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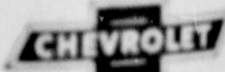

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Peanut Butter Cookies

- 2 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup peanut butter
- 1/2 cup soft shortening
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 2 unbeaten eggs
- 1/4 cup Per Evaporated Milk

Sift together flour, soda and salt. Mix in a 3-qt. bowl until light and fluffy the peanut butter, shortening, granulated and brown sugar. Add about 1/2 of flour mixture at a time, mixing well after each addition. Mix in eggs and milk. Chill dough about 10 min., or until firm enough to handle. Shape into 1-in. balls. Place on ungreased cookie pan about 2 in. apart. Press flat with floured fork. Bake on center rack of 375 oven (high moderate) about 10 min., or until light brown. Remove from pan at once. Makes 6 dozen.

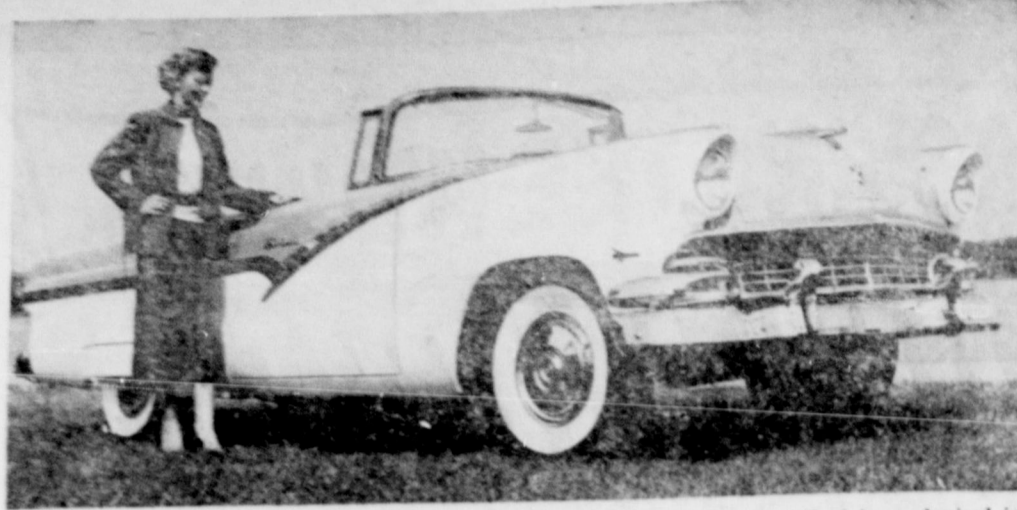

UNDESIRABLE VARIETIES OF WHEAT TO BE DISCOUNTED UNDER SUPPORT PROGRAM

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced a discount of 20 cents per bushel in 1956 price support rates for 8 wheat varieties in Texas designated as undesirable because of inferior milling or baking qualities. This announcement is being made in advance of planting time for 1956-crop winter wheat to give producers ample notice of the new support provisions.

The 20-cent per bushel discount is designed to discourage planting of these varieties. While these varieties are planted to meet specific production problems such as drought or rust resistance, early maturity, adapted for modern harvesting methods, and others, they proved to be undesirable for commercial food use.

The varieties were designated by the Agricultural Research Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture after consultation with

State Agricultural Experiment Station personnel, agronomists, cereal chemists and other qualified technicians on State and Federal staffs.

Even though some of the undesirable varieties might have protein content high enough for a premium, no protein premiums will apply to any of the undesirable varieties. The same action will be taken regarding amber or hard amber durum premiums.

USDA officials state that this change in the wheat price support program for 1956 is designed to encourage production of the more desirable wheat varieties and discourage plantings of wheat with inferior milling or baking qualities. Representatives of crop improvement associations have strongly urged this action to help improve the quality of commercial baking type wheats.

Because the proportion of the wheat crop to be discounted is relatively small, the reduction in price support rates for specified varieties will have only a minor effect in raising the level of in-

SOCIAL SECURITY RULES EASED FOR FARMERS

The recent changes in the Social Security Act make reporting wages paid to farm employees easier for most of America's farm employers, Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security office, said this week.

Now only relatively large farm employers will be required to report wages and pay taxes quarterly. The majority of farm operators will have to report only once, at the end of the year.

Unless a farmer pays a total of \$2,500 or more in taxable wages to farm employees before October 1, 1955, he need not report until January of 1956.

"It is important that you keep records to insure proper reporting at a future date," Tate said. "You and your employees play a vital role in your social security program and complete and accurate reporting is the very backbone of the system."

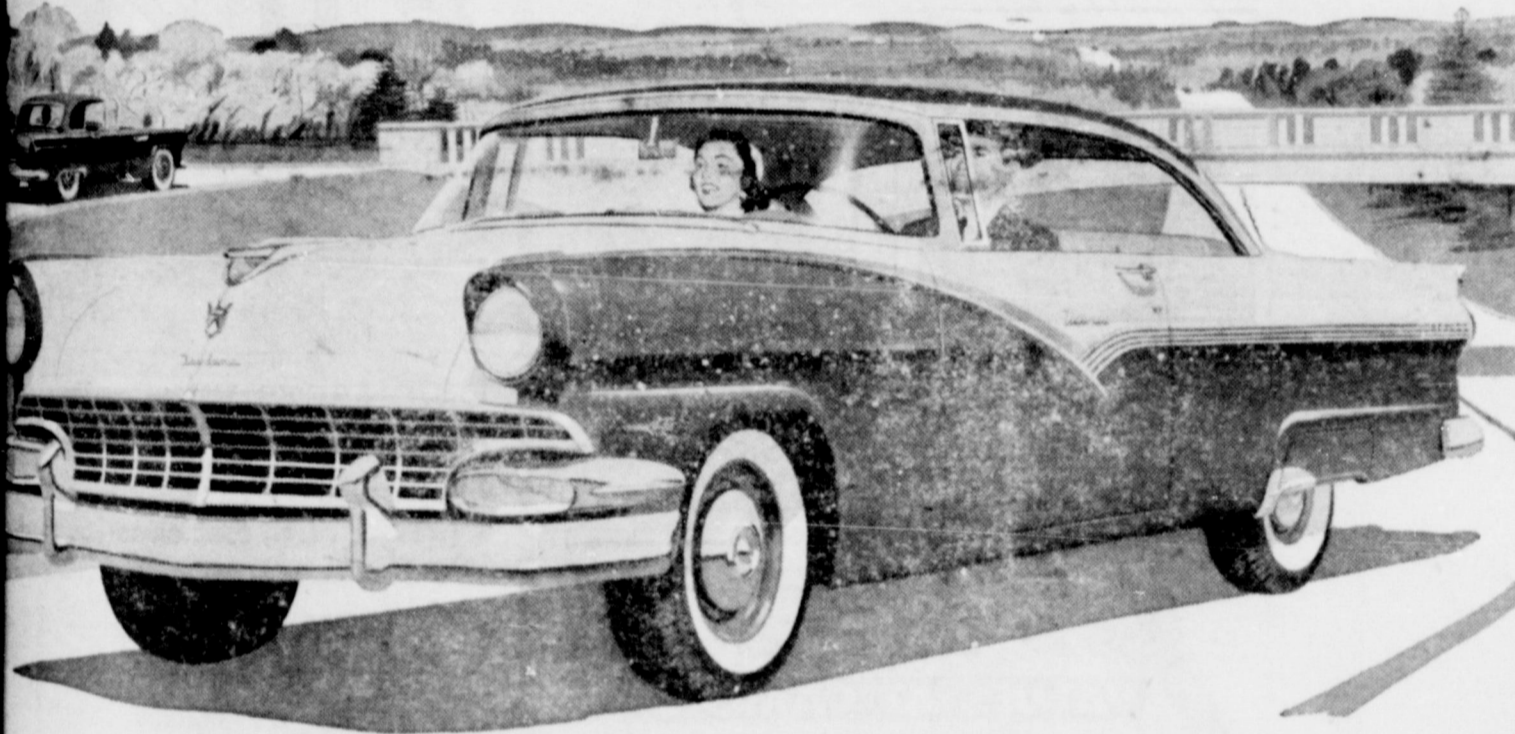

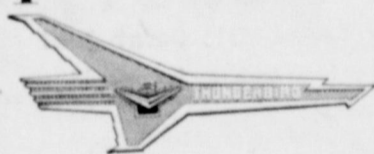

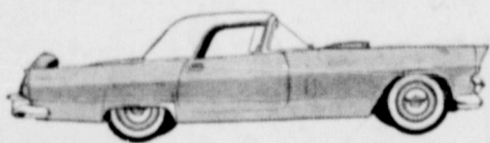

BENEFICIARIES MISSING SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS

A considerable number of widows, young children, and aged parents of working people who died between June 1940 and September 1950 have failed to claim the monthly benefits payable to them under a 1954 change in the social security law, according to Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security office. Those who do not apply for their benefits before October 1, he pointed out, will not be able to receive benefits for all the months back to September, 1954, the effective date of the new provision in the law.

Under this provision, it is now possible to pay monthly social security benefits to the qualified survivors of workers who died between June 1940 and September 1950 if the deceased wage earner had credit for as little as a year and a half of work under social security. The families of many of these workers applied for benefits at the time of the family breadwinner's death, Mr. Tate said, but were told that they could not receive payments under the law as it then stood, because the worker had not earned enough social security credit to provide survivors benefits for his family.

"Announcements of the change in the law were made in all the newspapers, in pamphlets, and on radio and television," Mr. Tate said, "and numerous persons in the Wichita Falls area applied for these benefits since September 1, 1954."

Where a claim of social security benefits is filed within 12 months of the time a beneficiary is first eligible, his payments can be made to him retroactively for the whole period, Mr. Tate pointed out. But if a claim is delayed more than 12 months, benefits for some months

will be lost. He therefore urged the survivors of workers who died between June 1940 and September 1950 to get in touch with their nearest social security office before October 1, 1955. Qualified claimants who apply before that date can be paid benefits back to September 1954.

Monthly benefits under this provision may be paid to the aged widows of such workers who at the time of death had worked on jobs under social security for at least a year and a half; to surviving children under 18 years of age;

and to their mother-widow or children-worker, payments of his aged parents if they are receiving their support.
