### Stanolind Employees' Union Meets Here

Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. employees held the first meeting of their union in the Knox City area Tuesday at 7:30 p. m. The meeting was held in the Firemen's Hall.

Homer Johnson, president of the local and also one of the division officers, said the union will meet on the first Tuesday night of each month, so the employees can talk over their problems from the various fields in the Sweetwater district. The district covers a vast area, being bounded on the north by the Red River, south by San Angelo, west by Scurry county and east by Dallas.

"At present the employees are few in number," Johnson said, "but we are looking forward to the day when we will be a larger group. Stanolind and its employees are a growing organization, and Stanolind employees are an aggressive group of men. Most of them own their homes in the towns where they reside, and take an interest in community affairs."

The Stanolind Employees Union is independent from any national organization. It was organized by and is run by Stanolind employees only, and now has 1,000 members in the North Texas-New Mexico Division.

Present for Tuesday night's meeting were three men from Snyder, three from Haskell and three from Knox City. Mr. Johnson made a report to the group on a division meeting which was held Sept. 26 in the Ector County district courtroom in Odessa.

### Repairs Scheduled On Highway 277 In Baylor County

The Baylor County Banner reported last week that right of way for widening Highway 277 in Baylor County has been secured, and the State Highway Dept. is expected to let bids for widening and improving the heavily traveled road in October.

The Banner pointed out that the Highway from Wichita Falls to Abilene has been widened and improved except from Seymour west to the Knox County line, and from there through Munday to the Haskell County line.

The Knox County Commissioners Court, the article added, is doing the preliminary work to get the Knox County section ready for the rebuilding job.

Plans call for the pavement to be widened from 18 to 24 feet. The crown of the road will be 40 feet across.

4-H boys who entered livestock in the show, and their placings, were as follows: Samuel Garrett of Munday, first place Hereford steer in the heavy division, and Champion Hereford Steer of the show. The steer was bred by Sidney Winchester of Munday.

Charles Todd of Truscott, first place aged Hampshire Ram and Champion Hampshire ram of the show, fourth, fifth and seventh place Hampshire Ewes and fifth place Hampshire fat lamb.

Carroll Chowning of Truscott, first and second place Romney fat lambs and Champion Romney lamb of the show, Carroll also had a Southdown fat lamb that placed fifteenth in a class of 23 quality lambs.

Robert Beck of Munday had two fat Hampshire lambs that placed eighth and ninth in their class.

Freddie Caram of Gilliland placed seventh and tenth with his two fat Hampshire lambs.

### Goree Youth Killed In Wreck Saturday

Roy John Oliver, 18-year-old son of Roy Oliver, Goree Jeweler, was killed instantly about 8:00 p. m. Saturday when his car collided with a truck carrying Mexican cotton pickers on Highway 277 three and a half miles west of Goree.

According to Sheriff Homer T. Melton, this was one of five wrecks occurring in the county during the rain Saturday.

Melton said Oliver's car pulled into the path of the truck after leaving the shoulder of the highway during the hard rain.

Oliver was employed by a Goree garage.

### New First Grade Teacher Employed In Local School

### Band Wins Third In Marching Contest At Iowa Park

The Knox City Greyhound Band won third place in marching in the band contests at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair in Iowa Park last Thursday.

First place in both marching and concert was won by the smooth performing Archer City band, while the Holiday band placed second in both categories.

Placing fourth in the marching division was the Valley View band. In the concert division, the Empire School of Duncan, Okla., placed third and the Munday band fourth.

Knox City band director Robert E. Taylor and the directors of other participating bands were presented leather briefcases.

### Benjamin Voters O.K. Water District

Voters in the Benjamin School District Saturday approved the formation of a Knox County Water Control and Improvement District, comprising the same area as the school district.

Benjamin residents voted in one box and those living outside Benjamin in another. In the Benjamin box the vote was 87 for confirmation of the district, and one against, while those outside Benjamin voted 25 for, 10 against. It was necessary that the election carry in both boxes for the district to be formed.

According to J. F. Hertel, who has been named secretary of the district, next action taken by the board of directors will be to have a competent engineer submit estimates of the costs of an adequate water reservoir for the city of Benjamin. When this has been done, a hearing will be held to inform people as to the costs of the project, and if the project is deemed feasible by the directors, a bond election will be held.

The Knox City Clinic was put out of a home again Friday evening when a fire of undetermined origin broke out in the American Legion Hall, where the clinic was temporarily housed.

The clinic was set up in the Legion Hall the day after the March 13th tornado wrecked the clinic building near the hospital. A new building is being erected on the old location, but was not expected to be ready for occupancy for several weeks.

The fire Friday, which was discovered shortly after the employees left the building at 6:00 p. m., caused extensive damage to the building. According to Post Commander Curtis Coates, the building will have to be replastered, the hardwood floor replaced, and new window panes installed. The loss was covered by insurance, he added.

Coates estimated damage to the building would amount to about \$7,500. He and a committee composed of C. J. Reese, Abe Watson, Roy Smith and Paul Hoge were to meet with insurance adjustors today, and repairs are expected to begin within the next few days.

All clinic equipment was destroyed or badly damaged. The heat was so intense that all business machines melted.

A volunteer fireman, John Vinita, entered the building and saved the clinic's ledgers containing accounts of patients.

This week, the clinic was moved again, into temporary quarters at the Knox County Hospital.

### Silk New Chairman Of Basketball District

Knox City Supt. Chas. E. Silk was elected chairman of the Basketball District 12-B executive committee, at a meeting in Benjamin Monday night. Mr. Silk replaces Sumpter E. Reed, superintendent of the Benjamin Schools.

District 12-B this year is composed of Benjamin, Knox City, Goree, Vera and Megargel.

The district championship, both boys' and girls' will be decided by a double round robin to begin January 5 and end February 5. Then a single elimination tournament will be held, and the winner of the double round robin will play the winner of the elimination contest in a two-out-of-three series to decide the district winner.

Knox City last year was in a district including O'Brien, Rule and Rochester, but those teams are now in District 13-B, comprising Mattson, Rochester, Rule, Paint Creek, O'Brien and Weir.

### Goree Wildcats Defeat Benjamin

The Benjamin Mustangs, in their first conference game last Thursday night, found the Goree Wildcats, especially Bingham, had too much power, and the Wildcats won the tilt, 20-0.

**GIVE LEGUMES A CHANCE, AGRONOMIST URGES**

COLLEGE STATION. — Legumes can help hold the line on farm income. With the return of acreage controls on some cash crops, the need for increasing profits on each acre planted is emphasized, says Extension Agronomist Ben R. Spears. He adds production costs can be cut by using improved machinery and labor saving equipment but emphasizes that higher acre yields are of major importance.

Legumes used in combination with other good farming practices, explains Spears, can boost yields and put extra dollars in the farmer's pocket. To get the most from legumes, however, only the best adapted varieties should be planted, the seed properly inoculated and fertilizer applied in accordance with the soil needs. A soil analysis should be used as the basis for determining fertilizer needs, says the specialist.

Legumes when properly inoculated can help reduce nitrogen fertilizer requirements of the crops which follow the legume. Research workers of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in an 11-year study have found that the top growth of hairy vetch contains an average of 102 pounds of nitrogen an acre. Legumes are the only plants which have the ability to take nitrogen from the air and store it in the plant, but must be inoculated with the proper nitrogen-fixing bacteria before they can do so, Spears says.

He recommends the use of commercial inoculants which are readily available. Be sure and check the label on the container, he says, to make certain the right inoculant is being used.

Legumes, like other crops, require proper fertilization for maximum growth. Phosphorus is needed in almost all areas of the state.

The effects from plowing under a heavy growth of legumes usually lasts for more than one

year. The legumes add organic matter to the soil and thus improves the soil structure. This allows deeper root penetration and increases the water holding capacity of the soil. The increased water holding capacity, says Spears, is particularly evident in dry years.

Right now, the specialist adds, livestock producers are in need of grazing crops and legumes can be used with success for supplementary pastures. They will provide high protein feed at a lower cost than purchased feeds.

With the favorable moisture conditions that exist in many parts of Texas at this time, Spears points out that prospects are good for winter legume crops. Dry weather during the past two or three years at planting time has been responsible for reduced plantings of legumes but the moisture now available should be a big inducement for farmers and stockmen to greatly expand fall seedings of the adapted legumes. Spears suggests that local county agents be contacted for detailed information on the best adapted legumes and fertilizer needs for particular areas

of the state. Finally, Spears says, give legumes a chance and they'll return big dividends.

Keep your integrity as you journey on, and the grace of God will stream into your being as you go through the Desert Places of Life.

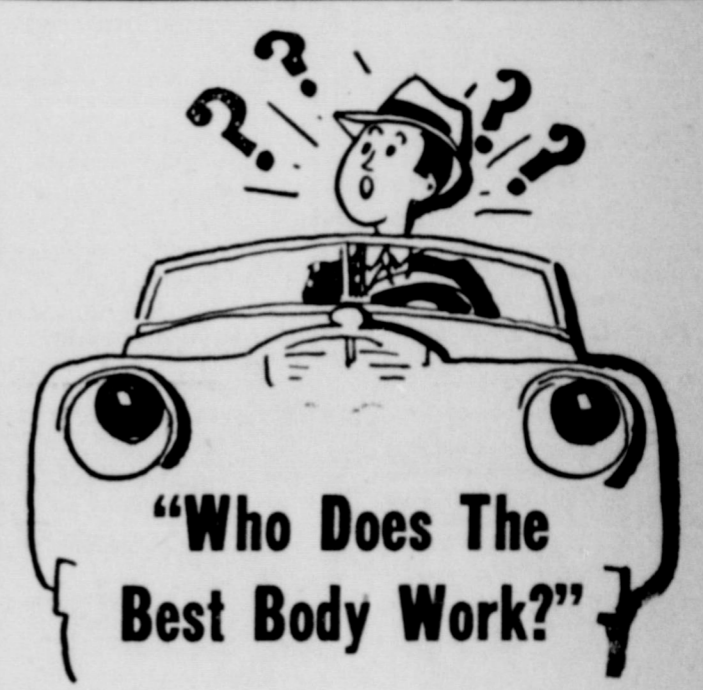
