## THE FIRST MIRACLE

The Gospels tell a different story. Did any such thoughts cross Jesus' mind? If they did we have no record of it. He glanced across at the wistful face of the hostess—already tears sparkled under her lids—he remembered that the event was the one social triumph of her self-sacrificing life; and instantly his decision was formed.

He sent for six pots and ordered them filled with water. When the contents of the first one was drawn, the ruler of the feast lifted his glass to the bridegroom, and the bewitched but happy hostess: "Every man setteth on first the good wine," he cried, "and when men have drunk freely, then that which is worse. But thou hast kept the good wine until now."

The mother of Jesus looked on a wonder. She had never fully understood her son; she did not ask to understand. He had somehow saved the situation; she did not question how. And what was sufficient for her, is sufficient for us.

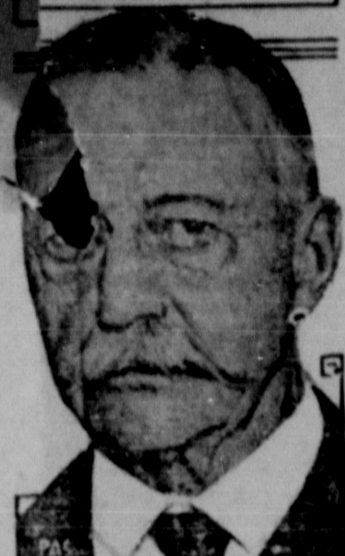
