PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.
BE IT ENFORCED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a, which shall read as follows:
"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."
Each voter shall mark out one of said issues on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the return of said election that a majority of the voters cast are in favor of an amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published in the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electors; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.
BE IT ENFORCED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61, to read as follows:
"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."
Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said issues on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the return of said election that a majority of the voters cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HAROLD W. PACK RETURNS TO STATES

After spending seven months in the Far East operating with units of the UN naval forces, the aircraft carrier USS Philippine Sea has returned to the United States.

Serving aboard her is Harold W. Pack, interior communications electrical second class, son of Mr. and Mrs. V. R. Pack of Knox City.

During her time in the Far East the Philippine Sea sent her Panther jets, Skyraider attack bombers and Corsair fighter bombers on daily strikes against Communist supply and communication lines.

In addition to the "line-cutting" and "rail-splitting" missions, the pilots concentrated on gun emplacements, troops, supply areas, factories and warehouses, destroying anything of possible use to the enemy.

As a parting shot at the Reds, planes from the Philippine Sea and three sister carriers hit the strategic hydro-electric plants along the Yalu river and all over North Korea. The Philippine Sea is the first of the four carriers that made the strike to return to the states.

PMA Committee Members to Contact All County Farmers

Every farmer in Knox County is to have an opportunity to cooperate in the 1953 Agricultural Conservation Program extended to him through a personal visit by a PMA community committeeman, according to J. C. McGee, chairman of the county PMA committee.

This is following through on the "farm by farm, first things first" approach launched this year and carried out by PMA community committeemen in one county in each state. In Texas this use of community committeemen to visit every farm was tried out in Milam County.

In all of the counties where community committeemen made farm-by-farm contacts this year there has been a stepping up of conservation and a definite trend to the more permanent type practices such as terraces, pasture improvement, dams, and protected waterways.

One of the first things a community committeeman does is to help the farmer determine the farm's conservation needs. The use of each field or piece of ground for the crops for which it is best suited and in such a way that it makes its greatest contribution to meeting production goals is to be a guide in determining conservation needs.

Gullies, sheet erosion, breakdown of soil structure, and other indications of deterioration will be checked and conservation practices suggested to meet the problems. Assistance available under the Agricultural Conservation Program will be directed to meeting the most urgent needs.

Where special assistance is required for some of the more technical conservation practices the Soil Conservation Service will be called on for help. The Extension Service, the Farmers Home Administration and other Federal and State agencies will be asked to cooperate where their services are needed.

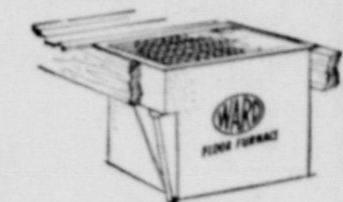
