The total fire loss in Texas caused by "Matches-Smoking" during 1929 was approximately \$1,100,879. We are hoping that our 1930 losses from this cause will show a decline when they have been compiled. We can reduce our 1931 losses from this cause if all the people in Texas will exercises proper care with "Matches and Smoking", and we urge upon them the importance of "Fire Prevention" from this particular cause.
