Discharged



Capt. Clyde Graham, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Graham, is now at home, following his discharge from the Army Air Forces July 4.

Clyde entered service in 1942 and was commissioned May 13, 1943. He was shipped overseas in 1944, and in Scotland was attached to the 396th Fighter Squadron, known as the "Hun Hunters."

He piloted a P-47 fighter plane on mission over Germany during the invasion of Europe by Allied forces.

Stationed in Germany since the end of the war, Clyde returned to the states June 25, and was discharged at San Antonio.

Club Boys Plant New Variety Black-Eyed Peas

Forty five 4-H club boys of Knox County, in nine different communities planted one hundred pounds of the new variety of black-eyed peas, known as the Early Ramshorn, this being one of their new club demonstrations for 1946. This new variety of black-eyed peas has been under experimental test at College Station since 1944. Early Ramshorn, under tests, produced 4,692 pounds of green pods per acre as compared with the common variety which produced 1,966 pounds per acre, reports R. O. Dunkle, Knox County Agricultural Agent.

This improved variety of black-eyed peas are just coming into production and all the club members and their families reported them having a much more desirable flavor than the common variety. Donald Nix, 4-H club member of the Sunset community, described the flavor as not being so tangy, and he also found them to be less stringy.

These forty five club members plan to save seed from this new improved variety of Early Ramshorn black-eyed peas, and to sell them to their neighbors for planting in 1947. The market price, now, for eatable peas and beans is 30c per pound, and if these prices are maintained the Knox County 4-H club boys will realize a nice profit from their new demonstration in the production of seed.

Gas Company Has Helpful Advice for Home Canners

Cooperating with the Department of Agriculture's appeal for National Home Food Preservation Week, July 15-22, Lone Star Gas Company's current recipe bulletin stresses modern methods of canning fruits, vegetables and meats to assure Americans a better diet and help the famine stricken world.

Copies of the bulletin, "Cooking With Gas," are available without charge through the company's business offices or requests may be mailed to Lone Star's home economics department in Dallas at 301 Harwood Street.

National food preservation week will focus attention on necessity of home preservation of food supplies for winter, as food is badly needed throughout the world; it will emphasize need for food preservation throughout summer and fall.

The bulletin points out that canning is one of the best means of food preservation and describes the pressure cooker, boiling water bath and open kettle methods of canning vegetables, fruits, meats, poultry, fish, pickles and relishes. Recipes for sugar substitutes and those requiring minimum sugar are given.

The pressure cooker method is the nearest approach to commercial canning and will handle any kind of food, the bulletin says, and the water bath method is "recommended for canning fruits, tomatoes and tomato mixtures." The open kettle method "may be used for preserving and pickling."

One section of the bulletin is devoted to containers, lids and sterilizing. Other points stressed are pre-cooking or blanching of fruits and vegetables, and how to detect food spoilage. It warns "don't throw away food value! In pre-cooking vegetables and fruits, use the cooking liquid to fill the jars."

Canning Center To Open Soon

The canning center of the vocational agriculture department of Munday high school will open in the Munday school building July 15. The community canning service will be the same as last year with the same privileges offered.

Allan Shivers Only Ex-Serviceman In Lieut.-Governor Race

Senator Allan Shivers, only ex-serviceman in the race for Lieutenant-Governor, focused attention on war veterans when he opened his campaign recently in his hometown, Port Arthur.

"I exchanged ideas with fighting men many times in the hard days overseas in Africa, Italy, France and Germany. I know the anxiety and disappointment so many veterans feel today, and I understand and appreciate their problems that are also my own problems," the Jefferson County senator stated.

Although only 38 years old, Senator Shivers is dean of the Texas Senate because of his 12 years service there. The Gulf Coast counties of Jefferson, Hardin, Liberty and Orange made him the youngest senator ever to take the oath of office when he was first sent to the state capitol to represent them in 1934.

"My past experience in the state senate enables me to preside over that legislative body, which is one of the main duties of Lieutenant-Governor," Senator Shivers pointed out.

Listed as his aim when elected Lieutenant-Governor, Senator Shivers named consideration of war veterans problems, higher salaries for teachers, better farm-to-market roads, reorganization of the pardon and parole system of the state.

He pointed out that he proposed and sponsored a farm-to-market road program for every county in Texas during the last session of the legislature. "The first old-age assistance law placed upon the Texas Statutes was sponsored by Allan Shivers," he reminded.

"I have been a proponent of legislative redistricting since 1937. This must be done and done soon," the senator said, continuing his platform. "I favor a 60-day session of the legislature each year rather than 120 days every other year. I also favor a reduction in the number of legislators and adequate salary for them," he said.

Season Near For Determining Extent Cotton Flea Hopper

It is nearing the time when most Knox County farmers will be making flea hopper counts in cotton to determine the damage that is being done by this most injurious cotton insect of Knox County. The damage of the cotton flea hopper is not known until thorough examinations are made or when the cotton fails to produce a normal yield, says R. O. Dunkle, county agent.

Examinations should be made now, and for each succeeding week, to determine the cotton flea hopper infestation and damage.

The best method to determine flea hopper damage is to use a net that is funnel shaped, the mouth of which is 16 inches in diameter made of 16 inch gauge wire, to which is attached a funnel shape perale net, the wire loop is then attached to an old broom handle, that is about two feet long. The proper way of using the net is to make 100 sweeps across the row of cotton, brushing the top of the cotton. The flea hopper is a 5% DDT-Sulphur dust, applied at the rate of 10 to 15 pounds per acre.

It is very important that flea hopper count be made before application of the dust, as an infestation of less than 15 flea hoppers per 100 sweeps with the net will not justify poisoning; however, a higher count will in every instance pay good dividends for expense of dusting.

To Vote On Proposed Bonds Tuesday, Aug. 1

Qualified voters of Knox City have a chance to approve or disapprove a proposed bond issue for improving the local water and sewer systems, in a election to be held here on August 1.

Final notice of the election is published elsewhere in this paper, containing the full text of the propositions. Mayor Baker and city commissioners Ed Shaver and O. W. May decided to put the issue up to the voters after carefully going over the city's financial condition and the inadequate water and sewer facilities.

A firm of engineers was employed to survey and check present water and sewer systems and determine an approximate cost of enlarging systems to serve present needs. After months of work, the project, a comparative one, was reached and presented to the city commission.

The figure was more than had anticipated and the commission felt that the city finds and tax valuations at this time would not bear the cost.

Checking over the proposed water and sewer extensions, various plans were made that usually brought the project cost down to a workable figure. Further details of the proposition were then worked out and the question will be put to the voters.

Propositions are offered in the ballot, involving a total of \$10,000.00 in bonds. A detailed description of the proposed improvements, and if possible, a map showing the locations, will be given at a date.

More Coverage In Social Security Would Save Taxes

Emphasizing what was described as a great need for expansion of the Social Security program to cover presently excluded workers, particularly those in agriculture, Gordon James, manager of the field office in Wichita Falls, said yesterday that the state's public assistance program must at present carry the burden of assistance to old people and dependent survivors in this area, because this is predominantly an agricultural area whose own workers are not covered by Old Age and Survivors Insurance (Social Security).

with the public assistance program, believing that it is doing a wonderful work, James said, but he believes that plan calls for taxation which puts a burden on public tax resources that could be avoided under the more general plan.

He cited figures showing that in Knox County, served by the field office, there is expended for old-age assistance, aid to dependent children, and aid to the blind, \$6.71 per year for every man, woman and child in the area. This compares with \$0.45 per capita per year for Social Security, which it is contended is self-supporting and shared in by worker and employer alike.

Most of the burden upon Texas' general tax resources which must support half of the cost of public assistance could be relieved, James thinks, if the benefits of Old Age and Survivors Insurance were extended to cover agricultural classes, and the self-employed, a plan for which is now before Congress.

HEALTH LETTER

In addition to the general instructions for community sanitation which are important in preventing poliomyelitis, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, today issued an urgent warning to every individual in Texas to practice strict personal hygiene to protect his own health and that of those about him.

"Of course, cleanliness and personal hygiene are ordinarily taken for granted," Dr. Cox said, "but at this time with the incidence of poliomyelitis having reached a total of 292 cases, I would like to re-emphasize some personal sanitary measures which may help in preventing the spread of this crippling and often fatal disease."

The State Health Officer stressed the importance of scrupulous cleanliness of the person. Frequent bathing and immaculately clean clothing are vitally necessary. Oral hygiene with thorough brushing of the teeth and the use of a mild antiseptic are recommended. The nasal passages should be kept clean and dental defects corrected immediately.

Sanitation and thorough cleanliness in the home are instinctive with the average their importance to health must be re-emphasized. Home sanitation includes those taken-for-granted measures such as washing the dishes with hot soapy water and rinsing them in hot clear water; keeping sinks, bathtubs and fixtures scoured clean and rinsed with a mild antiseptic solution; sunning and airing bedclothes, ridding the house of flies, rats and roaches which, since poliomyelitis is believed to be a filth-borne disease, are suspected as being responsible for transmission.

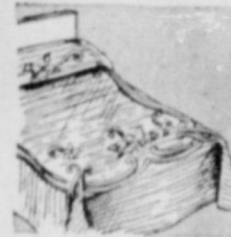

of effective ulation of trus causing aphids damaging. So caution should be exercised in applying DDT early in the season, in order not to build up injurious infestations of aphids.

For economical control of the hopper, it is essential to examine cotton to ascertain the numbers of insects present. Applications of from 12 to 15 lbs. of sulphur per acre are sufficient to control light or medium infestations, while a five percent DDT mixture is recommended for heavy infestations.

The first applications of sulphur should be applied when from 15 to 25 hoppers are found on 100 cotton terminals. If the infestation rapidly increases due to the adults' migrating in, or if it reaches high numbers before being discovered, the DDT sulphur mixture should be used to stop the damage as quickly as possible.

Farm folks everywhere are familiar with fertilizers and insecticides. Now there's another new family of chemicals which will become just as necessary and just as familiar on the average farm or ranch. These are the hormone chemicals—the "growth regulators." In all there about a hundred of them—but maybe you're most familiar with 2, 4-D, the new weed killer.

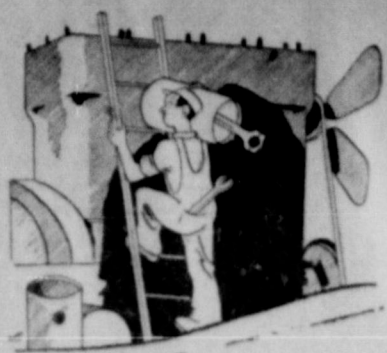

"RESOLUTION
BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF KNOX CITY, TEXAS, CALLING AN ELECTION ON THE QUESTION OF THE ISSUANCE OF \$40,000.00 SEWER SYSTEM BONDS AND ON THE QUESTION OF THE ISSUANCE OF \$70,000.00 WATERWORKS AND SEWER SYSTEMS REVENUE BONDS.

1. That an election be held in said City of Knox City, Texas, on the 1st day of August, 1946, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION NO. 1
"Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of Knox City, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of \$40,000.00, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the Board of Commissioners, the maximum maturity date being not more than Twenty-five (25) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Three and one-half (3½%) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said issue of bonds, for the purpose of improving and extending the Sewer System in and for said City, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

PROPOSITION NO. 2
"Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of Knox City, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the sum of \$70,000.00, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the Board of Commissioners, the maximum maturity being not more than Twenty-five (25) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Three and one-half (3½%) per cent per annum, for the purpose of improving and extending the Waterworks System of said City, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of the Waterworks and Sewer Systems of the City, and by a deed of trust on said Waterworks and Sewer Systems and the grant of a franchise to operate said systems for a term of not exceeding twenty years in the event of sale after default as provided in the power of sale contained in said deed of trust."

2. The said election shall be held at the City Hall within said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed directors of said election, to-wit:

E. R. Carpenter, Asst. Judge,
G. T. Glenn, Clerk,
Mrs. Sam M. Clonts, Clerk.

3. The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Article 704, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty-Fourth Legislature, and only legally qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.

4. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

PROPOSITION NO. 1
"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER SYSTEM BONDS

AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER SYSTEM BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

The Mayor is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the City Hall and at two other public places within said City not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for holding said election. He shall also cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws governing general elections.
