Loss of Railway Mail Service Possible, Board of Commerce Learns

Funeral Services Held at Gilliland For Mrs. Ryder

Funeral services for Mrs. W. A. Ryder, 86, were held at the Gilliland Baptist Church Sunday afternoon, July 24, with Rev. I. J. Sitze, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. K. E. Woolley of Benjamin and the Rev. Roy Mosley of Seymour.

Mrs. Ryder died on July 21 in Parkland Hospital, Dallas. She was born Fannie C. Green September 14, 1869, in Jack County. She married Mr. Ryder in 1893 and moved to Vera soon afterward. Three years later they moved to Gilliland where they lived until their deaths. Mr. Ryder died in 1937.

Survivors are four sons, W. E. Ryder of Bellflower, Calif., Walter Ryder of Victoria, John Ryder of Seymour, and G. E. Ryder of Arlington; three daughters, Mrs. Lizzie Kyle of Pueblo, Colo., Mrs. H. G. Medaris of Dallas and Mrs. C. M. Myers of Gilliland; 29 grandchildren and 34 great-grandchildren.

Interment was in the Gilliland Cemetery under the direction of Harrison Funeral Home of Seymour. Pallbearers were grandsons of the deceased.

SAVINGS BONDS SALES IN STATE TOP \$101 MILLION

More than \$101 million worth of United States Savings Bonds were purchased by Texans during the first half of this year, it was reported this week by Nathan Adams and Ed Gossett, co-chairmen of the Savings Bonds Advisory Committee for the state.

Sales of the bonds throughout Texas for the first six months up to July 1 totaled \$101,606,381, including purchases during the month of June amounting to \$13,787,277.

"At the half-year mark 50.3 percent of the state's 1955 Savings Bonds goal of \$201.9 million was attained," the co-chairmen said. "It should be emphasized, however, that bond sales generally have been greater during the first half of each year and it is urgent that more people in every county of Texas buy more bonds during the remainder of this year."

"This is going to be necessary in order for our state to achieve its proportionate share of the \$5.5 billion national goal this year for this vital program. It is essential to the sound money and stable economy plans for our nation, every community and each individual," they added.

The Savings Bonds co-chairmen urged that everyone increase their bond-buying during the remaining months of this year. They also urged the more than 1400 Savings Bonds volunteers throughout the state to step up the program in every county so that Texas can put its 1955 bond goal over the top.

W. E. Braly, Munday banker, is chairman of the Savings Bonds campaign in Knox County.

W. L. Collins, secretary of the Knox City Board of Commerce, has received information that a move is under way to change the mail service between San Angelo, Texas and Kiowa, Kansas, from rail to motor truck.

Collins' informant was the Altus, Okla., Chamber of Commerce, which alleged that mail on the southbound Santa Fe is being "stripped" of working mails by diverting such mail to Newton and Amarillo main line trains, "in order to make it appear that the Railway Postoffice Service isn't economical, or in the best interest of the service."

Completely repudiating this, the Altus chamber said, is the heavy mail load carried by the north-bound train over the same route.

Twenty-three Texas and Oklahoma communities would be affected by the change, it was pointed out, and all but three would lose their only railroad, all-weather mail service.

Cancellation of the railroad's postal contract would mean the eventual cancellation of passenger service and railway express.

It was also pointed out that the railway postal service has improved greatly in recent years, since the "doodlebug" has been replaced, and during adverse weather it is the only way the mail "goes through."

It was suggested that people in the communities affected write their senators and congressmen, asking them to work toward the preservation of the railway mail route.

Aug. 10 Deadline For Polio Shots

Next Wednesday, August 10, is the deadline for eligible children to receive their second shot of the Salk polio vaccine, Dr. D. C. Eiland, County Health Officer, reminded parents this week.

On that date, all unused vaccine must be returned to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The shots are being administered free to those children who had their first shots in April. Parents were urged by the county health officer to take their children to their family physician by Wednesday.

Dr. Eiland said this morning that approximately 150 children in the county had received the second shot. That number included 43 Knox City children and 3 Benjamin children who received their inoculations at the Knox City Clinic.

TWO YEAR EXTENSION GIVEN USDA'S SPECIAL LIVESTOCK LOAN PROGRAM

President Eisenhower signed into law on July 15 a bill which provides for a two year extension of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's special livestock loan program.

Under the extension initial loans will be made through July 14, 1957 but additional advances may be made for another two year period to borrowers who require more time for making necessary credit adjustments and to repay the loans previously received.

The special livestock loans are made to established producers and feeders of cattle, sheep and goats—except commercial feedlot operators—who are temporarily unable to get from regular sources the credit necessary to carry on their normal operations. Eligibility is based upon the applicant's past record of livestock operations and a reasonable prospect for success with help from the loan.

Loans may be used to meet the usual expenses of livestock operations such as the purchase or production of feed, and replacing or repairing of farm machinery. Loans also may be made for the restocking of herds to normal if the applicant can carry his present herd, plus the additional livestock to be purchased, without buying a substantial part of his feed. Loans are not made to pay existing debts except current incidental bills.

The loans are scheduled for repayment as soon as possible within a maximum period of three years. Other creditors are not asked to subordinate their liens but are expected to execute a standby agreement and agree that a reasonable part of the applicant's normal income from livestock can be used to retire the loan.

Applications for the special loans may be made at the county offices of the Farmers Home Administration.

Methodists Building New Parsonage

Ground was broken this week for a new Methodist parsonage, the Rev. Walter Driver, pastor, announced Wednesday.

Plans are for the parsonage to be constructed on a cash basis, with the brick foundation being laid this summer and actual construction beginning this fall.

The house when completed will have 2,000 square feet of floor space with a carport and storage closet. The pastor drew the plans, with the help of the planning committee. The house will be in the shape of an "H", with two bedrooms and a bath on the west side, living room-dining room combination and kitchen in the middle, and a bedroom, den, and bath on the east. The car port will also be on the east.

The parsonage will be of asbestos siding at the present time, but the brick foundation is being laid so the house can be bricked when a new church is built. Materials will be purchased at wholesale prices and most of the labor will be donated, the pastor said. Estimated cost is \$9,000.

Doyle Graham is chairman of the building committee, and members are Buddy Angle, Sam E. Clonts, Joe Murray Clonts and W. P. White. Members of the planning committee were Jeff Graham, Chad Wilson and A. V. Kemletz.

According to J. W. (Pappy) Smith, charter member of the church, the present parsonage was built in 1906.

AGED PEOPLE TO RECEIVE INCREASED PENSION CHECKS

Aged people in Knox County and elsewhere in Texas heaved a sigh of relief last week as Attorney General John Ben Shepperd ruled that they will begin receiving increased old age assistance benefits in September.

The bill passed by the Legislature provided for the additional \$7 million dollars in assistance to begin in September. But because the bill was passed by a voice vote, it ran into a constitutional snag providing that such bills cannot go into effect until 90 days after the session ends which would be September 6.

The delay in the effective date raised a question as to whether the additional funds could be made available before October 1.

Shepperd ruled that the increased allocations for September could be made September 6. This permits payment of the increase for that month.

This opinion was requested by the State Department of Public Welfare.

LOCAL LADIES ATTEND WSCS SCHOOL OF MISSIONS

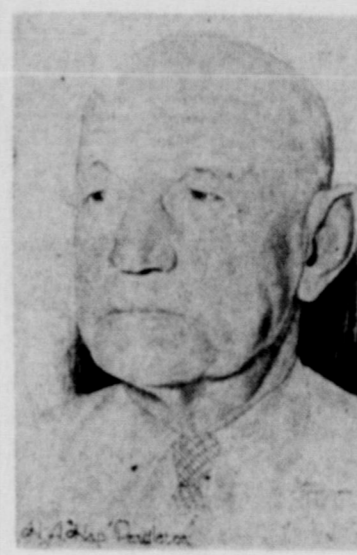

The driver was a "Gates Mystery Man," touring the country to give service station attendants an opportunity to discover that worn belt, and Butch was awarded five dollars for his alertness.

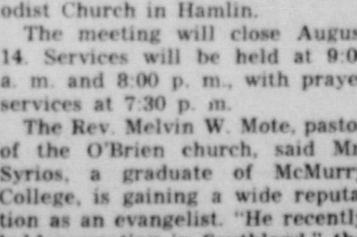
Each summer, the Gates Belt Co. hires vacationing school teachers to travel about the country, awarding \$5.00 to every attendant discovering a faulty belt.

A representative of the Social Security Administration will be at the Knox City postoffice Wednesday, August 10, at 2 p. m.

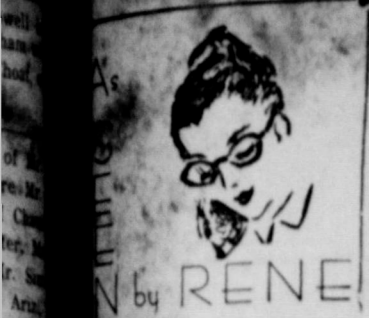
Persons who need information or assistance in Social Security matters were invited to meet with the representative.

Second Polio Shots Almost Completed, Health Officer Says

Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health, said this week that the second inoculation of first and second grade pupils against poliomyelitis has been completed in most areas of Texas. Over the state as a whole, he said, approximately 70 percent of those receiving the first shots were on hand for the second in the series.

It is hoped that ample vaccine will be available soon for use by private physicians to immunize those not eligible under the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis program; also that some arrangements can be made to secure vaccine for the medically indigent of the state. Under the Foundation program, use of vaccine has been limited mostly to children in the first and second grades.

Dr. J. E. Peavy, Chief of the Division of Communicable Diseases, says that polio occurs both sporadically and in epidemics at irregular intervals, with the highest incidence in Texas during the latter part of July and the month of August.

During the past five years 37.4 percent of the reported cases of poliomyelitis in Texas occurred in the age group under five years; 26 percent in the group 5 to 9 years; 12.6 percent in the group 10 to 14 and 23.8 percent of the cases reported were 15 years of age or older. During epidemics paralytic cases rarely exceed one per thousand of population. The most deaths from poliomyelitis occur in the 20-29 year group.

Poliomyelitis can be recognized by your physician by clinical manifestations assisted by examination of the spinal fluid.
