## Harbert Out Of City Race

Otis Harbert, whose name was announced last week as a candidate for alderman in the city election April 5, told city officials this week that he will not be a candidate, and asked that his name not be put on the ballot.

Harbert's withdrawal leaves eight candidates on the ballot, from which five aldermen will be elected. Election of a full slate of alderman was made necessary by the fact that Knox City changed to the aldermanic form of city government in a special election last July.

Candidates are O. A. Green, W. F. Shannon, G. W. Coats and Doyle Graham, all incumbents, and E. R. Carpenter, Russell Boyd, Z. E. Cone and Ottis Cash.

Candidates for mayor are Buddy Angle, now a city alderman, and Barney Arnold. Mayor Guy Glenn, who has served two terms in the office, did not seek re-election.

Loyce Teague will be a candidate for re-election as city judge.

## One-Act Play Contest To Be at Rochester

"Grandma Fixes Things" is the title of Knox City's entry in the Interscholastic League One-Act Play contest which will be held in Rochester Tuesday afternoon, March 22.

Mrs. June Tankersley is director. Members of the cast are Genie Guinn, Cornelia Tidwell, Pansy Wilcox, Fiolene Dutton, Shelby Bishop, James Busby, Jimmie Leach and Paul Burt.

Knox City's play will be the first one presented in the contest, beginning at 3:30.

Mrs. Maxine Hamilton of Rochester is in charge of the contest. Other schools entered are Weinert, O'Brien, Rochester, Rule, Munday, Woodson and Paint Creek.

## Corley Receives Suspended Term

Hut Corley, accused of theft of a Four Sixes Ranch calf in May, 1953, entered a guilty plea and was given a two-year suspended sentence in his second trial in 50th Judicial District Court at Guthrie Monday.

Corley was first tried in December of 1953, when he pleaded not guilty. The jury rendered a verdict of guilty and sentenced him to two years, recommending that the sentence be suspended. Since Corley had not asked for suspension, however, the judge could not suspend the sentence.

Corley's attorney, T. R. Odell of Lubbock and Judson Balch of Seymour, appealed to the Court of Criminal Appeals, which upheld the lower court's decision. On a motion for rehearing, however, the appeals court reversed and remanded the case to the lower court for retrial.

Presiding judge in both trials was District Judge Lewis M. Williams. Former District Attorney Roy Jones was prosecutor in the first trial and District Attorney A. W. Davis was prosecutor in the second. Hubert Watson of Stamford was special prosecutor in both trials.

## Fourteen Schools Are Entered In O'Brien Track Meet

All schools invited to enter in O'Brien's "Night Track Meet" have accepted except Bronte, Coach Elvin Mathis said Wednesday.

The meet will be held Tuesday, March 29.

Planning to participate are Benjamin, Vera, Goree, Weinert, Munday, Mattson, Paint Creek, Rule, Rochester, Aspermont, Lueders, Avoca and Knox City.

Three divisions are planned for the meet: high school, junior high school, and grade school teams. Individual entries have been limited to two in the events, to keep the meet from getting too big to handle, Mathis said.

The afternoon session will begin about 3:30 and continue until about 5:30. The evening events will begin at 7.

Many fans are expected to attend the evening session, since it will be the first opportunity for many working people in this area to see some good running.

## Fire Alarm to Warn Benjamin Residents Of Tornado Danger

The Benjamin Fire Department announced plans this week for using the "small" fire whistle, which is not used as a fire alarm, as a tornado warning for Benjamin residents.

Sounding of the warning, members of the department said, will not necessarily mean that a storm is imminent—it will simply mean that tornado conditions exist in the area and that everyone should be watchful.

The small fire whistle will not be used for any other purpose.

## Cotton Men Alarmed Over World Market, S. N. Reed Reports

S. N. Reed, who has just returned from the National Cotton Council at Memphis, Tenn., said this week that cotton men in the South are alarmed over the world cotton situation.

Mr. Reed is president of the National Cotton Ginners Association.

Every cotton producing country in the world except the United States and China, Reed said, is rapidly increasing its production. He remarked that 700,000 acres of new land in Mexico is being put in cotton.

"As we curtail our production by acreage controls," he said, "the rest of the world increases its production. We are now producing little more than enough for domestic consumption."

American gin machinery companies, he said, last year sold more machinery in other countries than in the United States.

"Something must be done," Mr. Reed said, "to protect our world market for cotton."

## Mexican Minister To Bring Program at Assembly of God

Rev. A. C. Enriquez, pastor of the Spanish Assembly of God Church in Munday, will be guest speaker at the missionary service to be held at the local Assembly of God Church Friday night, March 25 beginning at 7:30. Rev. James C. Nelson, pastor, has announced.

Rev. Enriquez' message will be on Mexico and Cuba. He will bring a group of young people and his musicians with him for the service.

Bids on street paving and drainage improvements will be received by the City of Knox City until 7:30 p. m. April 14, it was announced this week.

Knox Citizens approved a \$125,000 bond issue for the projects in February, 1954. The projects were delayed by engineering problems and by the difficulty of securing right-of-way for the proposed drainage system.

The original bond issue was earmarked as follows:

- \$30,000 to enlarge and improve sewage disposal plant.
- \$10,000 for extending water distribution lines to new residential areas.
- \$50,000 for street paving.
- \$35,000 for drainage improvements.

It was announced at the time, however, that the funds could be changed from one project to another as needed, and it was anticipated that enough funds would be available for paving to pave as many streets as property owners, cared to pave. According to the original plans the city was to pay one-third of the cost of paving, curbing and guttering, while the property owners on each side of the street were to pay one-third each.

Bids on paving and drainage improvements must be accompanied by cashiers' checks or bidders' bonds in the amount of \$6,000, and bids on improvements by checks or bonds in the amount of \$1,000, as assurance that the successful bidder will enter into a contract and execute a performance bond within fifteen days after the contract is awarded to him.

The successful bidder must furnish a performance bond of 100 percent of his total bid.

According to the advertisement for bids, the paving and drainage improvements will include: approximately 54,000 square yards of grading for paving, 54,000 square yards of triple asphaltic surface treatment on 8-inch two-course gravel base, 24,500 feet of concrete curb and gutter including grading, 12,000 cubic yards of drainage excavation, and removing 25 5'x2' concrete culverts with a total length of 830 feet.

The sewage improvements will consist of a small primary treating plant and an intercepting sewer, and will include approximately 150 cubic yards of concrete, 11,000 pounds of steel, 1,100 cubic yards of excavation, 700 feet of 12 inch sewers and 450 feet of 10-inch sewer, three manholes, and 120 cubic yards of sand and gravel for sludge drying beds.

Mayor Guy Glenn says he expects work to begin in about 30 days from the time the contracts are awarded.

Nitrogen was the limiting factor in production. There was no response to either phosphorus or potassium applied alone. Applying 30 pounds of nitrogen increased yields as effectively as applying 60 pounds. After the nitrogen requirements were met, cotton responded to phosphorus and potassium applied in combination.

Results of the experiments show that on Miles fine sand, cotton yielded 239 pounds when no fertilizer was used. With the addition of 30 pounds of nitrogen yields were 375 pounds, an increase of 136 pounds of lint cotton per acre. With the use of 30 pounds each of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, yields were increased to 392 pounds, or an increase of 153 pounds of lint over the check

**plots.**  
On grain sorghums, yields were 777 pounds without fertilizer. Thirty pounds of nitrogen increased yields to 1510 pounds while applications of 30-30-30 increased the yield 1880 pounds of grain per acre.

These experiments were conducted under dry land conditions and fertilizer was applied at the bottom of the lister furrow, about three inches to the side of the seed, at the time of planting.

**Headaches Can Be Danger Signals, Health Officer Says.**

AUSTIN. — A man's best friend can be his headache, according to Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. This is hard to believe when your head is throbbing with pain, but the truth is that a headache is most often Nature's signal that all is not right in your little world.

That's because a headache is not an ailment itself, but a symptom of something else. That "something else" may be as simple a problem as too much food and excitement the night before; it may, on the other hand, be a serious threat to bodily health. In either case, it is a warning that you should act immediately, in the one case by slowing down the tempo of your social life, in the other by seeking the advice of your physician.

Headaches can be caused by fatigue, by infection, by allergy,

by an injury or by an emotional disturbance. But all of them fall into three categories: mechanical, toxic and functional.

A headache from eyestrain, overwork or inflammation of the sinuses is a mechanical one; headache caused by too much acid in the body, by constipation, by over indulgence in alcohol, by inhaling certain gas fumes, all of which slow up the blood circulation, are toxic headaches. Functional headaches include the oft-mentioned migraine and those caused by high blood pressure.

Most headaches need not cause over-alarm. If they occur infrequently, the trouble is often the "morning after" type, which should, of course, call for the obvious remedy — eliminate the "night before." Or is your office or bedroom properly ventilated? That could be the cause of the trouble.

If headaches recur frequently and under the same conditions and in the same areas of your head, heed the danger signal your own body is giving you. Consult your physician. And don't lean too heavily on the support of aspirin and similar patent remedies. Their aid is only temporary at best and does nothing to affect the real seat of your trouble.



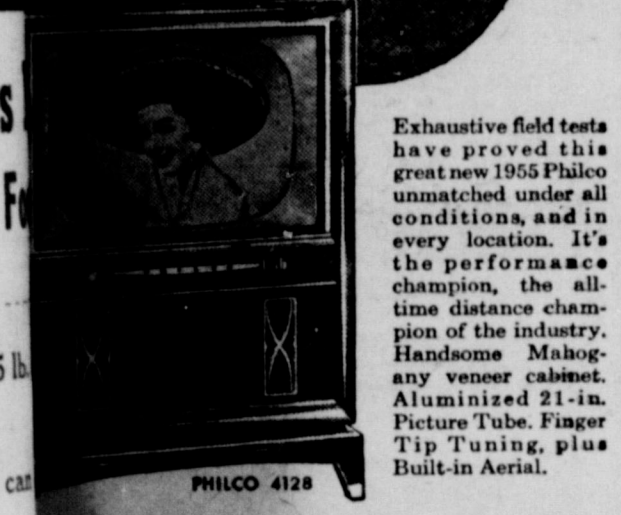
