At Thursday night's meeting it was pointed out that legumes condition the soil to receive more moisture, and will greatly increase production. In addition, winter legumes provide a cover crop for the land and prevent erosion.

Several farmers present gave enthusiastic reports on their own legumes programs. B. E. Smith, Munday farmer, reported that on 45 acres of cotton following legumes, he will make 118 bales of cotton, while on 45 acres where no legumes were grown he will produce about 67 bales. Both plots are irrigated.

Tentative plans are that only new growers of legumes will be eligible for prizes. "Farmers already using legumes know their worth," sponsors said. "It is those who have never tried legumes that we want to get interested. If relatively few farmers are induced to begin a program this year, we know that their results will cause others to follow suit.

UNDESIRABLE VARIETIES OF WHEAT TO BE DISCOUNTED UNDER SUPPORT PROGRAM

The U. S. Department of Agri culture has announced a discount of 20 cents per bushel in 1956 price support rates for 8 wheat varieties in Texas designated as undesirable because of inferior milling or baking qualities. This announcement is being made in advance of planting time for 1956crop winter wheat to give producers ample notice of the new support provisions.

The 20-cent per bushel discount is designed to discourage planting of these varieties. While these varieties are planted to meet specific production problems such as Abilene spent the week end with drought or rust resistance, early their parents, Mr. and Mrs. John maturity, adapted for modern harvesting methods, and others, they proved to be undesirable for com-

nicians on State and Federal staffs. Even though some of the undeirable varieties might have protein content high enough for a premium, no protein premiums will apply to any of the undesirable varieties. The same action will be taken regarding amber or hard amber durum premiums.

USDA officials state that this change in the wheat price support program for 1956 is de igned to encourage production of the more desirable wheat varieties and discourage plantings of wheat with inferior milling or baking qualities. Representatives of crop improvement associations have strongly urged this action to help improve the quality of commercial baking type wheats.

SOCIAL SECURITY RULES EASED FOR FARMERS

The recent changes in the Social Security Act make reporting wages paid to farm employees easier for most of America's farm employers, Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls Social Securioffice, said this week.

Now only relatively large farm employers will be required to report wages and pay taxes quarter-The majority of farm operators will have to report only once, at

the end of the year. Unless a farmer pays a total of \$2,500 or more in taxable wages to farm employees before October 1955, he need not report until January of 1956.

"It is important that you keep records to insure proper re-porting at a future date," Tate said. "You and your employees play a vital role in your social secuirty program and complete and accurate reporting is the very backbone of the system."



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
