
ging deducted. The difference in
weight between the two types of
bagging is very small, however, it
has been estimated that if cotton
were substituted for jute, an addition-
al market for 500,000 bales would
be opened.

Editors Note: I read last night
where the world's supply of bagging
would use 3,333,333 bales of cotton.
If used would cause cotton to ad-
vance \$50.00 a bale.

TEXAS ALMANAC OF 1931 ISSUED
BY DALLAS NEWS

The Texas Almanac and State In-
dustrial Guide, edition of 1931 which
has just been issued by the Dallas
Morning News, might more properly
be called an encyclopedia of Texas.
Nearly everything one might wish to
know about Texas is found in this
new volume. Among the subjects cov-
ered in articles and statistics are ag-
riculture and live stock raising, man-
ufacturing, commerce, finance, min-
erals, railroads, highways and auto-
mobiles, aviation, foreign commerce,
geography and physiography, forests
and lumber production, irrigation
and reclamation, wild animal, bird
and fish resources, population, his-
tory, government, education and
churches and religious organizations.

New census figures are given.
There are several hundred articles
and statistical tables containing sev-
eral hundred thousand facts about
Texas. There is a full text of the
State Constitution, with explanation
of each of the fifty-one amendments
that have been ratified since adop-
tion of the Constitution in 1876.
Constitution of the United States is
included also. A folded sheet carries
on one side a political and railroad
map. There are about 3,000 names
and addresses of Federal and State
officials, county and district officials,
Mayors, school superintendents,
chamber of commerce secretaries,
writers, painters, musicians and
others.

Questions such as the following
can be answered from the Texas Al-
manac: When was Fort Phantom
Hill established? Where? What is
the highest mountain and what is
the deepest canyon in Texas? What
was the acreage, production and
value of broom corn in Texas in
1929? How many airplane landing
fields are there in Texas? What rail-
road projects are to be under con-
struction in 1931? How many kinds
of native oak trees are found in
Texas? What was the 1930 census
population of Winters, Texas?

The new Texas Almanac contains
an article about each of the 251
counties, also brief articles about
the more important cities and towns.
While the primary purpose of the
Texas Almanac is to give information
about Texas, certain other informa-
tion of general interest is given. The
new edition has 324 pages, is printed
on book paper and is illustrated with
a number of half tones. The price is
60c a copy by mail.

"MATCHES-SMOKING"

So many fires started by matches
are due to the carelessness of smok-
ers that the Texas Fire Insurance
Insurance Department has combined
the hazards under the twin desig-
nation, "Matches-Smoking" and to-
day it leads all other causes in its
with an annual total charge against
responsibility for fire destruction,
with an annual total charge against
it approximating the huge sum of
\$30,000,000 in the United States.

No match is safe. Besides the pos-
sibility of staying lighted after it is
discarded, the head may fly off when
struck or ignition may occur by
some means other than its normal
use. Each year about Three Hundred
Billion matches are consumed, in the
United States alone, or Eight Hun-
dred Thousand daily. Every time your
hand strikes a match be sure what
becomes of the burning stick. It may
result in the destruction of your
home and perhaps the lives of those
in it. Never cast away a matchstick
if it is still flaming, or even glowing
because it is only too likely to ignite
any inflammable material at hand.

Every day children are losing their
lives while playing with matches as
shown from news reports over the
country. Matches should be kept in
metal or earthenware containers
well out of the reach of children.

Watch the careless smoker; notice
where he throws his matches, cigars
and cigarettes when he has finished
with them; stamp out any sparks
you may see. Give people special
an emphatic warning against the
danger of smoking in bed.

The total fire loss in Texas caused
by "Matches-Smoking" during 1929
was approximately \$1,100,879. We
are hoping that our 1930 losses from
this cause will show a decline when
they have been compiled. We can
reduce our 1931 losses from this
cause if all the people in Texas will
exercise proper care with "Match-
es and Smoking", and we urge upon
them the importance of "Fire Pre-
vention" from this particular cause.
