## Hamlin Fair May 4 and 5

Last year in addition to the Agricultural Show a big first class Rodeo was given for entertainment and it proved to be one of the best "Wild West Rodeo Shows" that had been held in any of the small communities. This year the Rodeo Show will be just as good and perhaps better than last year. \$500, \$600, is being offered as awards and prizes to those who win placed in the various shows, including the Home Demonstrations, The Calf show and other features.

The public is urged to come to Hamlin on May 4 and 5, see the big morning parade, each day, enjoy riding the fat calves and other stock and in the afternoon attend the big rodeo show and stay for the night performances. The management assures two big days of entertainment and two full nights of entertainment. Keep the dates in mind and hitch your "conveyance" and come two good days for a picnic, and Hamlin is a good place to spend your time. Tell your friends to meet you at Hamlin, Friday and Saturday, May 4 and 5.

## J. Lyndal Hughes Runs for County Supt.

J. Lyndal Hughes announces his candidacy for the office of County Superintendent of Knox County.

While fully appreciating the responsibility of the office, and realizing the importance of qualifications as a pre-requisite to election to the position, I respectfully submit my candidacy for the office of County Superintendent of Knox County, subject to the action of the Democratic primaries on July 28, 1934.

I am a native of Knox County and was educated in the Knox County public schools, having attended Lone Star, Benjamin High School, and Vera High School. I attended the North Texas State Teachers College at Denton, Texas, for three years, and from there went to the University of Texas, where I received the Bachelor of Arts degree in the summer of 1928. I continued my education in Austin until September, 1933, when I accepted a position in the Sunset Consolidated High School.

With the end in view of serving the people of Knox County in the field of public school education, I have endeavored to prepare myself to do this efficiently. While in Austin, I made a particular study of the organization and function of the State Department of Education making many friends in the department and obtaining information which will enable me better to perform the duties of County Superintendent.

The future for public school education in Texas is one of limitless possibilities. The last decade has taught us that we need desperately a new system of education. Whatever that new system is to be will be largely determined by the type of person occupying the position of influence. Such a position of influence, in order to render invaluable public service, demands adaptability, the courage of new ideas and the vision of youth. The office of County Superintendent is a position of influence. Parents are now demanding concrete proof that the person in the position of County Superintendent can improve the future welfare of their children. The parent's share in providing for the future welfare of their children is to vote for the person whom they believe best qualified for the position of County Superintendent, and elect him. Then the voters have a right to expect of the person elected the focusing of his entire energy and interest in the public schools of Knox County.

The rural schools and the town schools in Knox County are only a part of a great system of education in Texas. Yet, the citizens and voters in Knox County expect our part to meet the requirements and even go beyond and so contribute its share in the shaping of the new educational system of tomorrow.

School duties will require my attention until June 1, and as a consequence, I shall be unable to get out and personally meet many of the voters in the county until then. In the meantime, however, I invite the people to investigate my record as to qualifications, interest in school problems, and success as teacher in the Sunset Consolidated School. I shall appreciate your consideration and support.

### YOUR HEALTH

By Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer

"Mothers and Babies First" is the slogan for Child Health Day, which will be held on May first, according to Dr. H. N. Barnett, Director of Bureau of Child Hygiene, Texas. It will join with the other states in the nation-wide celebration. There is a special significance in this year's celebration because children are always among the greatest sufferers in periods of hard times.

Child Health Day is a challenge to all adults to take stock of the health of all children, babies as well as those of school age, in their communities. All should be interested in furthering all measures to conserve health and promote happiness of children. An examination by the family physician at this time would not be amiss. He can detect signs of malnutrition, unsound teeth, heart defects, poor vision, poor hearing and many other defects and can advise the parents of the proper treatment necessary.

Parents should take an inventory of what they are doing for their children, to see if they are neglecting anything that should be done to remove health handicaps.

It is suggested that every community in the State conduct suitable exercises on May Day. Texas has always taken a prominent part in this observance and each year numbers of clinics for babies and pre-school children are held. In this way community-wide interest is centered on the small child. Teachers, children, and members of clubs are called to establish year round activities for the betterment of mothers and babies.

Simple yet attractive designs are being made by a majority of the 4-H club girls of the county for tufted bedspreads. "This is the most interesting work we have had in our 4-H club," stated Noralene Jones Goree 4-H club who voiced the sentiment of many other girls in her club as well as the other 8 clubs in the county.

"I can hardly wait to start work on my spread and am equally as anxious to get it completed," Noralene also said.

All the 4-H club girls know that these spreads are to be started before time for the annual encampment in June and that they are to be completed and exhibited in the County Exhibit in September. It is expected that there will be quite an array of design and color in these spreads and everyone will want to see them on display.

**PROSPECTS FOR GARDENS ARE VERY GOOD**

My Tomatoes have been planted some time in the hotbed and I plan to set them out before long. I also plan to have beans, peas, lettuce, cabbage and pepper in my garden," said Maurine Gammill, Sunset 4-H Club. "I plan to can at least 50 containers of tomatoes which is the goal for each club girl," she further stated.

One hundred and thirty-six 4-H club girls have made provision for setting out tomatoes in their gardens. The number set out varies from 100 to 500 plants and with this approximately 20 thousand tomatoes set out by club girls alone, there should be plenty of tomatoes for every one.

The goal for the club girls this year is for each girl to can 50 containers of tomato products this year and to exhibit a container of each of the products put up at the county exhibit in September.

"I have found my foundation pattern to be so helpful and I use it all the time," stated Mrs. R. N. Smith Lonestar Home Demonstration Club. "I just wish that each member of our club had one of these patterns for I know it saves so much time and trouble and the finished garments look so nice," she further stated.

The goal for the entire county this year is for every Home Demonstration club member to have a foundation or individually fitted pattern and make a dress using this pattern for the dress contest in June.

"I have never been able to get a pattern that fit me perfectly and like so many people I have always had trouble with my sleeves they never feel comfortable and are always pulling out," said Mrs. J. O. Cure, Gilliland Home Demonstration Club. "I feel sure that I am going to enjoy using my pattern and am confident that my clothes are going to fit better," she also said.

The Gilliland club has just about accomplished the goal of a foundation pattern for every club member yet they are not confining their work merely to club members. They plan to make several patterns for non-club members who have realized the value of them.

Club Members Plan to Reach Every Community With Foundation Pattern Making Whether They are Organized Or Not

Every woman in Knox County will have the chance to have an individually fitted pattern whether they belong to an organized club or not. The Home Demonstration agent and the wardrobe demonstrators in each of the clubs are planning to reach each unorganized community with an all day school on this work, and individual help is being given by many club members who have already realized the value of such work.
