## Go To School Day Big Success

### Seventh Grade Has Largest Number Visitors

#### Parent-Teacher Program Good

Tuesday "go to school day" for the patrons of the Knox City school, was a pleasing success for the Parent-Teacher Association, sponsor of the day.

While most of the visiting was done in the afternoon a good number of patrons visited in the various rooms in which had the largest interest and also attended to meeting of the Parent-Teacher Association which was held at three fifteen in the afternoon. The room having the largest number of visitors enrolled was to seventh grade. Their total was 52. This grade received an award of \$1.00 which was offered to the winning grade by the Parent-Teacher Association.

The visits of the patrons in the school held two outstanding features of interest to the patrons. First, the work of the pupils as displayed about the room, and second, the work of the pupils in their class work. Many of the parents visited the grades where they had children and heard them recite. Among the big number who did this were Mr. E. O. Jamison and Mr. O. L. Jamison. They stayed in the seventh grade, Yvonne Jamison's grade, during an entire period. While they felt a great deal of pleasure and satisfaction in hearing these seventh grade boys and girls recite, they would never be able to impart their pleasure to the children, which fact, no doubt make the children somewhat ill at ease and not able to do their best. However, report comes that both these visitors, as well as the many others, were well pleased with the work and response of the children.

A bit of the artistic ability of the pupils was shown in the booklets which several of the grades made as their register for this "go to school" day occasion.

#### Parent-Teacher Program

At the sounding of the bell which ended the school day, members of the Parent-Teacher Association with many of the visitors who were still in the building, gathered in the study hall of the new building and heard an interesting program which was planned for this day.

The program was opened by the singing of a patriotic song by a group of pretty little girls. Following, Miss Carlisle read "A Tribute to Texas" which was written by Bruce Barton. This article was very fine and splendidly given by Miss Carlisle.

Mr. J. W. Cloud gave an interesting discussion of "Facts and Figures" of our school. Among these figures Mr. Cloud stated that the two school buildings of Knox City, valued at what they cost, amounted to some \$5 or \$6 thousand dollars but that if they were placed on sale, they would be valued at only about 40 to 45 thousand dollars. The library of the grades is valued, a very conservative estimate, said Mr. Cloud at \$10,000. The value placed upon the school was not given. ## Businessmen Favor Weekday Base Ball

### Draw Up Resolutions

On the morning of April 18th thirty or more business men and citizens of Knox City met in the city hall for an informal discussion of baseball support and whether or not games shall be played on Sunday during the season which opens this week.

Mr. O. L. Jamison was appointed chairman of the meeting and John A. Wilson secretary. Following, several men present contributed to the discussion of the subject at hand.

Reverend Jim H. Sharp disagreed at some length Sunday playing from an economic and moral standpoint. Reverend Claud B. Stovall was asked for his views. He pointed decisively to the effect of Sunday games upon the spiritual and moral life of the community.

Mr. O. L. Jamison stated his views from a business standpoint that base ball games would be best be scheduled on week days.

Mr. T. E. Robbins expressed his abjection of Sunday base ball.

Mr. Henry White, representing the ball players, expressed his desire to play during the week rather than on Sunday. Several others expressed their opposition to Sunday games.

Following these discussions, by a vote of all present, resolutions concerning the base ball schedule for the year were adopted. Following are the resolutions:

Be it Resolved that we as business men and citizens of Knox City place ourselves on record as preferring week day base ball to Sunday base ball and the representatives of this body sent to other towns supporting this League asking their support in scheduling all games on week days.

### TWO \$150 SADDLES AND FOUR BRIDLES PRIZES FOR BOY REUNION JULY

Stamford, April 20—Through the courtesy of Walter Cousins, Dallas Texas, publisher of the Southern Pharmaceutical Journal and a police cowboy of West Texas, two \$150 saddles and four special-made bridles have been donated as prizes for the rodeo contests to be held in connection with the Texas Cowboy Reunion in Stamford on July 4th, 5th and 6th.

One saddle is to be donated by Carl Weeks of Des Moines, Iowa, as first prize in the old-timers calf roping contest. This saddle is being made by S. D. Myers Saddle Company of El Paso, Texas, under the personal supervision of S. D. Myers. The saddle will be similar to the first prize saddle given at the World Series Rodeo in New York in 1929.

The other saddle is to be given by B. Orr of Columbus, Ohio as a first prize to the champion cowboy in the rodeo contest, and will be made by Sweitzer Saddle Company of Matador, Texas according to specifications furnished by Frank Rhodes of Throckmorton, Texas.

#### 23 Pastoral Charges

For the second time in the history of the Knox City Methodist church the church is entertaining the Stamford District Conference of the Methodist church next week. Some ten years ago Knox City entertained the District conference and on Monday afternoon of next week delegates will begin to arrive in Knox City for the holding of the Conference the second time in the history of Knox City.

The Stamford District includes 23 Pastoral Charges with 250 delegates who are eligible to attend the conference. Knox City is expecting not less than 150 delegates. In addition to these, Reverend Sharp states that we will probably have other delegates from different departments of church interest from over the state. These include such as McMurray College, S. M. U. in Dallas etc.

The first feature of the Conference will be a sermon Monday evening at eight o'clock by the Reverend P. E. Yarbrough from Throckmorton. Other sermons to be delivered during the time will be at eleven o'clock Tuesday morning, at eight Tuesday evening and again at eleven Wednesday morning.

The Conference proper, or business sessions, will begin Tuesday morning at nine o'clock. After the opening of the conference, the honorable Roy Smith, Mayor of the city, will give the welcome address. The business and other features will follow as directed by Dr. G. S. Elover, presiding officer of the conference and Presiding Elder of the District.

#### Arrival of Delegates

As the delegates arrive Monday evening they will be assigned a home and directed thereto where they will be entertained as one of the family. The evening evening meal Monday will be given the delegates by their respective hostesses, as well as breakfast Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. As other delegates arrive Tuesday, they will also be assigned a home in which to stay.

The noon meal Tuesday, the evening meal Tuesday and noon meal Wednesday will be served to all the delegates at the church.

Julien C. Hyer, Fort Worth lawyer and former State Senator, today announced his candidacy for Congressman-At-Large, Place number 3, subject to the action of the Democratic primary. Hyer has practiced law in Fort Worth since his return from France at the conclusion of the World, where he served with the 36th Division, having enlisted as a private in Texas Ambulance Co. No. 1 at Waco, where he was practicing when the United States entered the war. He served in France with the 11th Trench Mortar Battery. Since locating in Fort Worth, Hyer has been active in the affairs of American Legion and other ex-servicemen's organizations. He has served as Post Commander of Botwell Kane Post, is a member of the 40 and 5 and of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He is a graduate of Georgetown University Law School in Washington, D. **BANK FAILURES IN U. S.**

It might be interesting to the public, and especially to our good Hoovervatic friends in Texas, to have the statistics on the bank failures in the United States during the last twenty-one years. Below is given a table showing such bank failures during the ten years prior to Andrew W. Mellon's incumbency as Secretary of the Treasury and the ten years which he served, and for an additional year of his incumbency, 1931, and for January, 1932. The last eight years of the first ten were a Democratic administration since that time we have had the blessed Republican administration.

The table submitted below was presented to the United States Senate by Mr. Blaine, a Republican Senator from Wisconsin, and, at his request was inserted in the Congressional Record of March 2, 1932, at page 5313. Coming from a Republican source, as the actual record, it must be correct and reliable.

It will be noted that the number of failures during 1931 lacks only fourteen of being exactly four times the number during the eight years of Democratic administration; also, that the number during the first year of the present administration is only one-half of the total number during the eight years of Democratic administration; and further, that the number during 1921, the first year of Republican administration, is more than ten times that of the year of the last year of Democratic administration; again that during three years of Mr. Hoover's administration they increased from 491 in 1928 to more than four and one-half times that number 2,298 in 1931.

What became of the profuse and enticing promises of prosperity made in 1928 by Mr. Hoover and the whole blatant coterie of Republican spellbinders?

**'Go To School Day' Continued**

In the grades. The scholastics this year was 391 white children and 22 colored. The scholastics for next year is 359 white and 28 colored. This difference, Mr. Cloud stated, is due to the fact that more children are passing the school age than are arriving at school age.

There are this year about 100 pupils in high school while last year there was an average of about 110. In the grades this year the number is the same as that of last year. The school has 20 affiliated credits. We are asking this year, Mr. Cloud continued, for credit in third year Home Economics and two credits in Spanish. "We feel that we will receive these credits," he stated, "if the state accepts our eight and one-half months as sufficient for the year". Plans now are that school be out the third day of June.

**Dean Reports on Interscholastic Work**

for April 24 ABRAHAM'S GENEROSITY TO LOT Genesis 13:5-15

In ordinary times the old saying is true: "Money makes money." Certainly at all times it is a fact that sheep make sheep. It was so in the case of Abraham and Lot his nephew. They had goodly herds when they left Haran in Mesopotamia and the animals kept on multiplying until both men were cattle owners of real consequence.
