First 1952 Cotton Received Here And at O'Brien

The first bale of 1952 cotton to be received by a Knox City gin was brought in Tuesday by Earl Watson.

The bale, weighing about 2,000 pounds, was gathered on Mr. Watson's farm north of town, and was hauled to the Brazos Valley Gin. Ginning was delayed by a fire in an electric motor, however, and according to Charles Reese, manager, the cotton was to be ginned today.

The O'Brien Co-Operative turned out its first bale of the season last Saturday, for T. W. Barton of Knox City. The cotton, raised east of town, made 489 pounds of lint and 810 pounds of seed, and will grade about middling 29-32.

Mr. Barton received a \$125 premium and has been offered 40 cents for the cotton, but has not sold.

The O'Brien gin also ginned a bale this week for Lon Brooks.

Light Vote Is Expected In Election Here Saturday

Run-off Scheduled At O'Brien to Elect Public Weigher

One of the largest votes—per capita—in this section of the state is expected to be cast at O'Brien Saturday.

The heavy turn-out of voters will be caused by the run-off between S. E. Reeves, Jr., and Sam Johnston, who are seeking the coveted office of Public Weigher.

In the first Democratic primary in July Reeves, who staged a write-in campaign after failing to get his name on the ballot, led Johnston in the primary, 78-64. However, the 131 votes that went to the five other candidates in the primary make this anybody's race.

Local Minister to Enter Mission Work

Stanley Shipp, minister of the local Church of Christ for the past five years, has announced his plans to move with his family to Riverton, Wyoming, where he will do evangelistic work. He will move on September 15.

Last month, Shipp and three other ministers from this area, including H. L. Matheny of Rochester, held a meeting in Riverton and established a congregation with nineteen members.

On June 18, Shipp delivered the first sermon ever preached by a Church of Christ minister in Riverton, a town of about 4,100 population. His ministry there will be in the nature of missionary work, and will be supported by the Churches of Christ at Denver City, Texas, and Lovington, N. M. Also, the Rochester church will support a radio broadcast by Shipp six days a week.

Shipp graduated from Abilene Christian College in 1946, and after about a year with the Rosebud Church of Christ he came to Knox City. During his ministry here the local church has made much progress, with the active membership being more than doubled.

Shipp stated that he has enjoyed living in Knox City and working with the local congregation, but he has had a desire for some time to enter missionary work.

Oil Notes

Operators are preparing to set pipe for completion of the Mid-Continent Petroleum Co. No. 1 George Buchanan, four miles east of town, after topping the Conglomerate at 5,781 feet. Unofficial reports are that 1,100 feet of free oil was recovered in a drillstem test in that section. This well is an offset to the Deep Rock Oil Corp. No. 1 J. G. Hawkins, where the Conglomerate was encountered about 9 feet higher.

Official potential of the No. 1 Hawkins has been announced as 150.17 barrels in 24 hours. The well is pumping from perforations at 5,775-94 feet.

The Oil Associates No. 2 Myrtle White, shallow test a mile north of town, has been plugged and abandoned just below 2,300 feet, after salt water broke in during attempts to complete.

Stanford Oil & Gas Co. No. 2 C. A. Richardson, in the North Knox City Palo Pinto Reef pool, is drilling below 4,155.

Geochemical Surveys, Inc., No. 1 S. N. Reed, wildcat a mile west of O'Brien, was drilling below 3,800 feet this morning.

The Frank Woods Associates No. 1 Gillespie, King County wildcat 12 miles south of Guthrie, is drilling at 4,870 in shale.

A three hour drillstem test at 5,022-36 feet in the Skeets & Walton No. 1 Michaels, in the McGregor Field west of O'Brien, recovered 2,700 feet of salt water. Operators are drilling ahead and may test the conglomerate. This is a direct offset south of the Texas Pacific B. B. Campbell No. 2, a Strawn producer.

T. P. has staked locations for the Campbell Nos. 3, 4 and 5, with No. 3 being located north-east of the Campbell No. 1.

Precinct 2 Has Only Local Run-off

The vote in Knox City Saturday, in the second Democratic primary, is expected to be very light—as it will be in most other parts of the state.

The only contest on the ballot will be between Frank P. Culver of Ft. Worth and Spurgeon Bell of Houston, for the office of Justice of the Texas Supreme Court, Place 1.

According to Charlie Moorhouse, chairman of the Knox County Democratic Committee, the new election laws make it mandatory that the election be held in each precinct in the county.

There will be only one local contest in the county. In commissioners precinct No. 2—Benjamin, Vera and Brock—Ernest Allen and W. W. Trainham are seeking the office of commissioner.

In the first primary, Allen was high with 190 votes and Trainham received 150, with 156 going to the other two candidates in the race.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24
providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 51a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State, providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 51a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of the State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon for its counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."
Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

H. J. R. No. 24
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation, made by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25
proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to provide for the issuance of bonds for the State to provide for the construction of public buildings; providing for the submission of such Amendment to the qualified electors; and providing for the issuance and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as:

"Section 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk provide suitable laws for the administration and for payment of the same, charges, and benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the day after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon for its counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages;"

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."
Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
